Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayers in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

How much is someone's happiness worth? Six years ago STAR-K, a non-profit agency representing kosher consumers, undertook the goal of trying to help singles in Baltimore. Offering a cash incentive of \$2500 to anyone who successfully arranged a *shidduch* (match)

for a woman in Baltimore's Orthodox community, STAR-K's initiative achieved stunning success. To date (pun intended), STAR-K has paid out \$320,000 for a total of 134 matches. One hundred and thirty four couples have found happiness because of someone's great idea, combined with the generosity of many others. The STAR-K *Shidduch* Incentive Program is a wonderful inspiration, and a reminder of the extent we are obligated to extend ourselves to help others find happiness.

Parshas Shemos Exodus 1:1 - 6:1



The book of Exodus begins by describing the gradually increasing enslavement of the Jewish people in Egypt. It was Pharaoh's plan that the backbreaking labor would stunt their rapid physical growth. Moses is born, and when his mother is unable to keep him hidden from the Egyptian authorities any longer she places him in a basket and sends him down the Nile River. He is found

by Pharaoh's daughter and raised in the royal palace. Already a grown man, Moses kills an Egyptian who he witnessed beating a Jew. Moses flees to the land of Midian and marries Zipporah, the daughter of Jethro, and they have two sons.

When Moses is shepherding his father-in-law's flock, G-d appears to him in a burning bush and tells him he will lead the Jewish people from Egypt. Initially reluctant, Moses is shown three miracles to perform before the Jewish people to prove he was sent by G-d. Moses, accompanied by his brother Aaron, encounters an obstinate Pharaoh. The Egyptian king not only refuses their request for a three-day respite to worship G-d, but even increases the slave's heavy workload. The portion concludes with the people complaining to Moses and Aaron for making their situation worse.
