

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Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



In New Zealand over 1,700 admirers and invited visitors attended his farewell party. Participants were encouraged to wear their best black and white

gear to bid adieu to Happy Feet, the wayward emperor penguin who washed up sick and starving on a beach almost 2,000 miles from his Antarctic home. Happy Feet was taken to Wellington Zoo where he was nursed back to health after mistakenly eating 7 pounds of sand he mistook for snow. The penguin underwent a series of lifesaving operations to remove sand, sticks and stones from his stomach. He was fed a diet of fish 'milkshakes' in an airconditioned room. A web camera (are penguin feet webbed?) set up at the zoo attracted about a quarter of a million viewers -- despite the penguin doing little more than eating, sleeping and waddling. For his trip home, vets placed Happy Feet in a custom-made crate for the journey. He was kept cool with 60 buckets of ice and fed fish as he made his way to a return to the wild.

Happy Feet was treated like a king -- or certainly, like a distinguished emperor (penguin). How do you treat strangers and visitors of the human variety? It's been said that the ornaments of your house will be the guests that frequent it, an idea certainly true from the Torah perspective. Who can forget the story of an aged Abraham, on the third day following his circumcision, running in the heat of the day from his tent to greet guests? Abraham and Sarah provided their three visitors with a fabulous meal, and undoubtedly repeated this example of hospitality numerous times. Let every visitor to your home be treated like a king -- or at least, like a wayward emperor (penguin).

Moses proceeds to review the regulations necessary for a civilized society. Local judges and officers were to be appointed in every city, and justice was to be administered

righteously and impartially. A bribe of even an insignificant sum is forbidden. The Sanhedrin -- the

Jewish High Court of seventy one judges -- is to make Torah-based binding decisions on new situations to prevent the fragmentation of the Jewish people.

When the Jewish people request a king, the king was not to misuse his power to amass many horses, maintain a harem nor accumulate great wealth. To order his priorities and not become haughty he should write a copy of the Torah and carry it with him. When the Jewish people had righteous kings such as David and Solomon, it was a blessing. When we had wicked kings such as Jereboam and Ahav, it was a curse.

The nation's conduct in war is mentioned. The Jewish people are told not to be afraid of the enemy, not to destroy any fruit trees in battle, and that they should first give the enemy a chance to make peace. The portion also forbids all forms of superstition and 'magic' practiced by the soothsayer. We have no need for such tricks because of our true prophets and faith in G-d. The Jewish people are promised by G-d that He will send prophets to guide them, and Moses explains how a genuine prophet may be distinguished from a false one.

Rabbinic Ruminations



Comedienne Phyllis Diller said, "A smile is a curve that sets everything straight." Based upon a recent study, smiling behavior in photographs may very well set

straight a person's future success in life and in marriage. Women's yearbook pictures from an elite institution were examined to determine the intensity of female students' smiles in their senior yearbook photo. It was discovered that the more intense the subject's positive expression shown in her picture, the more likely that she would be married by age 27 and would have a more satisfying marriage in adulthood. Furthermore, she was more likely to be more organized, content, nurturing, compassionate, and sociable than women with less intense smiles.

Psychologists suggest that facial expressions play a key role in forecasting our life outcomes. While not necessarily disagreeing with the above study, the Torah emphasizes the effect our smile may have

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upon another person. In Pirkei Avos (1:15) we learn, "Shamai taught, 'Greet every person with a smiling and warm face!' "One's negative demeanor can be contagious, causing others to be infected with the germ of depression. A smile is a sign that you care about someone. Often, the emotional need to feel wanted is more powerful than physical hunger or thirst. If you give your friend all the gifts in the world with a sour face, it's as if you've given him nothing. But one who receives his friend with a cheerful face, even if he has given him nothing else, has given him the greatest gift in the world.

A smile is a universal welcome; it's good for our short term health and long term success in life, and can brighten even the darkest day of another person.

FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions) about our new Shul

- Where are the restrooms? Off the main level lobby and on the lower level just below it
- 2. Where will Kiddush be? Services and Kiddush are on the same level; you do not need to walk down any steps; after services, simply walk behind the movable wall and you will see the tables and chairs set up for Kiddush
- 3. Where are the kitchens? Kitchens are adjacent to the Kiddush area on the main level
- 4. What is downstairs? Offices, Chapel/Library, Kitchenette, Kid's Room, Youth Lounge, Storage, restrooms, and a Multi-Purpose room
- 5. What is the Multi-Purpose room for? Shalosh Seudos, Board Meetings, Other Meetings, Classes, Synaplex sessions, special events, and whatever you can think of
- 6. Where is the elevator? on the lower level, it is just inside the North entrance; on the main level, it is in the North stairwell, across the sanctuary from the main level lobby; it has a Shabbos mode so you can use it without pushing any buttons on Shabbos
