Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as 'The Ari'. There exist twelve gates of prayers in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Parshas Vayigash Genesis 44:18 - 47:27

Judah makes an impassioned plea to the powerful Egyptian ruler (Joseph, still in disguise) for Benjamin's life, claiming that Jacob would surely die from sorrow if he lost Benjamin. Judah offers to remain in Egypt as a slave in place of his younger brother. Unable to restrain himself any longer, Joseph reveals his identity to his stunned brothers and forgives them for selling him into slavery so many years before.

Joseph then sends his brothers back to the land of Israel, laden with gifts, to bring Jacob and their families down to Egypt where they will live in the province of Goshen. Before Jacob leaves home, G-d

appears to him in a 'vision of the night', reassuring him that He will be with them and that they will eventually return to the land of Israel as a great nation. After 22 years of separation, Jacob is reunited with his beloved son Joseph. Joseph embraces his father and weeps, overflowing with joy, and then brings his father to meet Pharaoh.

The portion concludes by describing how Joseph uses his vast power to amass nearly all of the wealth of Egypt for Pharaoh's treasury.

Rabbinical Ruminations



At what point must one give up hope? Three teens who had been missing in the South Pacific for 50 days — and were already eulogized in a memorial service — were found alive last month by a New Zealand fishing boat. The boys — two 15-year-olds and a 14-year-old — disappeared while attempting to row between two islands, and

were given up for dead after an extensive search involving New Zealand's air force. Their craft had drifted 800 miles to a desolate part of the Pacific when the crew of a tuna boat saw them frantically waving for help. The rescue came not a moment too soon: the boys had begun to drink sea water because it hadn't rained in the past few nights. A rescuer said that the boys survived by catching fish and eating a seagull that had landed on their boat.

Tanu Filo, the father of one boy, said the news was broken by one of the teens' grandmother after she had a phone call from the fishing boat. "It's a miracle, it's a miracle. The whole village, the whole village, they were so excited and cried and they sang songs and hugging each other ... Everybody was yelling and shouting the good news," he told Radio New Zealand International.

The Talmud states, "Even if a sharp sword is placed against the neck of a person, he should not abandon hope for mercy." We live in frightening times, and occasionally encounter situations that seem to be hopeless. However, hopelessness is not a Jewish characteristic. Faith and trust in G-d means that we never stop believing that we have options -- if only, to turn to our Father in heaven for help and salvation.
