Beyond Twelve Gates – Parshas Shemos Rabbi Ze'ev Smason – January 4, 2013

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates!

The ball zooms off Zohar Sharon's golf club and flies into the distance. Sharon can't see it, but he knows it's a good one and he flashes a big smile. Two strokes later, he has a birdie. Through incredible determination, Sharon has earned the title of the world's best blind golfer. Thousands of blind people around the world play golf, but only about a hundred play competitively. Over the past several years, Sharon has dominated them all. In 2005 he made headlines at home in Israel with a hole-in-one on the 15th hole at the Caeserea Golf Club, Israel's only 18-hole course. It was just one in a string of achievements for the 60-year-old Sharon, who was blinded in the army more than 30 years ago.

When he was finally discharged from service after the war, in his mid-20s, Sharon's world was constricted to the surroundings he could grope with his hands. Dismayed and depressed, he had to find a way to live with his condition. "You won't believe how convenient it is to dive into your own depression," he said, "...I decided I can do everything except for drive a car and fly a plane." True to his new-found conviction, Sharon became a painter. He started running 12 miles every day. He eventually joined Israel's goalball team and played in the 1996 Paralympic Games in Atlanta. But he was perpetually restless. He kept looking for that one big thing, his true calling—and he found it in the least expected place. Sharon says he plays golf six times a week, often 10 hours a day. The only day he takes off from the game is on Saturday. He's religiously observant. He always wears a yarmulke when he's in a tournament or playing with non-Jewish golfers. "I want people to know I'm Jewish," he says. "I want them to know what Jewish perseverance and courage is all about."

The Jewish People are called in the Torah a "stiff-necked people". It's a criticism, but it's also our strength. We don't give up. We keep trying. All other nations, exiled from their lands, vanished and became absorbed. We have stayed focused and remained true to our task. Because of that, we'll ultimately come to our complete success and perfection. And we will sanctify the name of G-d -- like the amazing Zohar Sharon.

Parshas Shemos Exodus 1:1 -- 6:1

The book of Exodus begins by describing the gradually increasing enslavement of the Jewish people in Egypt. Pharaoh, fearing the population explosion of the Jews, initially hopes that backbreaking labor would stunt their rapid physical growth. When their birth rate continues to increase he orders the Jewish midwives to kill all baby boys. Moses is born, and when his mother is unable to keep him hidden from the Egyptian authorities any longer she places him in a basket and sends him down the Nile River. He is found by Pharaoh's daughter and raised in the royal palace, even though she realizes he is a Hebrew. She names him Moshe (Moses) meaning "drawn from the water." Years later as a grown man, Moses kills an Egyptian who he witnessed beating a Jew. Moses flees to the land of Midian and marries Zipporah, the daughter of Jethro, and they have two sons.

When Moses is shepherding his father-in-law's flock, he witnesses the "burning bush" on Chorev (Mt. Sinai) where G-d commands him to lead the Jewish people from Egypt to the land of Israel, which G-d promised to their ancestors. Initially reluctant, Moses is shown three miracles to perform before the Jewish people to prove he was sent by G-d: Changing his staff into a snake, his healthy hand into a leprous one, and water into blood. Moses, accompanied by his brother Aaron, encounters an obstinate Pharaoh. The Egyptian king not only refuses their request for a three-day respite to worship G-d, but declares that the Jews must produce the same quota of bricks as before but without being given straw. The people complain to Moses and Aaron for making their situation worse, but G-d assures Moses that He will force Pharaoh to let the Hebrews leave.

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Rabbinic Ruminations

Can a Jellyfish unlock the secret of immortality? Certain scientists, futurists and philosophers have long theorized about the immortality of the human body. Some believe a breakthrough was unwittingly made by Christian Sommer, a German marine-biology student in his early 20s. In 1998 Sommer collected several tiny, relatively obscure hydrozoans known to biologists as *Turritopsis dohrnii*. Today it is more commonly known as the immortal jellyfish. Sommer kept them in petri dishes and observed their reproduction habits. After several days he noticed that his *Turritopsis dohrnii* were behaving in a very peculiar manner, for which he could hypothesize no earthly explanation. Plainly speaking, they refused to die. They appeared to age in reverse, growing younger and younger until they reached their earliest stage of development, at which point they began their life cycle anew.

Scientists have pointed out the high degree of genetic similarity between jellyfish and human beings. Further insights into *Turritopsis* could have profound implications for medicine, particularly the fields of cancer and longevity. Others make even grander claims. Marine biologist Shin Kubota says, "*Turritopsis* application for human beings is the most wonderful dream of mankind. Once we determine how the jellyfish rejuvenates itself, we should achieve very great things. My opinion is that we will evolve and become immortal ourselves." A fundamental law of the natural world — you are born, and then you die -- seems to have been called into question by the immortal jellyfish.

Claims of immortality should be met with great caution. The Jewish People, however, do not fit into standard rules of history. Mark Twain wrote an article in 1899 for Harper Magazine entitled, *Concerning the Jews.* Here is an excerpt:

"If the statistics are right, the Jews constitute but one percent of the human race ... Properly the Jew ought hardly to be heard of; but he is heard of; has always been heard of. He is as prominent on the planet as any other people . . . The Egyptian, the Babylonian, and the Persian rose, filled the planet with sound and splendor, then faded . . . the Greek and the Roman followed, and made a vast noise, and they are gone; other peoples have sprung up . . . and they sit in twilight now or have vanished. The Jew saw them all, beat them all, and is now what he always was . . . All things are mortal but the Jew; all other forces pass but he remains. What is the secret of his immortality?"
