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Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Did you work hard today? Before patting yourself on the back, consider the workday of many birds. The thrush arises at 2:30 each morning, rolls up his sleeves (figuratively, that is) and doesn't stop until 9:30 at

night. During his nineteen hour workday he feeds his voracious young two hundred and six times. The blackbird starts work at the same time as the thrush, but his whistle blows at 7:30. During his seventeenhour day he sets about one hundred meals before his kiddies. The indefatigable titmouse is up and about at three in the morning, and his stopping time is nine at night. A fast worker, the titmouse is said to feed his young four hundred and seventeen meals - mostly of caterpillar - in the long, hard, hot day.

Judaism emphasizes the value of work. A parent is obligated to teach or to see that his child learns a trade. If a parent does not do this, it is as if he taught the child to be a thief. One should never consider himself too great or too important to work, and understand that even continued success in one's Torah studies depends on one's being engaged in work. One who benefits from his own hard work is greater than one who is a *Yirah Shomayim*, a G-d revering person. Don't be like the person who says, "I love work - I could watch it all day long!" As Ethics of the Fathers (1:10) teaches, "Love work."

Parshas Shemini - Leviticus 9:1 - 11:47



This week's Torah portion begins by discussing the events which occurred on the eighth and final day of the inauguration service of the Mishkan. After months of preparation, Aaron and his sons are finally installed as Kohanim in an elaborate service.

Aaron blesses the people, and the entire nation rejoices as G-d's presence rests upon them. However, the excitement comes to an abrupt halt as Aaron's two eldest sons, Nadav and Avihu, are consumed by a heavenly fire in the Mishkan while innovating an offering of incense on the altar. This incident stresses the need to perform the commandments only as G-d directed. Later, Moses consoles Aaron, who grieves in silence.

Have you ever wondered where the laws of kosher food come from? Parshas Shemini concludes with a listing of the kosher and non-kosher animals. The identifying signs of a kosher land animal are that it has split hooves and chews, regurgitates and re-chews its food. A kosher fish is one that has both fins and scales. All birds not included in the list of forbidden fowl are permitted. However, today the identities of these non-kosher birds are doubtful. Therefore, we're forbidden to eat any species of bird unless there is a well-established tradition that it is kosher. The Torah forbids all types of insects except for four species of locusts. Chocolate-covered grasshoppers, anyone? The laws of kashrut help us to be separate and holy -- like G-d, Himself.

Rabbinic Ruminations



Have you ever had the experience of a headache that improves within seconds of taking a pain pill? The relief you felt wasn't likely due to the medication, given that it may take at least 15 minutes to kick in. What

was at work was the placebo effect: your mind knows you've taken a pill, so you feel better. 'Placebo' is the Latin word for "I shall please." Some studies suggest a placebo of salty water can be as powerful as morphine. Other studies suggest that 80% of the power of Prozac is placebo.

How can a simulated or otherwise medically ineffectual treatment for a disease or other medical condition work? Is it simply the effect of believing the treatment will help? Does it matter how much you believe? Is it the fact that you get them from a doctor who tells you they will help? While many questions about the dynamics of the placebo effect remain unanswered, the placebo effect certainly points to the importance of perception and our brain's role in physical health. The human mind is incredibly powerful -- we don't always get what we expect but what we expect can have a very powerful role in how our reality unfolds.

Just as our physical health is dependent on the connection between our limbs and nervous system, the health of our neshama (soul) is dependent on maintaining a strong connection to its Divine lifesource. If this connection is compromised due to neglect, a person loses spiritual functionality. Through

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a balanced diet of Torah, a regular regimen of mitzvah exercise and immersion in a Jewishly-committed life, our connection to our Source will be maintained.

Question: What is a Zimun?

Answer: When three or more males over the age of thirteen join together to eat a meal with bread, they do not say Bircas HaMazon ('Bentching', or Grace) individually. Rather, they join together as a unit where one recites and the others respond. There is spiritual strength in numbers, particularly in communal prayer. This convening of those present for the purpose of Bentching is called a *zimun*. The word *zimun* means 'invitation'.

The format of a zimun is that two 'invitations' are offered by the one leading Bentching. The first invitation - simply a call to attention - is *Rabosai, nevariech* ("Gentleman, let us bless"). One may use the word *chaverai* ("friends") in place of *rabosai.* The second invitation, and how the respondents answer each invitation, can be found in a siddur or Bentching booklet. Three or more women dining together may and, even should, make a *zimun*.
