Beyond Twelve Gates

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates

One night in 2008, Kelly Hildebrandt was curious and bored. Wondering if anyone on Facebook shared her name, she typed it into the search engine on the social networking site, and up popped another Kelly Hildenbrandt. Kelly Katrina Hildebrandt sent newly-discovered Kelly Carl Hildebrandt a message. "She said, 'Hi. We had the same name. Thought it was cool,'" Kelly Carl said. "I thought she was pretty cute." The then-20 and 24-year-olds began to correspond. Emails led to phone calls, phone calls to visits, and the whirlwind romance led to an engagement ring hidden in a treasure box on a Florida beach. "He is just everything that I've ever looked for," Kelly Katrina said at the time. "There's always been certain qualities that a guy has to have. And he has all the ones I could think of - and more."

The two wed in 2009. But as time went on, the couple came to realize that sharing a name, blond good looks and worldwide attention was not enough to keep them together. "She's a Florida girl, and I'm a Texas guy," said Kelly Carl. "We really did come from pretty different worlds. How do they term it at the courthouse? 'Irreconcilable differences,' that is what I would say. We gave it our best shot." Their divorce hearing is still pending, and Kelly Carl has moved back home to Lubbock, Tex., with the couple's dog. "That's where all my connections are," he said. "It's been really great since I got back."

Many couples naively believe that "love conquers all." In reality, it is often not true. Too often a couple will fall in love and marry despite serious differences about religion, money, family, gender roles, or even the basic values of their partner. The Torah says, "Isaac then brought her [Rebekah] into the tent of his mother Sarah, and he took Rebekah as his wife. Isaac loved her, and thus found comfort after his mother's death." (Genesis 24:67) What is noteworthy is that the love came after the marriage -- not before. Jewish marriages are contracted not as a result of passion and romance, but as a result of good judgment and sound reason. If the couple is well suited, the marriage will result in love and happiness. Marriages based on pre-marital infatuation, however all too often fail the test of married life.

Parshas Beshalach Exodus 13:17 -- 17:16

As the Jewish people leave the land of Egypt, Pharaoh's heart is once again hardened. The Egyptian army pursues the former slaves, trapping them on the shores of the Red Sea. Moses raises his hand over the sea, miraculously parting the waters and allowing the Jewish people to pass through safely. Pursued by the Egyptians into the sea, Moses once again raises his hand and the waters come crashing down upon Pharaoh's army. Awed by this indisputable miracle, Moses leads the Jewish people in the Shir Shel Yam, a song of praise to G-d acknowledging a debt of gratitude for their remarkable salvation.

After traveling from the Red Sea, and following the miraculous sweetening of the bitter waters at Marah, the Jewish people complain to Moses and Aaron that they have no food to eat. G-d responds by providing a great test of faith; a daily ration of manna fell from the sky for forty years every morning, except for Shabbos. Some suggest that the manna was the greatest miracle the Jewish people ever experienced. A constant water source is also given when G-d commands Moses to strike a rock, miraculously causing water to flow from it. The portion concludes with the nation of Amalek's unprovoked sneak attack and the Jewish people's victory.

Rabbinic Ruminations

There are some things that you just don't see every day: A golfer's hole-in-one a sighting of Halley's Comet a Chicago Cubs World Series victory and a white blackbird. But last summer, a two-week old albino blackbird was found alone and unable to fly in a bush in England. The tiny pure white albino bird -- with red eyes -- was found by a passerby. The bird was taken to a wildlife rescue center and nicknamed "Wacky" by the staff, which nursed it back to health.

A bird that is albino (from the Latin albus, "white") has white feathers in place of colored ones on some portion of its body. Albinism is usually the result of a genetic mutation causing the absence of an enzyme essential for melanin synthesis. Partial albinism can result in the loss of pigments in local areas of the bird's body, such as certain feathers. A completely albino bird, such as Wacky, has a complete lack of melanin -- meaning it is pure white with red eyes.

Albino birds in the wild are quite rare; Serena Stevens, director of the wildlife rescue center that obtained Wacky, said, " 'I've only seen a photo in a book once before. The chances of us having one is so rare I don't think I'll ever get the chance to see one again in my lifetime." With poor eyesight and greater visibility, albino birds are easier targets for predators. Additionally, albinos are often harassed by their own species, and rarely breed because they are rejected by other birds.

Legend has the aged Diogenes searching with lanterns for something exceedingly rare: a man of truth. For Judaism, truth, *emes*, is more than just a virtue. It is one of the three fundamental principles, along with justice and peace, upon which the world stands. In the words of the Talmud, "The signature of the Holy one, blessed be He, is truth." A person who is scrupulous honesty is a rare bird; perhaps even more rare than Wacky the albino blackbird.
