Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Imagine, for a moment, the word beautiful spoken in Hebrew, Yiddish, French and a half-dozen other languages as well, mixed with the rustle of trickling waters and the light aroma of cedar. That, or something like it, was my experience on a recent family visit

to Muir Woods National Monument, across the bay from San Francisco. Let me share with you a story as beautiful as my aesthetic experience. It is a story of how one man's humility led to the naming of the majestic Muir Woods.

The towering redwoods featured in Muir Woods were gifted in 1907 to the Federal Government by philanthropist and former U.S. Congressman William Kent. President Teddy Roosevelt sent a letter thanking Kent "most heartily", and offered that the new national monument should be named for Kent, as he was the land's donor. In his reply, Kent declined, saying, "So many millions of better people have died forgotten, that to stencil one's own name on a benefaction seems to carry with it an implication of mandate immortality, as being something purchasable."

"By George! you are right," the president responded. "It is enough to do the deed and not to desire, as you say, to 'stencil one's own name on the benefaction." William Kent instead requested the national monument be declared "Muir Woods National Monument" in honor of the famous writer and wilderness champion, John Muir.

Humility is not only a calming and healing attribute, but enables us to act more easily with respect toward others. The humble person doesn't feel the need to appear stronger, wiser, wealthier or better than others in any way. Instead of seeking honor, humility frees us to honor others. And paradoxically, in the end we become honored anyway, as Ethics of the Fathers (4:1) teaches: "Who is honored? He who honors others, as it is said: 'For those who honor Me will I honor, and those who scorn Me will be degraded' (I Samuel 2:30)."

Parshas Shemos – Exodus 6:2 – 9:35

G-d assures Moses that He will indeed redeem the Jewish people from slavery and bring them into the

land of Israel. After the Torah presents a detailed genealogy of the tribe of Levi (Moses' family), Moses and Aaron go before Pharaoh to request a three-day hiatus from work so that the Jewish people can worship G-d in the desert. Moses' staff is miraculously turned into a snake as a sign of their Divine mission. When the Egyptian sorcerers counter by transforming



their staffs into snakes as well, Moses' staff swallows up theirs. Even so, Pharaoh adamantly refuses to free the Jewish people, and the series of ten gruesome plagues begins.

The first seven plagues are described in this week's Torah portion; blood, frogs, lice, a swarm of wild beasts, pestilence, boils and hail. Moses goes down to the river to speak to the Egyptian king - however, Pharaoh remains in denial ('in d'Nile - get it?') continuing to refuse to free the Jewish people as his heart is hardened. The portion comes to a close in the middle of these momentous events.

Rabbinic Ruminations



Are we alone in the universe? For thousands of years people have been guessing how many planets there might be among the stars, where we

could, at least in principle, live. A recent study suggests the existence of at least 10 *billion* terrestrial planets in our galaxy, alone. According to the prestigious scientific journal *Nature*, approximately one out of every ten stars has a planet roughly the size of the Earth that orbits around its star. The study's results, gleaned from a planet search technique called microlensing, also indicate that there is likely to be a minimum of 1,500 potentially habitable planets within just 50 light-years of Earth.

Whether other planets are inhabited - whether there is life and perhaps even intelligent life - is a fascinating question. What does the Torah say about the possibility of extraterrestrial life? Some Rabbis posit that it would be arrogant for man to think he is the only created being in G-d's universe. Others reason that inasmuch as the universe was created for man, no other creature can exist possessing free will, and thus would have no reason for existing.

Half Torah?

Question: What is the 'Haftorah'? What does the word 'Haftorah' mean?

Answer: The Haftorah is a short selection from one of the *Nevi'im* (books of the Prophets) that follows the Torah reading on Shabbos and Yom Tov.

Contrary to what some might think, the word 'Haftorah' does not mean 'half Torah', or have the word 'Torah' as part of its root. The word is derived from the Hebrew word meaning 'taking leave' or 'parting'; thus, in context, it could perhaps be translated as 'concluding portion.'

As a side note, less than 5 per cent of the *Nevi'im* are read during Shabbos and Yom Tov services throughout the year. Within the selection of weekly and festival Haftarot, all the prophetic books of *Tenach* (the Jewish Bible) are represented except for two. Do you know what they are?
