

Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic Rabbi Isaac Luria (1534-1572), also known as 'The Ari'. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



The term "bird brain" is often used in reference to intellectually challenged individuals. This is, of course, based on the notion that birds are dim-witted

creatures. However, in recent years it has become clear that we have grossly underestimated the cognitive abilities of our fine-feathered friends.

"Clark's nutcracker" is a bird that displays an extremely accurate spatial memory. It is known to store approximately 100,000 pinyon nuts in 20,000-30,000 separate caches, which can be recovered up to 9 months later. If Western scrub-jays become aware that they have been observed by a competitor while storing their food, they re-hide the cache so that the other bird loses track of where it is. Members of a crow population in Sendai City, Japan have devised an ingenious way to break open nuts: They perch over pedestrian crossings and drop the nuts in the path of oncoming cars. When the light turns red, they swoop down and collect the contents.

There is much we can learn from the world of birds. From parrots: If you go around repeating everything you hear you may seem cute but you are actually embarrassing yourself. From owls: If you can't see a situation clearly twist your head around for a wider point of view. From flamingos: what you eat is what makes you orange or white, so watch out for that junk food!

Parshas Toldos - Genesis 25:19 - 28: 9



Isaac and Rebecca pray to G-d for a child. Rebecca finally conceives, and after a difficult pregnancy she gives birth to twins -- Esau and Jacob. Their personality differences soon apparent, as Esau turns to hunting while

Jacob is pure and wholesome, spending his time studying Torah. Returning from a hunting expedition, Esau finds Jacob cooking a pot of lentil soup. Jacob agrees to give his older brother a portion from the pot of soup in exchange for the spiritual birthright.

Faced with a severe famine, Isaac and family settle in Gerar (the land of the Philistines within Israel's borders) rather than descend to Egypt as his father Abraham had done years before. After experiencing

astonishing financial success, Isaac comes into continual conflict with King Avimelech over the wells which Isaac dug anew. This pattern of 'success and persecution' has repeated itself throughout Jewish history. Isaac decides to bless Esau as the firstborn. At Rebecca's insistence, Jacob disguises himself as his older brother and receives the blessing of the firstborn (which rightfully belonged to him). The Torah portion concludes with Jacob fleeing from Esau's wrath for 'stealing' his blessing and escaping to Charan to stay with his uncle, Laban, where he is to find a wife.

Rabbinic Ruminations



Common usage of the word 'plagiarism' implies a deliberate purloining of someone's language, thoughts, ideas or expressions, and claiming

But when is plagiarism not them as your own. plagiarism - but is really still plagiarism? When it is cryptomnesia. Cryptomnesia, literally, hidden memory, is a term used to explain the origin of experiences that people believe to be original but which are actually based on memories of events they've forgotten.

"My Sweet Lord" was a # 1 hit song written in 1970 by former Beatles lead guitarist George Harrison. Following the song's release, musical similarities between "My Sweet Lord" and the Chiffons' hit "He's So Fine" (remember do-lang do-lang?) led to a prolonged copyright infringement suit. In 1976, a U.S. district court decision found that Harrison had "subconsciously" copied the earlier song, and in 1981 the court decided the damages amounted to almost \$1.6 million. The judge was convinced that Harrison did not consciously set out to plagiarize the melody of "He's So Fine" for his own use; nevertheless, the former Beatle's cryptomnesia was not a defense since the Copyright law did not require an 'intent to infringe' to support a finding of infringement.

In the Talmud we are told that an unborn child is taught the whole Torah in the womb. teaches him all the mysteries of Creation and all that he will ever need to know in order to reach perfection. As the child is born, however, the angel taps him on the mouth and he forgets all that he has learned. The obvious question is: why teach a child so much and then cause all the teaching to be forgotten?





