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Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



The stock market played a strange trick on the Chinese Communist Party on Monday. The Shanghai stock market index fell 64.89 points Monday, which happened to be June

4, (6/4) the anniversary of the 1989 crackdown on prodemocracy demonstrators at Tiananmen Square. This dark moment in recent Chinese history is customarily referred to as 6/4, the numbers conveying the same stark tragedy as 9/11 for Americans.

Chinese censors are particularly sensitive to references to the Tiananmen Square massacre, where hundreds, and perhaps thousands were killed. On the 20th anniversary in 2009, an advertisement managed to slip into a newspaper showing two groups of people — six on one side and four on the other — gazing philosophically toward the sky. Nowadays, the game is largely played out on the Internet. The expression 6/4 is banned by censors, as are the words "candle," "commemorate," "massacre," "tank" and "never forget." After its bizarre closing Monday, censors added "Shanghai Stock Market" and "index" to the banned list.

Was the 64.89 point drop just a strange omen, coincidence - or, as some have suggested, an act of G-d? The words 'luck', 'chance' and 'coincidence' are not part of a Jewish vocabulary. While it is often difficult (if not impossible) to know why things happen, a solidly-founded belief in G-d will lead to the inescapable conclusion that there are no accidents. Everything - even in the Shanghai Stock Market - happens for a reason.

Parshas Beha'aloscha – Numbers 8:1 – 12:16



Beha'aloscha (Hebrew for "when you step up") is thematically diverse, beginning with the daily lighting of the golden menorah in the Mishkan. The Levites are initiated into the Tabernacle service. The Torah then

describes the celebration of Passover in the second year in the desert, complete with the bringing of the Korban Pesach (Passover offering). Some men could not bring the offering due to ritual impurity, and were thus commanded to celebrate Pesach Sheni, a 'make-up Passover' a month later. Lesson: second chances

are available. Additionally, the standard procedure by which the Jewish people would break camp to travel in the desert is described.

Soon after leaving Mt. Sinai, the people begin to kvetch (to complain and grumble incessantly, as in the title of the classic novel 'Kvetcher in the Rye'). Spurred by the mixed multitude of insincere converts who joined the Jewish people upon leaving Egypt, the complaining is directed toward the manna, their daily miraculous portion of heavenly bread. G-d sends a large flock of quail which the people gather to eat; those who had complained about the lack of food stuff themselves and die during this supernatural event. The portion concludes with Miriam speaking loshon hara (defamatory words) to Aaron about their brother Moses. She is punished by G-d with tzaraas (a skin condition indicating a spiritual deficiency) and is quarantined outside the camp for seven days.

Rabbinic Ruminations



A horse is a horse, of course, of course. Even a horse such as Clever Hans, that, in the early 1900s, was claimed to have been able to perform arithmetic and other intellectual tasks. Hans was said to have been taught to add, subtract,

multiply, divide, work with fractions, tell time, keep track of the calendar, differentiate musical tones, and read, spell and understand German. Hans' owner would ask the horse, "If the eighth day of the month comes on a Tuesday, what is the date of the following Friday?" Hans would answer by tapping his hoof. Questions could be asked both orally and in written form.

After a formal investigation in 1907 it was demonstrated that the horse was not actually performing these mental tasks, but was watching the reaction of his human observers. Clever Hans responded directly to involuntary cues in the body language of its human trainer, who had the faculties to solve each problem. Remarkably, the trainer was entirely unaware that he was providing such cues. The *Clever Hans effect* came to be important knowledge in observer-expectancy effect and later studies in animal cognition.

As with animals, so too with people. The greater the expectation placed upon children, students and

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employees, the better they perform. Similarly, we should have high expectations for ourselves. Judaism encourages us to set the bar high; have ambitious self-expectations to continually increase our acts of goodness, kindness, and the quantity and quality of the mitzvos we observe. What we expect of ourselves becomes our own self-fulfilling prophecy.

Question: Should I pray in Hebrew even though I don't understand the meaning of the words?

Answer: Many face the dilemma of wishing to understand what he or she is saying and find it meaningless to pray in an unfamiliar language. Yet, that same person understands that nuances in Hebrew can't be fully conveyed in even the best of translations.

Although Hebrew is the preferred language for prayer, the prayers need not be said in Hebrew. The *halacha* rules that one may pray in any language that one understands. With that said, the importance of Hebrew as the language of prayer is that it is *lashon ha'kodesh*, the "sacred tongue", the language of the Torah. Hebrew not only is a tool of communication, but possesses innate spiritual treasures. If one doesn't understand Hebrew, it is best to use a prayer book with a translation - but simultaneously, strive to learn Hebrew with the goal of eventually saying all one's prayers in Hebrew.
