

Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



In many ways Moshe Kai Cavalin is your typical UCLA student. He arrived on campus after earning an associate in arts degree at East Los Angeles College with straight-A

record. And since the fall of 2010, he's been stacking up credits in the math department. But there is one unusual thing about this young man you'll be interested to know: Moshe, who was admitted at age 12 and turned 14 on Feb. 14, is one of the youngest students ever to attend UCLA. Moshe first enrolled in college at age 8 and earned his first degree at age 9.

Moshe leads a remarkably balanced life, enjoying soccer, martial arts and scuba diving. Concerning his social life, he says, "After I get my PhD I'll worry about a girlfriend and stuff." Oh, and another thing: he's already a published author. His 100-page book, "We Can Do", explains how other young people can accomplish what Moshe did through such simple acts as keeping themselves focused and not taking on any endeavor half-heartedly. The accomplished young Moshe dislikes being called a genius, and believes everyone has great potential. He says, "People need to know you don't really need to be a genius. You just have to work hard and you can accomplish anything. There are roughly 6.7 billion people in the world. Everyone is smart in his or her own way. I was able to reach the stars, but others can reach the 'Milky Way."

A verse from Psalms reminds us that there is no limit to our potential elevation, no end to our spiritual aspirations." I am Hashem your G-d Open your mouth wide, and I will fill it" (Psalms 81:11). Our only limitations come from within if we choose to restrict our wishes and dreams.

Parshas Ki Sisa Exodus 30:10 - 34:35



The portion begins with G-d's command to Moses to take a census by collecting an equal contribution of a half-shekel coin from every adult male between the ages of 20 and 60, with the profits

going to the Mishkan (Tabernacle). G-d designates Betzalel, of the tribe of Judah, and Oholiav, of the tribe of Dan, to supervise the upcoming construction of the Mishkan. The mitzvah of Shabbat is then repeated to caution the nation that even the construction of the

Mishkan does not supersede the observance of the weekly day of rest.

The Torah returns to the narrative of the Revelation at Mt. Sinai and describes the horrible sin of the golden calf. G-d relents to Moses' prayer that the Children of Israel should be spared from annihilation for this great transgression, and Moses descends from the mountain with the two tablets of the Ten Commandments in hand. Upon witnessing a segment of the population dancing around the golden calf, Moses smashes the tablets and burns the idol, initiating the process of repentance. Moses again ascends the mountain to pray to G-d that the Jewish people should be forgiven and regain their status as the chosen people. Moses eventually returns with the second set of tablets and a renewed covenant with G-d, his face radiant as a result of the Divine experience.

Rabbinic Ruminations



A 2009 article in The Journal of Experimental Social Psychology described a case of an accounting firm that had an excellent relationship with a client company. The accounting firm, which

received tens of millions of dollars in fees from the client, approved the company's high-quality and ethical financial statements. For three years, everything was fine. But suddenly, in the fourth year, the company stretched and even broke the limits of the law.

A similar case described the same accounting firm, same client. This time, after the first good year, the client slowly pushed the ethical envelope over the next three years. It was found that the accounting firm was more likely to approve the financial statements in the second case than in the first. Why? Professor Francesca Gino, professor at Harvard Business School and co-author of the article, explained, "Unethical acts can become an integral part of the day-to-day activities to such an extent that individuals may be unable to see the inappropriateness of their behaviors."

The concept of the "Boiling Frog Syndrome" is based upon the premise that if a frog is placed in boiling water, it will frantically try to clamber out. But when placed in a pot of tepid water with the heat on low, the frog will float placidly. As the water gradually heats up, the frog will sink into a tranquil stupor, ultimately allowing itself to be boiled to death with no resistance.

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This famous metaphor speaks to the dangers of moral and ethical complacency. The Torah warns us, "Only take heed, and guard your life diligently, lest you forget the things which your eyes have seen (on Mt. Sinai) and lest they depart from your [mind and] heart all the days of your life" (Deuteronomy 4:9). Be aware of moral complacency before spiritual decay sets in. Otherwise, we run the risk of becoming a boiled frog.

Question: What is the origin of the custom that the ten fingers of both hands should be touching the bread or challah when we make the blessing of 'haMotzie'.?

Answer:

- 1) The ten fingers correspond to the ten Hebrew words of the verse (Psalm 104:14), "He causes grass to sprout for the animals and vegetation for the work of man, to bring forth bread from the earth." ("....l'hotzei lechem min ha'aretz")
- 2) The ten fingers correspond to the ten mitzvos involved in the process of making bread:
 - 1. Don't plow with a donkey and ox together
 - 2. Don't plant mixed species too closely together
 - 3. Leave loose gleanings for the poor
 - 4. Leave forgotten gleanings for the poor
 - 3. Leave a corner of the field for the poor
 - 6. Don't muzzle an ox when it threshes
 - 7. Terumah (tithe for a Kohen)
 - 8. Ma'aser Rishon (tithe for a Levi),
 - 9. Ma'aser Sheni (tithe to be eaten in Jerusalem)
 - 10. Challah (tithe of dough)

Next Week is Shabbos Parah Sabbath of the Red Heifer – March 17

Shabbat Parah occurs on the Shabbos following Purim, and marks the beginning of formal preparations for Passover. The special Torah reading, Numbers 19:1-22, discusses a ritual of purification involving a red heifer (in Hebrew, parah adumah). Specifically, the ritual purifies people from the ritual impurity that comes from contact with the dead. At the end of the ritual, the people are purified, but the person who performed the ritual becomes temporarily impure. The rabbis speak of the ritual of Parah Adumah as the greatest of mysteries: it makes the impure pure, and makes the pure impure. The passage is chosen for this time because of the need to purify oneself for Pesach, in preparation for pilgrimage to Jerusalem and the Temple. corresponding haftorah portion is Ezekiel 36:16-38, which also talks about purification.
