- Shabbos HaGodol Today is the Shabbos before Pesach. It commemorates the 10th day of Nissan, when the Hebrew slaves took the lambs that they were going to offer for Pesach and tied them up outside their homes, to keep until they offered them on the 14th of Nisan. This was a very dangerous thing to do, because Egyptians worshipped sheep; but miraculously, instead of slaughtering the Hebrews, the Egyptians fought with each other over whether the Hebrews should be sent away already. Some have the custom of reading a special haftorah today, Malachi 3:4 3:24, which tells about the return of Elijah the prophet and the coming of the Messiah. We believe that Elijah will return at Pesach, and that is why we include a cup of wine for him at the seder.

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

engaged in missions of anonymous acts of kindness, leaving small gifts for strangers and inspiring 'affiliated agents' around the world. The 'Secret Agent L' project has blossomed into an international

phenomenon, with over 1,600 Affiliated Agents sharing in the fun and selflessness around the world. Secret Agent L's colorful, fun website documents in words and photos her missions at a variety of locations (libraries, retail stores) leaving small books, tickets to shows and, often, cards and notes.

Laura loves the excitement of placing the gift, taking photos and sneaking away before being noticed—or before the gift is found. "I've never wanted to see who finds it; it's more fun to imagine," she says. Her e-mail address is printed on the trademark cards and notes she leaves with each gift, and occasionally recipients will e-mail her with their reactions. "This project is the greatest honor of my life," she says. "Every mission touches my heart ... I feel so incredibly blessed to be a part of this international kindness movement. I truly believe this is my life's work."

The Torah begins with an act of kindness: G-d clothed Adam and Eve. And the Torah ends with an act of kindness: G-d personally carried Moses to his final resting place and and buried him there. *Chesed*, the Hebrew word for loving-kindness, is a central Torah value and a foundation of a meaningful Jewish life. The quality of our *chesed* increases exponentially when performed anonymously. Wherever there is a human being, there is an opportunity for kindness. Kindness, like a boomerang, always returns -- particularly in the form of the pleasure we receive when we give to others.

Parshas Acharei Mos: Leviticus 16:1 - 18:30 & Passover ♪

Acharei Mos begins with a lengthy description of the special Yom Kippur service to be performed in the Mishkan by



the Kohen Gadol. The service included the lottery selection from amongst two identical goats, one of which would become a national sin offering and the other which would be pushed off a cliff in the desert as the bearer of the people's sins (the 'scapegoat'). We

also find described the command that Yom Kippur and its laws of fasting and refraining from work be observed eternally by the Jewish people as a day of atonement. Acharei Mos concludes with a listing of the immoral and forbidden sexual relationships, and the command that the Jewish people maintain and ensure the holiness of the land of Israel.

This coming Monday evening, April 18, begins the major festival of Passover. Passover, known in Hebrew as Pesach, is a national birthday party; it was then that the 'Children of Israel' --- who later became the 'People of Israel' -- began their march through history with the exodus from Egypt. Passover is the celebration of the beginning of our mission to become a 'Light unto the nations.' May you and your families have a meaningful and joyous holiday.

On the first day of Passover, Tuesday, the Torah reading is from Exodus 12:21-51. This reading describes the Exodus from Egypt and the Passover offering. On the second day of Passover, Wednesday, the Torah reading is from Leviticus 22:26 -- 23:44. This reading describes journeying to the Holy Temple in Jerusalem on the three pilgrimage festivals (Passover, Shevous, Sukkos) and the counting of the Omer.

Rabbinic Ruminations

Wetsuits have been in use since the early 1950s. The



wetsuit, made of foamed neoprene, has become an important part of the gear for divers, surfers, and other cold-water sports enthusiasts. The concept of a wetsuit is that it provides thermal insulation through

bubbles of gas enclosed within the wetsuit material, which reduces its ability to conduct heat. The wetsuit also provides abrasion resistance and buoyancy. Over the years, technological advances have led to different types of wetsuits made for different uses and for different temperatures. The wetsuit is an impressive invention -- but not quite as impressive as our own 'miracle garment' -- our skin.

Skin, the largest organ of your body, doesn't just cover you. It functions as protective wrapping. Along with a layer of fat underneath, it insulates you against all kinds of bumps, bangs and wear and tear. It keeps germs and water OUT and keeps your body's fluids and salts IN. In the course of a lifetime we shed our skin a

thousand times, shedding over 40 lb. Skin is alive. It's made of many thin sheets of layers of flat, stacked cells in which are found nerves, blood vessels, hair follicles, glands and sensory receptors. Older cells are constantly being pushed to the surface by new cells which grow from below. When the old ones reach the top, they end up popping off like tiles blown from a roof in a strong wind. In fact, every minute 30,000-40,000 dead skin cells fall from your body. In approximately a month's time, your body has made a whole new layer of skin cells. "Mah Rabu Ma'asecha, HaShem" -- G-d, how great are your works!"

From the desk of

Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

"Gut Yom Tov" means happy holiday. "Gut Pesach" means happy Passover. "Gut yahr" means have a happy year. The inherent optimism of Judaism, recognized universally, is on display on this Yom Tov. From where does this optimism on Pesach come?

Pesach is an "up" holiday. On it, families gather in unusually large numbers with extended family and invited guests, and together read the Haggadah. The Haggadah is a beloved text among the Jewish people, and it describes the strenuous and tragic details of slavery and of the freedom from Egyptian slave-masters. None-theless, it is the optimism that we survived then and can survive another travesty, that makes it a celebration of freedom and survival. "B'chol Dor va'dor," in every generation, the Haggadah tells us, we confront major enemies, and folded into that message, is that in every generation we have nonetheless succeeded. Even beyond the Seder optimism can be felt at this time of year. Pesach occurs in the month of Nisan — the month of aviv, springtime. Spring is a time of warmth and renewal of beauty and fragrance. There's even a special brocha said in the month of Nisan to be recited when first seeing blossoms of fruit trees. The weather in St. Louis — and certainly in Israel — is usually glorious at this time. Warm but not hot, and the smells and sights of springtime and renewed life fill our souls. In Shir HaShirim, King Solomon described it thusly: "the times of the rain are passed, the time of the songbird has arrived, the blossoms of the trees are seen throughout the land." Aren't these sights and sounds real and present before our eyes at this time of year?


