

Beyond Twelve Gates by Rabbi Ze'ev Smason

Beyond Twelve Gates' refers to a beautiful concept taught by the great mystic *Rabbi Isaac Luria* (1534-1572), also known as *'The Ari'*. There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Welcome to Beyond Twelve Gates



Sherlock Holmes had the case of the dog that didn't bark, but it has taken a testing company to bring the art of canine detection into the "CSI" age. Deborah Violette, a property manager, takes dog waste seriously. Everyone who owns a dog in her complex in Lebanon, N.H., must submit a sample of its DNA, taken by rubbing a cotton

Additionally, the good-hearted person is courteous, considerate and generous - not just to some people in some circumstances - but to everyone all the time, even when walking one's dog.

Parshas Lech Lecha – Genesis 12:1 – 17:27



Abraham was called by G-d to leave his homeland, his father's house, and his position of status and prosperity to travel to the land that G-d would show him.

Upon arrival with his wife Sarah and nephew Lot in the land of Israel, they discover it to be ravaged by a horrible famine. Traveling to descend to Egypt for a temporary stay, the immoral Egyptians immediately capture Sarah and take her to the Egyptian king. G-d responds by afflicting the king and his household with a debilitating plague until he releases her. Guess what the plague was?

Back in the land of Israel, Lot parts ways with Abraham, with Lot relocating to the fertile plains of Sodom. Abraham subsequently rescues the kidnapped Lot by miraculously defeating four kings and their armies. Through a Covenant, G-d promises

Abraham that his descendants will be as numerous as the stars in the sky. Because she had no children, Sarah gives her maidservant Hagar to Abraham as a wife, and their son Yishmael is born. At the age of 99 Abraham circumcises himself, his son Yishmael and the other male members of his household.

Rabbinic Ruminations



There's something to be said for being in the right place at the right time. Stan Thornton of Esperance, Western Australia, was on the roof of his home watching when America's space station Skylab fell

on his hometown in July 1979. Skylab's demise was an international media event, with merchandising, wagering on the time and place of re-entry, and nightly news reports. The *San Francisco Examiner* offered a \$10,000 prize for the first piece of Skylab delivered to its offices.

Shortly after Skylab fell, Thornton's mother directed him to the back yard of their home, where she thought she heard something hit the roof of their storage shed. There, the seventeen year-old Thornton recovered a sizzling, charcoal briquette-sized bit of scorched metal. He cooled it down, put it in a plastic bag and took it to the local emergency services office. Within a day, Thornton was airborne to California, where he picked up the *Examiner* prize and earned a spot as a human footnote in space history.

It has been said that the Hebrew word *mazal* (as in 'mazel tov'), which literally means 'the zodiac sign', or 'luck which comes from the stars', is in actuality a mnemonic for three Hebrew words: *makom* (place), z'man (time), limmud (lesson). It's helpful to be in the right place at the right time -- but it's equally important to take proper advantage of an opportune confluence of circumstances. American businessman Ray Kroc said, "The two most important requirements for major success are: first, being in the

right place at the right time, and second, doing something about it." Good *mazel* is a dividend of sweat; the more you sweat, the more *mazel* you have.





Standard Time starts Sunday morning, Nov 6 at 2:00 am. Since most of us are sleeping at that time, please set your clocks and timers BACK one hour before going to sleep so you won't miss Sunday morning minyan. (Spring forward, Fall back). You get an extra hour to do things tonight, or an extra hour to sleep - your choice.
