"Cory Lewis: 14 Year-Old Hero"

The Robeson County School Board held its first meeting of the year in early January, but this meeting was special. One student from a middle school in Lumberton, North Carolina was honored and named a hero because he saved the lives of 50 students on his bus after the school bus driver fell out of her chair unconscious back in December. His name is Cory Lewis, and he was riding the bus home from school when a car ran into the back of the school bus. "We were going across the stop sign, and we got halfway when a car hit us. I noticed the bus driver wasn't in her seat, I got up from off the ground, I went up here and I hit the brake," said Cory. School officials said the driver of the car and the bus driver were both okay, and thanks to Cory, no students were injured.

Cory said he reacted on instinct when he saw the bus was headed towards a ditch and pine trees on the side of the road, but that he couldn't have done it without some training from one special person. Lisa Locklear is Cory's mom, and she's been a bus driver for more than twenty years. She said each morning her son helps her with all of her security checks, but she never thought that training would come in handy until now. "It makes me feel good within myself that all that I've taught him is not in vain," said Lisa. His mom says that bus wasn't Cory's usual ride home, and she knows why he was there that day. "I just feel in my heart that G-d put him on that bus for a reason," said the proud mom. The 14-year-old says it was all instinct, but his actions have given him a new name. "Cory is my little hero. He is my little hero," said Lisa Locklear.

Dr. Elisabeth Kubler-Ross said, " ... know that everything in this life has purpose. There are no mistakes, no coincidences, all events are blessings given to us to learn from." It's not always easy to understand and decipher G-d's message in all that happens in our lives. But if we look carefully (and with an open mind) at our past history, we can discover a great network of intricate plan and purpose, which will make us aware of G-d's guiding hand in the seemingly random events in our lives.

Parshas Yisro Exodus 18:1 - 20:23

The weekly portion begins with Moses' father-in-law, Yisro, arriving at the Jewish people's camp in the desert, where he is greeted warmly by a large entourage. Yisro was inspired to join them when he heard about all of the wonders and miracles which G-d performed for the Jewish people during the Exodus from Egypt. Upon witnessing Moses serving as the people's sole judge from dawn until dusk, Yisro declares that this system will never work. He therefore suggests that subordinate judges be appointed to adjudicate the smaller cases. Moses agrees to this plan. The Jewish people arrive at Mt. Sinai and prepare to receive the Torah. Moses ascends the mountain and G-d tells him to convey to the people that they will be to Him a treasure from among the nations. After three days of preparation the moment of revelation finally arrives. Amid thunder, lightning and the sound of the shofar, G-d descends upon the mountain and proclaims -- with the entire Jewish people listening -- the Ten Commandments. Referred to in Hebrew as the Aseres HaDibros, a more accurate translation would be the Ten Sayings or the Ten Statements. One noteworthy feature of the revelation is that both before and since Sinai, no nation has ever made the claim that G-d spoke to an entire nation of millions of individuals. Moses then ascends the mountain to receive the remainder of the Torah from G-d, both the written and oral segments. The portion concludes with several mitzvos concerning the construction of the altar in the Temple.

Rabbinic Ruminations

The classic powers of comics character Superman include flight, super strength, x-ray vision, speed, heat vision and invulnerability. But for all those who live in fear of making a mistake, take heart; the Man of Steel's invulnerability isn't absolute. Superman's most famous weakness, Kryptonite, originated as radioactive fragments of the planet Krypton. And there's even better news for us fragile, imperfect human beings. According to a research-confirmed theory, making mistakes makes us more, not less, likable. Originally described in 1966 by social psychologist Eliot Aronson as the pratfall effect, this theory suggests the tendency for attractiveness to increase or decrease after an individual makes a mistake, depending on the individual's perceived competence, or ability to perform well in a general sense.

Dr. Aronson organized a test in which students would listen to tape recordings of a confederate (actor) pretending to be a contestant for the show College Bowl. The tapes consisted of an interview with extremely difficult questions. At the end of the interview, a pratfall, or small blunder, was introduced in some tapes, where listeners would hear the sound of the person knocking over a cup of coffee. When participants were asked to rate the quizzers on likability, the attractiveness of a competent coffee-spill group increased after the blunder. Results suggest that those who never make mistakes are seen as less likable than those who commit the occasional faux pas. Messing up draws people closer to you, makes you more human. Perfection creates distance and an unattractive air of invincibility. Those of us with flaws win out every time.

In contrast to some writings in the works of other religious faiths, no one in the Torah is portrayed as perfect. Noah, the only person in Tanakh to be called righteous, ends drunk and shamed. Moses, Aaron and Miriam are all punished for their sins. So is King David. Solomon, wisest of men, ends his life as a deeply compromised leader. In the words of Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, "In Judaism the moral life is about learning and growing, knowing that even the greatest have failings and even the worst have saving graces. It calls for humility about ourselves and generosity toward others. This unique blend of idealism and realism is morality at its most demanding and mature." We are imperfect and flawed. And in our imperfection and vulnerability, there is an elegant beauty.
