Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason Parshas Bo January 16, 2016

"Warning: Suicidal Deer!"

Here's one road sign that's sure to get a driver's attention: "Suicidal Deer." This yellow road sign can actually be found near the intersection of two county roads in a rural area of Ford County, Illinois. The sign was installed about six weeks ago as part of a campaign from the local highway department to try to cut down on deer versus car accidents. Do the deer in Ford County have a Charles Bronson-like 'Death Wish'? Not hardly. The sign is just part of a campaign to raise awareness among drivers, and early indications are that the sign is working. So far, no accidents involving deer have been recorded this year after 33 incidents in 2015.

Putting up the signs isn't an original idea, according to local Highway Commissioner Ron Hilligoss. "My nephew sent me a picture of one of these signs out in Colorado about six months ago. He texted it to me, and I thought it was really a good thing because it gets your attention." Four "Suicidal Deer" signs were purchased by the highway department for \$42 each but only one is installed. Commissioner Hilligoss wants to see whether that one will last before putting up the others. "I'm just waiting to see who puts bullet holes in it or steals it,", Mr. Hilligoss said. "A lot of people see it. If you ask anybody where a deer crossing sign is, they couldn't tell you, but they know where that one is at. It's just nice to see something that constantly reminds you that there are deer running out there."

"Hear, O Israel, the Lord is our G-d, the Lord is one." These words are the supreme testimony of Jewish faith. Although "Shema Yisrael" is usually translated as "Hear, O Israel," it is best understood to mean: "Listen. Concentrate. Give the word of G-d your most focused attention. Strive to understand. Engage all your faculties, intellectual and emotional. What the Almighty commands you is for your benefit. He loves you, He loves your

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people and all of humanity, and has given you a Book of Instructions to enjoy a good, purposeful life." Without attention to detail, no real achievement -- spiritual, or otherwise -- is possible.

Parshas Bo Exodus 10:1 -- 13:16

This week's portion begins with the eighth plague that G-d brings upon the Egyptians as the land is covered by locusts, destroying all the remaining crops. After the plague is removed at Pharaoh's behest, he once again refuses to set free the Jewish people, and the ninth plague of darkness encompasses the land. When that plague ends, Pharaoh becomes even more defiant about not freeing the slaves, at which point Moses warns Pharaoh about the upcoming tenth plague, the death of the firstborn. The Torah then interrupts the narrative with the first mitzvah given to the Jewish people as a nation -- the sanctification of Rosh Chodesh (the new month), beginning with the month of Nisan. G-d teaches Moses about the Korban Pesach (Passover offering) and the remainder of the laws of the Passover holiday, which Moses then transmits to the Jewish people.

At midnight of the appointed night the plague strikes, with every non-Jewish first-born dying, including Pharaoh's own son. Pharaoh awakes, running through the streets (presumably while still in his pajamas) to tell Moses that he now consents to send the Jewish people from his country. The children of Israel travel forth in a hurry with the great wealth they have just been given by the Egyptians. The Torah portion concludes with various mitzvos relating to the Exodus.

Rabbinic Ruminations

The ultimate "back in my day" cliché was boasting about how difficult your walk to school was in the winter. "I had to walk a mile through a foot of snow." And some of us did -- until we moved to Los Angeles! But to say that snow-walking was a rough trek wouldn't be completely true: Stomping through thick powder was a joy as a child if you were fortunate to have a pair of Moon Boots (click the link for a history of Moon Boots). These puffy, comfy winter boots were all the rage in the 1970s and 1980s. The nylon marshmallows for your feet came in rainbow colors and made any kid feel like Neil Armstrong. You might not know it, but "Moon Boots" was not just a cute name. The retro winter wear was in fact inspired by the Apollo moon landing.

Fast forward to 2015: The Moon Boot is back in style. Here are a few fun facts about Moon Boots. 1) They are an Italian invention. Giancarlo Zanatta, a bootmaker from northern Italy, was visiting New York when he witnessed the moon landing on July 20, 1969. Upon returning, he commissioned the design team at his company Tecnica to create a boot inspired by the NASA look. 2) The Moon Boot hit the market in 1970. Eight years later, Tecnica trademarked the name Moon Boot. 3) They were intended as after-ski boots. The specialized sportwear broke out into the general market, perhaps because kids were so fascinated with outer space. 4) Tecnica has sold over 25 million pairs. 5) Moon Boots are considered high art by the Louvre Museum. In 2000, Paris' Louvre deemed the Moon Boot one of the 20th Century's major design symbols alongside the VW Beetle. So if you decide to relive your childhood and slip on a pair, consider yourself a connoisseur of the fine arts -- but not while walking in Los Angeles!

Fashion reflects one's identification and relationship with the outside world. Maintaining their distinctive dress in Egypt was one of the reasons that the Jews were found worthy of being rescued from slavery under Pharaoh. The Jewish dress code has always been influenced by the Torah from both a ritual and a general perspective, but most notably with an emphasis on modesty. Known as *tznius*, the Torah concept of modesty also embraces proper deportment in demeanor, speech, actions and possessions, as well as dress. True, clothes are not us; they do not define our soul. But clothes do serve to send a message as to our character. Are we modest, neat, respectful in our dress, and deportment? Do we maintain high standards of cleanliness, conducting our business in a dignified manner? Proper dress can be a vehicle to holiness.
