



Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Dorrie Aber-Noyek has volunteered at a hospital in Florida for 37 years. She walks at a brisk pace, delivering mail to patients as she rolls her cart down the corridor. Hospital

volunteers are commonplace, but what makes Dorrie unusual is that on August 5 she celebrated her 104th birthday. The spry centenarian lives by herself, and other than a bit of arthritis and slightly imperfect vision and hearing, she says she's in perfect health. When asked for her secret to such a long life, she shrugs her shoulders. It's not her diet -- she eats a piece of cake or a cookie (or two) every day (her favorite is chocolate chip). It's not her physical activity -- while she's always enjoyed walking, she never belonged to a gym or worked out regularly.

A new study suggests Dorrie Aber-Noyek is typical of what scientists call "super agers." The research found that people who live to be 95 or older do not tend to have lived a healthier lifestyle than others who died earlier. 477 healthy Ashkenazi Jews between the ages of 95 and 112 were asked about their lifestyle habits when they were 70 years old. More than 40% said they were obese or overweight, about 35% smoked and very few exercised. What this shows is that it really is the genes that helped the centenarians. To dramatically increase your chances of exceptional longevity -- chose your parents well!

We can't, of course, choose our parents. But we *can* choose to thank them and honor them for all they have done for us. Jewish tradition teaches that the root of the mitzvah 'Honor Your Father and Mother' is due to the great gift our parents gave each of us -- the gift of life. And that's something you don't have to be a 'super-ager' to be thankful for.

Parshas Eikev – Deuteronomy 7:11 – 11:25



Moses continues to encourage the Children of Israel to trust in G-d and in the prosperity and health which will follow if they keep the Torah. If they are careful to observe even those 'minor'

mitzvos that are usually 'trampled' underfoot, he

promises that they will be the most blessed of the nations of the Earth. Moses reminds them of their numerous transgressions in the desert, including the mystifying sin of the Golden Calf. Moses describes the bountiful Land of Israel filled with wheat, barley, grapes, figs and pomegranates, a land of oil-yielding olives and date-honey. He teaches the people the second paragraph of the *Shema* which stresses the fundamental doctrine of reward for keeping the mitzvos and the consequences of non-compliance. All that G-d requires of us, Moses says, is to love G-d, revere Him, and to observe His Torah. Easier said than done! Parshas Eikev concludes with the promise that G-d will provide the Jewish people with protection if they observe the laws of the Torah.

Many are familiar with the famous phrase (found in this week's portion), "Man does not live by bread alone." The less-familiar second half of the verse says, ".. but by all that comes from the mouth of G-d." This important idea teaches that physical nourishment and external pleasures aren't sufficient for a satisfied life. Every human being has spiritual needs that must also be met.

Rabbinic Ruminations



In a week of whiplash, global financial markets experienced one of the most volatile streaks in history. Last week marked the first time in the Dow Jones Industrial Average's 115-year history that it moved by more than 400 points for four consecutive days. The market's

swings were "ferocious", said David Schiff, head of stock trading at J.P. Morgan Investment Management. "We have been telling our clients to expect volatility, but we didn't expect this," said one portfolio manager. "This is a herd of animals that gets spooked and runs one way, then another."

Wall Street turbulence, though disconcerting, may affect more than your financial bottom line. A recent Chinese scientific study linked stock market volatility to deaths from heart disease. The study found that either highs or lows in the market increase the risk of death from acute heart disease: Every 100 point change of the Shanghai Composite Index corresponded to a 5.17 percent increase in heart disease deaths.

Some might suggest that the best way to relieve the distress caused by stock volatility is to hide in a cave. But the recent wild ride on Wall Street is just one instance of the vicissitudes of daily living. Material and spiritual concerns, big and small, can challenge our physical and mental health. The Torah, however, suggests that we can master our emotions. In a familiar prayer of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur we state that G-d determines "... who will live, and who will die ... who will become wealthy, and who will become poor." While simultaneously accepting that 'G-d helps those who help themselves', belief that the Master of the Universe is orchestrating all things may be just the stress-buster those who follow Wall Street need.
