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# Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

#### Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Sam Schmid, a college student from Arizona, was critically wounded in an October 19 fivecar accident. Believed to be brain dead and poised to be an

organ donor, Schmid astounded doctors by recovering from traumatic brain injuries just hours before doctors were considering taking him off life support. The 21-year-old's brain injuries were so severe that the local hospital could not treat him. He was airlifted to a Neurological Institute where specialists performed surgery for a life-threatening aneurysm.

As hospital officials broached the subject of organ donation with his family, Sam began to respond, holding up two fingers on command. Today, he is walking with the aid of a walker, and his speech, although slow, is clear and has improved. His mother, Susan, a Christian, said, "I tell everyone, if they want to call it a modern-day miracle, this is a miracle. I have friends who are atheists who have called me and said, 'I am going back to church.'"

Schmid's doctor, renowned neurosurgeon Dr. Robert Spetzler, agreed that his recovery was miraculous. "I am dumbfounded with his incredible recovery in such a short time," said Dr. Spetzler. "His recovery was really remarkable considering the extent of his lethal injuries. It looked like all the odds were stacked against him."

Pearl S. Buck said, "All things are possible until they are proved impossible and even the impossible may only be so, as of now." We live in frightening times, and occasionally encounter situations that seem to be hopeless. However, hopelessness is not a Jewish characteristic. Faith and trust in G-d mean we never stop believing there exist options - if only, to turn to our Father in heaven for help and salvation. In the words of the Talmud, "Even if a sharp sword is placed against the neck of a person, he should not abandon hope for mercy."

### Parshas Terumah Exodus 25:1 - 27:19

Parshas Terumah begins a series of four out of five portions which discuss in detail the construction of the *Mishkan*, the traveling Tabernacle which would serve as a 'resting place' for G-d's presence amongst the Jewish people. This week's portion recounts G-d's



description to Moses of how to construct the *Mishkan*, beginning with a listing of the various precious materials to be collected from the Jewish people for this monumental project. G-d describes the

magnificent golden and wooden Ark which would house the tablets of the Ten Commandments, complete with its dazzling cover depicting two cherubim (angels with faces of children) facing each other. Next, G-d provides Moses with the blueprints of the *shulchan* (holy table) upon which the *lechem hapanim* (showbread) would be placed each week. Following the description of the pure golden menorah which was to be hammered from one large piece of gold, G-d describes the structure of the *Mishkan* itself. It contained splendidly woven and embroidered covers, curtains and partitions, and the sturdy outer walls. The Torah portion concludes with instructions for the copper altar and the *Mishkan's* large outer courtyard.

#### Rabbinic Ruminations



One of the simplest methods for beating procrastination in almost any task was inspired by Russian psychologist Bluma Zeigarnik's visit to an Austrian restaurant in the 1920s. Bluma noticed an odd thing about the waiters; they seemed to only remember orders which were in the

process of being served. When completed, the orders disappeared from their memory. Back in her lab, Bluma decided to test a theory. She asked participants to do several simple tasks, like solving puzzles or stringing beads. However, some of the time they were interrupted half way through the task. Afterwards she asked them which activities they remembered doing. People were about twice as likely to remember the tasks during which they'd been interrupted than those they completed.

What does this have to do with procrastination? Almost sixty years later Kenneth McGraw and colleagues carried out another test of the *Zeigarnik Effect*. In it participants had to do a tricky puzzle; except they were interrupted before any of them could solve it and told the study was over. Despite this, nearly 90% carried on working on the puzzle anyway. Though Bluma Zeigarnik may not have gotten her

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coffee cup refilled following her meal, she did get into the annals of psychology. She theorized that an incomplete task or unfinished business creates "psychic tension" within us. This tension acts as a motivator to drive us toward completing the task or finishing the business. Just get started ...and vou'll be driven to seek closure.

One of the biggest obstacles to personal growth is procrastination. We have a tendency to push off working on changing, and tell ourselves that we will eventually work on self-improvement. It may be that the only time we can really change is the present. We should accustom ourselves to saying the famous words of Hillel (Ethics of the Fathers 1:14), "And if not now, when?"

**Question:** Why do we dip our challah in salt? Must we do this just on Shabbos, or whenever we eat bread?

#### Answer:

Our table is considered an altar (see Ezekiel 41:22 and Ethics of our Fathers 3:3), and in the Holy Temple, salt was offered together with every sacrifice (Leviticus 2:13). Therefore, dipping our challah in salt reminds us that the meal we are about to eat should have both a physical **and** a spiritual focus. Every Jewish meal should be accompanied by words of Torah -- and on Shabbos, traditional singing. Why was salt used in the Temple? Salt never spoils or decays, therefore, it is symbolic of our eternal covenant with G-d. Additionally, salt adds taste to everything. Our bond with G-d adds meaning and flavor to every moment of our lives. We **always** dip the bread in salt, not only on Shabbos.

# Next Week is Shabbos Zachor (Sabbath of Remembrance – March 3)

Shabbos Zachor is the Shabbos before Purim. We read a special Maftir, Deuteronomy 25:17-19. which describes the attack by Amalek, and we are commanded to remember what Amalek did to us, and to blot out memory of Amalek. In the related haftorah next week (I Samuel 15), King Saul is ordered to kill the men, women, children and cattle of Amalek. Our sages understood the commandment to blot out Amalek as a command to blot out the type of people that Amalek represents: those who prey upon the weak, and hate without reason. The Talmud states a tradition that Haman was descended from Amalek, and that is why this reading precedes Purim. Everyone should make a special effort to hear the reading.
