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Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Salvador Dali once said, "Have no fear of perfection -- you'll never reach it." Last Saturday, a young tennis player from Kazahstan proved Dali wrong. Yaroslava Shvedova perfect absolutely at the beginning of her third-round match at Wimbledon last week -- 24 points played, 24 points won. Achieving the

"golden set" for a woman in the 44 years of professional tennis, Yaroslava won every point of the first set of what became a 6-0, 6-4 victory over French Open runner-up Sara Errani.

Of all the ways a point can be lost -- a double-fault, for example, or an opponent's ace; one ball that floats a half-inch wide or long or catches the tape of the net, say, or even a lucky shot off the other player's racket that somehow finds a line, etc., etc. -- none happened during Yaroslava's 15 minutes of fame.

Total perfection, of course, is not attainable. But if we chase perfection to become better Jews, we can catch excellence. The challenges of daily living are great. What is a tool, then, to "chase perfection?" King David said, "I place G-d before me always" (Psalm 16:8). By continually weighing the consequences of your words and actions, and consistently speaking and acting in accord with Torah ideals and standards, you'll constantly improve in the important areas of your life.

Parshas Pinchas - Numbers 25:10 - 30:1



In last week's Torah portion we found the Jewish hero Pinchas saving the day for the Jewish people by publicly executing the Jewish tribal head, Zimri, and his Midianite

girlfriend, Kazbi. Those two had desecrated the Name of G-d and His Torah by having relations in plain view of Moses and the entire Jewish leadership. (I suppose you could say it was the very first 'Kazbi

Show'.) This week, Pinchas is rewarded for sanctifying the Name of G-d and is granted the blessing of peace and priesthood (Kehuna). Pinchas' zealous response saves the Jewish people from a plague which had broken out in the camp.

Five righteous daughters of Tzelofchad file a claim with Moses: In the absence of a brother, they request their deceased father's share in the Land of Israel. Moses asks G-d for a ruling. The Almighty responds that the claim of these five women who so dearly love the Land of Israel is, indeed, just. Moses is told that he will ascend a mountain to view the Land that the Jewish people will soon inherit, though he will not be allowed to enter. Moses asks G-d to appoint a successor. Do you know who is chosen? Joshua, Moses' dedicated assistant and student. The Torah portion concludes with a lengthy description of the special offerings brought on various festivals. These sections are also read from the Torah throughout the year on the appropriate holidays.

Rabbinic Ruminations



Do you consider yourself superstitious? Sports people are notoriously superstitious. Throughout his entire career Michael Jordan wore his old blue University of North Carolina shorts underneath his National Basketball Association uniform, for good luck. Similarly, Serena

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Williams once admitted wearing the same pair of socks throughout a tennis tournament, and Tiger Woods wears a red shirt on tournament Sundays, which is usually the last (and critical) day of a golf tournament.

However, sports people aren't the only ones using superstitious thoughts and practices to gain "good luck." Indeed, many people develop and observe superstitions in their daily routines, such as crossing their fingers, knocking on wood, or carrying a lucky charm. Do superstitions work? A recent study has shown that some people make more successful putts when they are told that a golf ball is lucky, solve motor-dexterity puzzles better when experimenters make a "good luck" hand gesture, and shine on a

memory game when they are in the presence of their lucky charm. (Damisch et al., 2010)

Are superstitious practices "kosher"? The Torah is emphatic in demanding that we stay focused on our personal relationship with G-d. Judaism seeks to bring us closer to the Almighty through proper thought and deed. Superstitions -- irrational beliefs or practices that have a false conception of causation -- ignore G-d's involvement in our lives. The Torah says, "You must be wholehearted with the Lord your G-d" (Deut. 18:13). Leave the rabbit's foot, evil-eye bracelets and red string for others. Trust in G-d with all your heart, and in all your ways, acknowledge Him.

Question: What purpose does the repetition of the Shemoneh Esrei (Amidah) serve? -- submitted by Janet Haber

Answer: The original purpose of repeating the Amidah was so that if someone didn't know how to pray, they could hear the chazzan's repetition and fulfill in that way their obligation. Bear in mind that in earlier times, knowing how to pray meant a lot of memorization - written siddurim didn't appear until the 9th century. Fulfilling one's Amidah obligation would not 'work' for a person who does know how to pray on his own. Even when everyone in shul knows how to pray, though, the Sages' enactment of first reciting Shemoneh Esrei silently and then the chazzan repeating it out loud - still remains in effect, just in case an unlearned person shows up. Even though one may have said the Amidah on one's own, the repetition provides multiple opportunities to answer 'amen' to the various blessings. Each 'amen', responded thoughtfully, is credited as if one said the blessing again!

3 Weeks and 9 Days

The "Three Weeks" between the 17th of Tammuz and Tisha B'Av have been days of misfortune and calamity for the Jewish people throughout history. We minimize joy and celebration – we do not have weddings, listen to music, or shave and get haircuts.

On Shabbos during the Three Weeks, the Haftorahs are taken from chapters in Isaiah and Jeremiah dealing with the Temple's destruction and the exile of the Jewish people.

The period beginniing with Rosh Chodesh Av is called the "Nine Days." During this time, a stricter level of mourning is observed: we don't eat meat and wine (except on Shabbat) and we do not do laundry or wear freshly laundered clothes (except on Shabbat). We also do not bathe for pleasure, though it is permitted to bathe in cool water in order to remove dirt or perspiration.
