

patronymic from a reduced form of the personal name <u>Abranam</u>. Abraham from the Hebrew personal name **Avraham**, borne by a Biblical patriarch revered by Jews as the founding father of the Jewish people (Genesis 11–25), and by Muslims as founder of all the Semitic peoples, both Hebrew and Arab (compare <u>Ibrahim</u>). The name is explained in Genesis 17:5 as being derived from Hebrew **avhamongoyim** 'father of a multitude of nations'.

Kaiser: German: from Middle High German *keiser* 'emperor', from the Latin imperial title *Caesar*. This was the title borne by Holy Roman Emperors from Otto I (962) to Francis II (who relinquished the title in 1806). Later, it was borne by the monarch of Bismarck's united Germany (1871–1918). It is very common as a German surname, originating partly as an occupational name for a servant in the Emperor's household, partly as a nickname for someone who behaved in an imperious manner.

Szus: suss? German (Süss) and Jewish (Ashkenazic): see <u>Suess</u>. Jewish (Ashkenazic): from the Yiddish personal name **Zus**, a pet form of <u>Sussman</u>. Suess German (Süss) and Jewish (Ashkenazic): nickname or Jewish omamental name from Middle High German, German **süss** 'sweet', 'pleasant', 'agreeable'. Jewish (Ashkenazic): from the Yiddish personal name **Zusman**, literally 'sweet man'.
