There exist twelve gates of prayer in Heaven — one for each tribe of Israel. There also exists a Heavenly thirteenth gate. Through this gate the prayers of all Jews, regardless of tribe, Jewish education or level of observance, are allowed to enter and are heard by G-d.

Torah Reading for Sukkos



The Torah readings for the first two days of Sukkos and Shabbos reflect central themes of the holiday of Sukkos. On both Thursday and Friday (October 13 & 14) the Torah reading is from

Leviticus 22:26 -- 23: 44. On Shabbos the Torah reading is from Exodus 33:12 -- 34:26. The readings include descriptions of the featured mitzvos of the holiday. During Sukkos we dwell in a 'Sukkah' -- a booth or hut whose roof is made of detached tree branches and other natural material. As the weather begins to turn cooler, we leave the comfort of the indoors for our Sukkah. In it we joyously reflect upon what we achieved over the course of the High

Holidays and renew our commitment to spirituality and a G-d centered life.

The Torah readings also describe the 4 Species (*Arba Minim*) used on Sukkos: The palm branch (*Iulav*), citron (*esrog*), myrtle branches (*hadassim*), and willow branches (*aravos*). A well known concept is that the 4 Species represent distinct personality types:

- 1) The edible and fragrant *esrog* symbolizes one who is both Torah-learned and charitable.
- 2) the *lulav*, which bears sweet dates but totally lacks fragrance, represents one who is learned but lacking in good deeds,
- 3) the fragrant but inedible *hadas* symbolizes one who excels in good deeds but is unlearned, and
- 4) the *arava* symbolizes a simple person, lacking both Torah knowledge and good deeds.

By binding these species together and holding them at one time, we express the unity of all Jews.

Rabbinic Ruminations



We've all heard the expression, 'Fool me once, shame on you; fool me twice, shame on me.' Habitual gamblers, apparently, are easier to fool than others. According to a new

study published in the *Journal of Neuroscience*, near misses provide potent fuel for the habit in regular gamblers. The more severe a participant's gambling habit, the stronger the mid brain response to a near miss. In other words, near misses are most rewarding for pathological gamblers, who experience them as being almost as rewarding as a win. Study participants who gambled less often also found near misses rewarding, but to a lesser extent.

Manufacturers of gambling games know the rewarding effects of near misses and design slot machines in such a way as to exploit the cognitive distortions of gamblers. Using a technique called clustering, they create a high number of failures that are close to wins, so that what the player sees is a misrepresentation of the probabilities and randomness that the game involves. The gambler who nearly hits the jackpot will therefore want to continue playing, because he thinks he has a good chance of winning.

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Physicist Richard Feynman famously said, "The first principle is you must not fool yourself, and you are the easiest person to fool." Many of us suffer from various forms of illusions; thinking we can safely text while driving, not addressing a health concern, or believing we know much more than we actually do. The best antidote against a life filled with illusions is to be always careful to speak words of truth. It is written in a traditional Jewish source (Midrash) that

anyone who is careful to speak words of truth, will be sent a *malach* (an angel) who shows him the truth. The Torah says, "Distance yourself from falsehood" -- the only matter from which the Torah warns us to "distance" ourselves.



Don't Miss it – Simchas Torah at NHBZ Friday, October 21

After the *hakafot* and the dancing, sections of three Torah scrolls are read. The last *parashah* of the Torah, V'Zos HaBerachah, at the end of Deuteron-omy (33:1-34:12), is read from the first scroll, followed immediately by the first chapter and part of the second chapter from the Book of Genesis (1:1 - 2:3), which is read from the second scroll.

It is a special honor to receive the last *aliyah* of the Book of Deuteronomy; the person receiving that aliyah is called the *Chasan Torah* (the groom of the Torah). It is also a special honor to receive the first *aliyah* of the Book of Genesis; that person is called *Chasan B'reishis* (the groom of Genesis).

All men are called for an *aliyah*, and all children are called for a special *aliyah* called *Kol HaNe'arim* (all the children).
