Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as '*The Ari*'. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Jiroemon Kimura of Kyoto, Japan, the world's oldest living man, celebrated his 115th birthday last week. According to researchers he is not only the world's oldest living man, but is the third-oldest man in modern recorded history. The

supercentenarian - someone who is 110 or older - has fathered 7 children (5 are still alive), has 14 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren, and 13 greatgreat-grandchildren.

"I'm delighted beyond words," Mr. Kimura said of his milestone. Mr. Kimura is one of only 70 verified supercentenarians alive today, and is the last known living man who was verifiably born before the year 1900. Mr. Kimura says eating small portions of food has been his secret to longevity. The world's oldest man was active for much of his life, having worked for the post office for 40 years and turned to farming until age 90 after retirement. He wakes up early in the morning and reads newspapers with a magnifying glass, and enjoys watching televised sumo wrestling matches and talking to guests.

Few are granted the gift of exceptional longevity. For each of us, though, time is our greatest asset and blessing. Even a moment of life can have great spiritual value. Psalm 90:12 says, "Teach us to number our days that we may gain a heart of wisdom." May the Almighty grant us the understanding to value our days -- and even to value each and every second.

Parshas Tazria/Metzora Leviticus 12:1 - 15:33



Parshas Tazria describes in great detail the varying manifestations of the disease called tzara'as. Although it has commonly been mistranslated as leprosy, this skin disease bears little resemblance to any bodily ailment

transmitted through normal exposure. Rather, tzara'as is the physical manifestation of a spiritual malaise, a punishment from G-d primarily for the sin of speaking loshon hara. "Loshon hara", meaning literally 'the evil tongue', is often translated as 'gossip'. However, loshon hara is the Hebrew term for derogatory speech that is true. "Motzei shem rah" refers to derogatory speech about others that is false and slanderous. The metzora (one diagnosed with tzara'as) was to be sent into isolation, tear his garments, and to call out 'contaminated, contaminated!' Since he abused his power of speech, sowing strife and distancing people from one another, it was fitting that he too should suffer the effects of isolation. Parshas Metzora continues the discussion of tzara'as, detailing the purification process of the metzorah. Tzara'as could afflict ones clothing and home, and necessitate the burning of ones clothes and demolishing of ones home if the disease spread. The various punishments recorded in the Torah are not intended to serve as revenge for the sin; they are measures that will hopefully restore the person to the correct path.

Rabbinic Ruminations



When temperatures get cold, wise motorists put antifreeze in their radiators. Incredibly, many insects prepare for the cold by making their

own antifreeze. Their antifreeze is glycerol (glycerin), a chemical closely resembling ethylene glycol, an organic compound widely used as an automotive antifreeze. Glycerol gives the insect body "supercooling" ability, allowing body fluids to drop below freezing points without causing ice damage. Glycerol also lowers the freezing point, making insects more cold-tolerant.

Biochemist Fred Smith of the University of Minnesota found that hibernating adult ants have as much as 10 per-cent glycerol in their bodies, but when the ants were gradually warmed up and became active, all of it disappeared. Chilling the ants for a few days at a temperature just above the freezing point restored the glycerol again. Ants of the same species found in warmer Maryland had no glycerol in them. But when taken to Minnesota they did as Minnesota ants do, secreting their personal antifreeze against the cold.

All creation, with its complexity and wonder, was designed to inspire and lead us to love G-d. On Thursdays we recite Chapter 81 of Psalms, "Sing out to the God of our strength," for on this day birds and fish were created to praise G-d's Name. It is not the birds and fish themselves which sing G-d's praises; rather when people observe the birds and fish, they give praise to the One Who created them. Careful contemplation of the cooling system of the insect will lead one to proclaim, "Mah Rabu Ma'asecha, HaShem - G-d, how great are your works!"

Question: Why do we give *tzedaka* at daily services?

Answer: A verse in Psalms (17:15) says: "I shall behold Your face in *righteousness*,", which may also be read as "with *tzedaka*." The act of tzedaka, even a modest one, was seen as a key of admission to the Divine Presence. This is the background for the almost universal practice of passing around a *tzedaka* (charity) box during weekday services into which worshipers drop one or more coins. In some shuls, the gabbai will go up and down the aisles with the *tzedaka* box (*pushke* in Yiddish) either during the preliminary service or during the repetition of the Amidah.

The purpose is not so much to raise significant sums for the shul as it is to provide the worshiper an opportunity to engage in an act which signifycantly enhances his or her prayer experience. Collecting *tzedaka* in never done on Shabbos or Yom Tov since it is forbidden to handle money on these days. However, one may *pledge tzedaka*, especially on the High Holy days and at Yizkor.

What is something about you that most people don't know?


I have two beautiful daughters. Brandy is 31 and works at Busch Stadium. Tara is 35 and I just reunited with her. :)


