Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Bob Russell couldn't be blamed for losing hope that he would reunite with his 1967 Austin-Healey. Stolen outside his Philadelphia apartment 42 years

ago, the British roadster seemed a lost cause. For decades since, he searched for his beloved ride in vain. On a recent eBay session, though, his *mazal* changed: the cream-colored car was listed for auction by a Los Angeles car dealer, with a final bid of \$19,700. Russell, who now lives near Dallas, knew the car was his because its vehicle identi-fication number (VIN) matched the one on the title he kept since the theft. "I'm not trying to sound indelicate, but you're selling my car," Russell told the dealer.

With assistance from a cooperative Philadelphia Police Department, Russell drove to Los Angeles and took possession of the car. "The chances of it being it one piece were slim to none. The chances of me finding it were slim to none. Fifty coincidences had to coincide to have this happen," Russell said. "I should have bought some lottery tickets. The fact that the car still exists is improbable. It could have been junked or wrecked."

The key to lasting success is perseverance --keeping at it -- through the easy times, and the hard. This idea is expressed in the Torah: "An eternal flame shall burn upon the altar, it shall not be extinguished." (Lev. 6:6) Note the double expression -- "eternal flame" and "it shall not be extinguished" -- a teaching of consistency. A flame that is eternal, being constantly fed, is one that will never be extinguished. Contemporary author Jefferson Smith wrote, "There is no such thing as helplessness. It's just another word for giving up." Success in life depends upon perseverance.

Parshas Matos-Masei – Numbers 30:2–36:13



In the first of this week's two action-packed portions, Moses teaches the rules and restrictions governing oaths and vows. Promises are serious business. When we say that we plan to do

something -- even something as simple as, 'I'll call you later' -- we're bound by our words. Anticipating

entrance into the land of Israel, the tribes of Gad and Reuben petition Moses to remain on the eastern side of the Jordan River because that land is particularly suitable for grazing their cattle. Moses, not wanting to 'steer' Gad and Reuben wrong, grants their request on the condition that they first help the rest of the nation in conquering the entire land of Israel before returning to settle their inheritance.

Masei (a word that means 'journeys') begins with a listing of the 42 encampments of the Jewish people's 40 year journey from the Exodus until the crossing of the Jordan River into the Land of Israel. The boundaries of the Land of Israel are defined. Since the Levites would not be receiving a regular portion of the land, 48 cities are set aside for them. Cities of refuge are established; one who unintentionally murders can flee there. So ends the book of Numbers, the fourth of the Books of the Torah. Next week -- on to Deuteronomy!

Rabbinic Ruminations



It's been long said that "The eyes are the window to the soul." But since the early 1900s researchers have watched test consumers' eye movements for clues to their buying habits. Recent technology has helped them actually track retinas to get a

true fix on where people are looking, for how long and how often. A retina-tracking camera can now be attached to special glasses of selected shoppers to determine consumer buying habits. The information collected by the camera can be used to form a "heat map" that uses color to show where people looked on a simulated shelf. The "heat map" is created by measuring how long and how often test shoppers looked at packages.

Researchers at Kimberly-Clark used retina-tracking cameras when testing the newest packaging for its Viva paper towels in 2009. Their goal was to find which designs got noticed in the first 10 seconds a shopper looked at a shelf -- a crucial window when products are recognized and placed in the shopping cart. When redesigning the bottle for its Axe body wash, Unilever set up a virtual 3D environment and had its testers wear specially equipped glasses outfitted with three balls tracked by sensors

corresponding to consumers' sideways and vertical eye motions. The results led them to change the bottle's shape from curvy to straight, embed the brand in a black X with blue background to make it more visible and increase the font size of the product description.

We may be occasionally confronted with improper sights, and tempted to read or view things that are spiritually harmful. Do we have control over our eyes? When the Torah relates that, "And Abraham lifted his eyes .." (Gen. 18:2), we learn that even lifting your eyes can be a calculated and weighed decision. Just as we can "look before we leap", we can "think before we look." We can -- and should -- control our eyes.

Question: What are the main changes when Tisha B'Av falls on Shabbos?

Answer:

- The fast is postponed until Sunday
- No special Seuda Hamafseket the traditional pre-fast meal of an egg and bread
- Havdalah, normally on Saturday night, is postponed until Sunday night
- One may eat meat and drink wine and sing zmiros at the Shabbos meals, even for Shalosh Seudos
- One should stop eating and drinking before sunset on Shabbos, since the fast begins at this time
- Wearing leather shoes and sitting on regular chairs are permitted until nightfall on Shabbos

3 Weeks and 9 Days

The "Three Weeks" between the 17th of Tammuz and Tisha B'Av have been days of misfortune and calamity for the Jewish people throughout history. We minimize joy and celebration – we do not have weddings, listen to music, or shave and get haircuts.

The period beginning with Rosh Chodesh Av is called the "Nine Days." During this time, a stricter level of mourning is observed: we don't eat meat and wine (except on Shabbat) and we do not do laundry or wear freshly laundered clothes (except on Shabbat). We also do not bathe for pleasure, though we can bathe in cool water in order to remove dirt or perspiration.

Tisha B'Av - 9th of Av

Tisha B'Av commemorates five events: the destruction of the two ancient Temples in Jerusalem, the sin of ten of the twelve scouts sent by Moses who spoke disparagingly about the Promised Land, the razing of Jerusalem following the siege of Jerusalem in 70 CE, and the failure of the Bar Kokhba revolt against the Roman Empire. Accordingly, the day has been called the "saddest day in Jewish history".

The fast lasts about 25 hours, beginning at sunset on the eve of *Tisha B'Av* and ending at nightfall the next day. In addition to the prohibitions against eating or drinking, we also observe prohibitions against washing or bathing, applying creams or oils, wearing leather shoes, and engaging in marital relations. In addition, mourning customs are traditionally followed for at least part of the day, including sitting on low stools, refraining from work and not greeting others. Eicha (Book of Lamentations) is read, followed by the *kinos*, a series of liturgical lamentations.

At approximately 9:15 am, following services, we will show two DVDs: "Making Tisha B'Av Meaningful to Us Today", and "V'Nikdashti" ("I Will Be Sanctified"), a series of moving interviews with Holocaust Survivors.

At 2:00 P.M., the St. Louis Holocaust and Learning Center will be show the film "A Yiddish World Remembered". *Rabbi Ze'ev Smason* will introduce the film and lead a post-film discussion at this annual community Tisha B'Av event. The film looks back at the vanished Jewish way of life that existed in Eastern Europe before WWII. Through never before seen films and photographs, traditional cantorial and Klezmer music and personal recollections, once vibrant cities and small towns (shtetls) come alive again.
