Beyond Twelve Gates Parshas Ki Seitzei September 17, 2016

"Do We Get Happier As We Age?"

The NFL season kicked off last Thursday, bringing a flurry of irrational rituals from players and fans with the power to drive a room full of scientists nuts. "The most superstitious people in the world are NFL players," claimed former New York Giants linebacker Brandon Short, who wore the same tee-shirt under his pads throughout his undefeated high school playing days, and halfway through college at Penn State. "Sports is superstition; it's ritual," says Short. "You do the same stuff over and over again, and if it works then don't change it." And that goes for fans too. A survey showed 65% of NFL fans practice a pregame ritual that they think brings their teams good luck, with 10% percent confessing to owning lucky underwear which they stash away for games.

For the title of 'Mr. Superstitious', though, few could claim to match the quirkiness of a former major league baseball player. While Kevin Rhomberg's brief stint with the 1982 Cleveland Indians was largely forgettable, his unusual superstition left behind a lasting legacy. Word of Rhomberg's shtick -- the 'obligation' to touch someone if they touched him -- quickly spread through the majors. According to one story, a teammate once reached under a bathroom stall to touch Rhomberg on the toe. Not knowing who the culprit was, Rhomberg went around the clubhouse and touched each player. Brook Jacoby tagged Rhomberg with a ball in the minors, then threw it out of the stadium. Jacoby said that Rhomberg spent two hours looking for the ball before finding it. An umpire once halted play during a game in New York to tell Yankees players to stop touching Rhomberg. If a person eluded his return touch, Rhomberg would send a letter that said, "This constitutes a touch."

Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "Shallow men believe in luck or in circumstance. Strong men believe in cause and effect." Moses instructed the Jewish people to reject all forms of superstition and methods of magically divining the future. *You shall follow Hashem your G-d whole-heartedly.* (Deut. 18:13). The commandments of the Torah are all based on G-d's revealing to us how he would like us to live our lives. Superstitions are simply baseless practices which futilely try to 'get around G-d' by manipulating the spiritual world that He created.

Parshas Ki Seitzei Deuteronomy 21:10 - 25:19

This week's Torah portion contains 74 mitzvos (commandments) -- more than 10% of the 613 mitzvos of the Torah. Among the highlights:

- -- Guidelines for treatment of captured female prisoners of war
- -- Treatment of the 'stubborn and rebellious son'
- -- Prohibition of wearing shatnez -- a mixture of wool and linen in the same garment
- -- The case of the defamation of a married woman
- -- Men are forbidden from wearing women's clothing and vice versa.
- -- Taking interest for lending to a Jew is forbidden
- -- The requirement of a get (bill of divorce) when divorce takes place
- -- The obligation to pay workers in a timely fashion (handymen, babysitters, etc.)
- -- Special consideration must be given to a widow and orphan

This power-packed Torah portion concludes with the command to remember the atrocities which the nation of Amalek (from whom Haman came) committed against us upon our exodus from Egypt.

Rabbinic Ruminations

Do people get happier or crankier as they age? In the game of life, is it all downhill as young adulthood turns into maturity? Despite our culture's youth obsession, a growing body of research has proven that we're wrong to think that happiness is correlated with youth. A recent study (Thomas et al., 2016) suggests that anxiety and depression *peak* in people's 20s and 30s, when we are generally thought to be in our prime. Professor Dilip Jeste, a senior author of the study, talking about younger people, said, "This 'fountain of youth' period is associated with far worse levels of psychological well-being than any other period of adulthood." The study's conclusions come from a survey of 1,546 randomly selected adults in San Diego County. Conversely, older participants reported that they felt better about themselves and their lives year upon year, decade after decade.

Other studies support the idea that happiness and aging go hand in hand. A large Gallup poll in 2010 found that 85-year-olds are generally more satisfied with themselves than 18-year-olds. As the Gallup poll found, happiness is likely to peak in young adulthood, hit a low point during the late 40s and 50s, and then increase again into later life and old age. "Mankind is wrong to dread aging," *The Economist* wrote, noting that happiness arcs through the average individual's lifespan. "Life is not a long slow decline from sunlit uplands towards the valley of death. It is, rather, a U-bend." Duke University economist Peter Ubel conducted a study in which he asked groups of 30-year-olds and 70-year-olds which age group (30 or 70) they thought would be happier. Both groups pointed towards the 30-year-olds, but when they rated their own happiness levels, the 70-year-olds scored higher.

The Torah considers old age a blessing. Throughout the Torah, "old" (*zakein*) is synonymous with "wise"; the Torah commands us to respect all elderly, regardless of their scholarship and piety, because the many trials and experiences that each additional year of life brings yield a wisdom which the most accomplished young prodigy cannot equal. It describes Abraham as one who "grew old and came along in days" (Genesis 24:1) -- his accumulated days, each replete with learning and achievement, meant that with each passing day his worth increased. Old age is regarded as one of the greatest blessings to be bestowed upon man.

Of course, all *adult* members of NHBZ that are in good standing with dues payments will have reserved seats for the High Holidays, whether on the individual plan, family plan, senior citizen plan or young adult plan.
