Beyond Twelve Gates – Parshas Vaeira Rabbi Ze'ev Smason – January 12, 2013

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates!

An 11-year-old Jewish girl has put a new 'spin' on table tennis. Estee Ackerman is a ping-pong phenom, ranked fourth nationally in her age bracket. But when a national championship match fell on a Friday night, she set aside her ambition and decided to put her faith first. Estee opted out of competing in the 2012 U.S. National Table Tennis Championships because the final match fell out on Shabbat.

Estee said that she was greatly disappointed to see that her match would be taking place on a Friday night, and therefore would not be able to compete. "Of course, I was disappointed, but my religion, Judaism, comes first." Estee's father said, "She had a Shabbos-over-sports moment . She had to withdraw from the event as tournament officials would not reschedule it for after Shabbos. The part which made it difficult was the fact that many thought she would have won if she had kept going."

Estee often competes against and beats ping-pong players twice her age and older. For now, Estee is looking toward the future and hopes to someday join the US Olympic table tennis team. "I hope to try out for the Olympic team and one day bring back a medal for my country," Estee said.

Albert Einstein once said, "What counts can't always be counted; what can be counted doesn't always count." Choosing between competing priorities is often difficult -- but it's crucial to put first things first. Where do Shabbat and Judaism rank in your order of priorities? "Hold on to the instruction of the Torah," said King Solomon in Proverbs, "do not let it go; guard it well, for it is your life."

Parshas Vaeira Exodus 6:2 -- 9:35

G-d assures Moses that He will indeed redeem the Jewish people from slavery and bring them into the land of Israel. After the Torah presents a detailed genealogy of the tribe of Levi (Moses' family), Moses and Aaron go before Pharaoh to request a three-day hiatus from work so that the Jewish people can worship G-d in the desert. Moses' staff is miraculously turned into a snake as a sign of their Divine mission. When the Egyptian sorcerers counter by transforming their staffs into snakes as well, Moses' staff swallows up theirs. Even so, Pharaoh adamantly refuses to free the Jewish people, and the series of ten gruesome plagues begins.

The first seven plagues are described in this week's Torah portion; blood, frogs, lice, a swarm of wild beasts, pestilence, boils and hail. Moses goes down to the river to speak to the Egyptian king -- however, Pharaoh remains in denial ('in d'Nile' -- get it?) continuing to refuse to free the Jewish people as his heart is hardened. The portion comes to a close in the middle of these momentous events.

Rabbinic Ruminations

At what age can an infant begin to learn? A recent study indicates that newborns can detect the difference in sounds between their native tongue and a foreign language. This suggests that language learning begins in utero. Forty babies were examined — an even mix of girls and boys — in Tacoma, Wash., and Stockholm, Sweden. At about 30 hours old, the infants in the study listened to vowel sounds in their native language and in foreign languages. The babies' interest in the sounds was measured by how long they sucked on a pacifier wired to a computer. The study found that in both countries, the infants listening to unfamiliar sounds sucked on the pacifier for longer than they did when exposed to their native tongue, suggesting they could differentiate between the two.

Lead author of the study, psychology professor Christine Moon, said the results show that fetuses can learn prenatally about the particular speech sounds of a mother's language. "This study moves the measurable result of experience with speech sounds from six months of age to before birth," Moon said. "The mother has first dibs on influencing the child's brain," researcher Patricia Kuhl, said. "The vowel sounds in her speech are the loudest units and the fetus locks onto them." Previous studies have indicated that newborns recognize piano melodies played when their mothers were pregnant, and the melody of the cry of infants differ based upon their mother's native tongue.

The Talmud relates that when the mother of Rabbi Yehoshua ben Chananya was pregnant, she would go around from one study hall to the next asking the sages to pray that her child grow up to be a scholar. Another

tradition is that she placed his crib near a study hall so that her son would hear nothing but words of Torah his entire life. In the early 1900s Rabbi Yisrael Meir Kagan, known popularly as the Chofetz Chaim, was asked by the Russian Minister of Education at what age Jewish parents begin to educate their children. The Chofetz Chaim replied: "Twenty years before a child is born." Don't wait for your child's Bar or Bas Mitzvah -- it is never too early to begin Jewish education.
