Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as '*The Ari*'. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Rarely do promises of "the best deal in history" pan out. But an online shopper recently bought a BMW at a too-goodto-be true price that was really true -- \$1. A car dealership in

New Zealand frequently offers cars on online auction sites, allowing the vehicles to sell at any price the market demands. In the case of a certain BMW, however, a \$1 figure was erroneously entered as a minimal sale price. Before the dealership could realize its mistake, a buyer wound up getting the deal of his or her life: a 1994 BMW 320i for \$1. The \$1 sale was most definitely an unintended mistake -- the car in question was worth the equivalent of \$2,400. Still, the sale was honored because, according to dealership manager Mike Nokes, "we are firm believers in the auction process and for it to be fair to buyers and sellers alike."

The giving of the Torah to the Jewish people 3300 years ago was, in a spiritual sense, "the best deal in history." Is it appropriate to refer to the gift of the Torah as a "deal"? Certainly! After all, Jewish mothers in Eastern Europe used to serenade their sons to sleep with a Yiddish lullaby entitled "*Torah ist dabeste schorah* - Torah is the best merchandise." Rabbis, heads of yeshivos, and teachers used to wish that their sons would remain "in the family business." And as said in the words of King David, "The Torah of Your mouth is better for me, than thousands in gold and silver." (Psalm 119:72) G-d gave us "the best deal in history" when He gave us the Torah.

· Don't imitate the ways of the nations surrounding

- A false prophet who attempts to entice you to idolatry should be put to death
- Since the Torah is complete and perfect, nothing may be added to or subtracted from it
- Self infliction of wounds on the body as a sign of mourning is prohibited
- As a holy people, refrain from eating 'non-kosher' food
- Be particularly warm-hearted and charitable. Many laws and guidelines concerning tzedakah (right-eous giving) are found in this week's portion
- The three pilgrimage festivals (Passover, Shavous and Sukkos) are opportunities to ascend (make aliyah) to Jerusalem and the Temple to celebrate our blessings

Rabbinic Ruminations



"Calm down," Alex, told Irene. "Don't tell me to calm down," Irene snapped at Alex -- though Alex would often tell her, "I love you." Irene and Alex squabbled like an old married couple. But they were hardly together as man and wife. Dr. Irene Pepperberg is an animal psychologist, initially at the

University of Arizona, and later at Harvard and Brandeis Universities. Alex (an acronym for **A**vian Learning **EX**periment) was an African Grey Parrot that died in 2007.

Alex had a vocabulary of about 150 words, and was exceptional in that he appeared to have understanding of what he said. For example, when asked what color corn was, Alex answered yellow, even though there was no corn around. This meant, Dr. Pepperberg said, that he had an abstract concept of what the words "color," "corn" and "yellow" mean. Alex had not simply memorized them, but was able to apply them to different objects. He could understand that a key was a key no matter what its size or color, and could figure out how the key was different from others. If Alex said "Wanna banana," but was offered a nut instead, he stared in silence, asked for the banana again, or took the nut and threw it at the researcher.

Dr. Pepperberg's work with Alex indicated that birds

may be able to reason on a basic level and use words creatively. These assertions became part of a highly emotional debate about whether thought is solely the domain of humans, or whether it can exist in other animals. Whether Alex was a thinking bird, or just another birdbrain, in one aspect man is above all other species of existence: we have a *neshama*, or soul. Our soul enables us to identify the difference between right and wrong, and to bear moral culpability for our choices. It is in this way we were created *B'Tzelem Elokim* -- in the image of G-d.

Question:

Why do we cover our eyes when we say the Shema in the evening and morning Shema, but not during the Shema in the Kedusha of Musaf? (asked by Alan Haber)

<u>Answer</u>:

When saying the evening and morning Shema, we fulfill one of the 613 mitzvos; namely, the recitation of the Shema. To observe the mitzvah properly, we cover our eyes to be able to focus and concentrate properly in proclaiming this all-important declaration of belief in the unity of G-d. I n other words, closing our eyes enhances our concentration.

Shema was inserted in the Musaf Kedusha through a rabbinical decree. In the 5th century non-Jewish governments put "spies" in synagogues to ensure that no one said Shema. At the end of davening, when the spies were gone, the Shema could then be said in the Kedusha of Musaf. Today, the Shema in the Musaf Kedusha remains as a remembrance to the original rabbinic decree, but no longer fulfills the basic mitzvah of reciting the Shema. Thus, there is no reason to cover our eyes when saying it.
