

- Next week is Shabbos HaGadol ~ "The Great Shabbos." The Shabbos before Pesach commemorates the 10<sup>th</sup> day of Nisan, when the Hebrew slaves took the lambs that they were going to offer for Pesach and tied them up outside their homes, to keep until they offered them on the 14<sup>th</sup>. This was a very dangerous thing to do because Egyptians worshipped sheep; but, miraculously, instead of slaughtering the Hebrews, the Egyptians instead fought with each other over whether the Hebrews should be sent away already. In many synagogues, other than Nusach Hari, the special haftorah for this Shabbos is Malachi 3:4 3:24, which tells about the return of Elijah the prophet and coming of the Messiah. We believe that Elijah will return at Pesach, and that is why we include a cup of wine for him at the seder. At NHBZ, we say the regular Haftorah of Tzav.

The word Mishna (learning) is closely related to the word Neshama (soul), and we believe that learning Mishnayos in someone's name acts as a Spiritual Elevation for that person or that person's soul. Our NHBZ Mishnayos Shiur, which learns every Sunday following morning minyan, is carrying on this tradition by dedicating the MIshnayos to those in whose names the Mishnayos will be learned. You may dedicate Mishnayos for 1 year: \$250; 6 months: \$150; 3 months: \$96; 1 month, \$50. May your loved one be bound up in the bond of eternal life. May HaShem be filled with compassion to restore the health of your loved one.

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We've all made mistakes. But officials at New York City's MTA (Metropolitan Transit Authority) are kicking themselves over a "massive" typo that led to over a quarter of a million dollars worth of new subway maps being thrown out due to outdated fare information. The \$250,000 subway typo listed the price for a ride card at a \$4.50 fee -- the old MTA rate. The new minimum fare is now \$5 for a pay-per-ride card. Over 80,000 incorrect maps were allegedly printed and distributed earlier this month at a cost of a quarter of a million dollars.

Transit workers said an "urgent" call came to them telling all agents to stop handing out the maps to the public without any explanation at the time. "It was an urgent message: Please don't issue any maps to the customers," recalled a station agent in Brooklyn. "The money they waste is mind-boggling." A transit source said that, "(the MTA is) very embarrassed about this. They were frantically calling the booths trying to get these maps back." An MTA station agent and union leader said, "They weren't coming out with a new map because they were changing the map. They were coming out with a new map because they were changing the price. That was the sole purpose. And they couldn't even get that right."

We all make mistakes, some more costly than others. Jewish values require us to be compassionate when we see someone who has made a mistake. We certainly shouldn't ridicule and embarrass others. As for ourselves, the wise person is one who recognizes his mistake and works to correct it in the future. It takes courage and self-confidence to admit mistakes. Since no one is infallible, the key is to muster the spiritual strength to get up, learn from our mistakes, and try again -- as King Solomon said, "Because the tzadik (righteous) falls seven times, but rises again" (Proverbs 24:16)

#### Parshas Vayikra 1:1 -- 5:26

This Shabbos marks the beginning of our reading the third book of the Torah, Sefer Vayikra, which deals primarily with the services and responsibilities of the Kohanim. This week's portion focuses on many of the korbanos (offerings) to be brought in the newly-constructed Mishkan. Parshas Vayikra begins with G-d calling Moses into the Mishkan where he will receive the many relevant mitzvos to be ultimately passed on to the Jewish people. The first half of the Torah portion describes the various optional korbanos brought by individuals. They can be classified into three general categories, each one comprised of several gradations in size and expense; the korban olah (elevation offering) which is completely consumed on the altar; the korban mincha (meal offering) which, because of its inexpensive contents, is usually brought by someone of modest means; and the korban shelamim (peace offering) partially burned on the altar, with the remainder divided between the owners and the Kohanim. The second half of the portion (beginning with chapter four) discusses the required chatos (sin) and asham (guilt) offerings to be brought in atonement for unintentional transgressions.

#### Rabbinic Ruminations

The Miami Hurricanes men's basketball team had never beaten a No.1 program, never been in contention for a top tournament seed and never won an ACC conference championship before this season. Why, then, have they achieved such great success in 2013? A good deal of credit is due an unusual approach taken by the Miami Head coach: Jim Larranaga prepares his team through visualization techniques. The 63-year-old head coach tells his players the night before each game, "I want you to sit on your bed, close your eyes and visualize yourself in tomorrow's game...You're running through the plays, you're guarding the man you're going to guard, you're getting back and getting stops...in your mind you are making big plays." This season, the Hurricanes are a topten team, and have certainly fooled themselves into becoming college basketball's surprise team of the season. The concept that 'mental practice makes perfect' extends beyond the basketball court. Evidence exists that mental rehearsal can benefit surgical performance. In a 2008 study, half of a group of medical students were trained in mental imagery techniques, while the other half (in addition to their usual training of physical practice) studied their textbooks. http://feedproxy.google.com/~r/PsychologyBlog/~3/F6ulp8xzNUQ/mental-practicemakes-perfect.php?utm\_source=feedburner&utm\_medium=emailWhen the students carried out live surgery, those who'd used mental imagery performed better, on average, than those assigned the book learning. There's evidence that mental rehearsal of skills also produces benefits in many other areas.. Examples include mentally practicing a music instrument and during rehabilitation from brain injuries. He sits on an inflatable gym ball before every race, with a steering wheel in his hands, shuts his eyes, and drives a lap of the circuit. He does this in real time (making all the car noises himself) so that when he opens his eyes, he's within a second of his real lap time.

Visualization is a helpful technique to pray with proper intent and focus. A most basic and powerful tool to connect to G-d through prayer is to visualize yourself having a conversation with G-d. Jews throughout the world pray facing Jerusalem, while those living in Jerusalem face the Temple Mount or go to the Western ('wailing') Wall, feeling the presence of the Almighty. When we study the Torah, G-d talks to us. When we pray, we talk to G-d. Make every prayer experience a meaningful one, and visualize yourself in communication with your Creator.
