Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Not long ago Detroit Lions quarterback Matthew Stafford befriended University of Michigan Children's Hospital patient Faith Falzone. Faith and her family were big Lions fans and also enjoyed

visiting Chicago. Earlier this year at a Hospital fundraising auction, the quarterback began bidding on a package of tickets and travel to the Lions' Monday Night Football game in Chicago in October -- a package that he, himself, donated. In the words of Faith's mother, here's what then happened:

" ... as the bidding continued he wasn't backing off... Somewhere in the \$15K range, Matt Stafford was the owner of the (football) package As he won the package he turned to (my son) and said, there you go buddy, you go to Chicago, and take your family. The look on my sons face, I will never forget. His chin began to quiver, he was about to cry. He quickly jumped up and gave Matt a hug, and thanked him over and over again."

Not only had Stafford just donated \$15,000 to the Children's Hospital, but he also gave a special gift to a family who has been through so much. He later said, "I wanted to give them something they could really be excited about and something I know they deserved." The Torah teaches that one of the three pillars upon which the world stands is acts of human kindness. G-d created us in order to give us good. The world was designed such that the greatest good is to give to others and to be other-centered. Strive to act like Matthew Stafford, who understands that we are our brother's keeper.

Parshas Balak – Numbers 22:2 – 25:9



This week's portion shifts from the Jewish people's travels in the desert to the story of Bilam, the anti-Semitic prophet who attempted to curse the Children of Israel. Hired by Balak, the

king of Moav, Bilam embarks upon a journey to the Israelite encampment. An angel brandishing a sword blocks Bilam's path, causing his donkey to repeatedly swerve off the road. Unable to see the angel, Bilam responds by striking the donkey three times.

Miraculously, G-d causes the donkey to speak to Bilam -- shades of Mr. Ed, the talking horse in the 1960's TV show! Bilam's eyes are uncovered, and the humiliated prophet sees the angel standing in the path. The angel reminds Bilam that he may only speak the words that G-d places in his mouth. Upon arrival near the Jewish camp, Bilam repeatedly attempts to curse the people; each time G-d prevents him from doing so, but instead he ends up uttering several sets of praises, much to Balak's dismay.

The Torah portion concludes with the Jewish men's debauchery with the promiscuous daughters of Moav and Midian, and the public immoral act of Zimri (a prince of the tribe of Simeon) with a Midianite princess. Pinchas, Aaron's grandson, zealously responds by piercing them to death with a spear, halting a plague from G-d which had broken out in the camp.

Rabbinic Ruminations



Do you like your chocolate from Switzerland....or from China? According to new study in the *Journal of Consumer Research,* when consumers taste a chocolate

bar they think is made in Switzerland, they'll prefer it over one supposedly made in China. But if you tell them where it's from after they taste the candy, they'll prefer the Chinese chocolate.

In the chocolate study, undergraduates were given unbranded squares of Trader Joe's chocolates to taste. Half of the participants were told the chocolate was made in Switzerland; the remaining students were told the chocolate was made in China. But some were told this information before eating the chocolate and some were told afterwards. "When they were given the country of origin before tasting, the students liked the chocolate more when they were told it was from Switzerland," the authors write. "This was expected because Switzerland has a strong reputation for chocolate whereas China does not. Surprisingly, when they were given the country of origin after sampling, the students that were told the chocolate was from Switzerland liked it less than those told it was from China."

The Torah teaches us not to underestimate the power of perception and perspective. Be cognizant of the material reality in which you find yourself. Yet, while

perception isn't all of reality, it is capable of profoundly affecting how we relate to that reality. Ben-Zoma's famous teaching, "Who is wealthy? He who is happy with his portion" (Avos 4:1) reminds us that courage and gratitude are imperative in seeking a productive, satisfied life.

Stump the Rabbi

Question: What is in the Torah scroll that is read on Shabbos and the holidays? In which way/direction is it read?

Answer: A Torah scroll, a Sefer Torah, contains the five books of Moses -- Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. In Hebrew, the names of the books are Berashis, Shemos, Vayikra, Bamidbar and Devarim. Since Hebrew is read from right to left, the beginning of the scroll is on the right. That means that Genesis and the Creation begin on the right end of the scroll. The left end of the scroll, in Deuteronomy, has the last paragraphs of the Torah that discuss the death of Moses. The Torah is written in vertical columns which are read from the top, horizontal line by horizontal line (right to left) until the bottom.

Fast of the 17th of Tammuz Shiva Asar B'Tammuz

The fast Is the start of a three-week mourning period for the destruction of the Temple. Since the 17th falls on Shabbos this year, the fast will be observed on the next day, Sunday, July 8, from 4:31 pm - 9:10 pm. The fast commemorates five tragic events that occurred on this date:

- 1. Moses broke the tablets when he saw the Jewish people worshipping the Golden Calf
- During the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem, the Jews were forced to cease offering the daily sacrifices due to the lack of sheep
- 3. Roman General Apostomos burned the Torah
- 4. An idol was placed in the Holy Temple
- The walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Romans in 69 CE, after a lengthy siege (three weeks later, after the Jews put up a valiant struggle, the Romans destroyed the second Holy Temple on the 9th of Av)
- The Jerusalem Talmud maintains that this is also the date when the Babylonians breached the walls of Jerusalem on their way to destroying the first Temple
