Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as 'The Ari'. There exist twelve gates of prayers in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Graciousness can pay priceless dividends. And it doesn't cost a thing. Karl Malone, the 6-foot-9, 256 pound former All-Star forward for the NBA's Utah Jazz, was at the Salt Lake International Airport baggage carousel waiting for his brother to arrive. A woman approached him and, as Malone was quoted, "said she needed a porter-boy. You know, someone to help her with her bags."

Malone was a wealthy and world-famous athlete at the time. He could easily have hurt the woman's feelings, rebuked her. But what did he do? Malone carried the woman's bags all the way to her car -- a blue Mercedes. Only when she reached for her purse to give him a tip did he in a friendly manner introduce himself and decline the offer.

Being gracious and selfless can turn any pauper into a prince. Become a class act by valuing and respecting the feelings of others.

Parshas Ki Sisa: Exodus 30:11 - 34:35

The portion begins with G-d's command to Moses to take a census by collecting an equal contribution of a half-shekel coin from every adult male between the ages of 20 and 60, with the profits going to the *Mishkan* (Tabernacle). G-d designates Bezalel, of the tribe of Judah, and Oholiav, of the tribe of Dan, to supervise the upcoming construction of the *Mishkan*. The mitzvah of Shabbat is then repeated to caution the nation that even the construction of the Mishkan does not supersede the observance of the weekly day of rest.



The Torah returns to the narrative of the Revelation at Mt. Sinai and describes the horrible sin of the golden calf. G-d relents to Moses' prayer that the Children of Israel should be spared from annihilation for this great transgression, and

Moses descends from the mountain with the two tablets of the Ten Commandments in hand. Upon witnessing a segment of the the population dancing around the golden calf, Moses smashes the tablets and burns the idol, initiating the process of repentance. Moses again ascends the mountain to pray to G-d that the Jewish people should be forgiven and regain their status as the chosen people. Moses eventually returns with the second set of tablets and a renewed covenant with G-d, his face radiant as a result of the Divine experience.



Blowing up in anger can seriously damage our relationships, our health, and rob us of peace of mind and the joy of life.

We may not have complete control of our destiny, but we do have control over our perception of our suffering. True strength is the ability to control one's anger.

- 1. Give Charity to the Poor (Mitzvah of Matanot l'Evyonim)
 - Here are some ways to fulfill the mitzvah of giving charity to the poor on Purim.
 - Od Yosef Chai For several years, NHBZ has collected money to give to Od Yosef Chai, an organization that distributes money to the poor in Israel.
