Parshas Shemini

This week's Torah portion begins by discussing the events which occurred on the eighth and final day of the inauguration service of the Mishkan. After months of preparation, Aaron and his sons are finally installed as Kohanim in an elaborate service. Aaron blesses the people, and the entire nation rejoices as G-d's presence rests upon them. However, the excitement comes to an abrupt halt as Aaron's two eldest sons, Nadav and Avihu, are consumed by a heavenly fire in the Mishkan while innovating an offering of incense on the altar. This incident stresses the need to perform the commandments only as G-d directed. Later, Moses consoles Aaron, who grieves in silence.

Have you ever wondered where the laws of kosher food come from? Parshas Shemini concludes with a listing of the kosher and non-kosher animals. The identifying signs of a kosher animal are that it has split hooves and chews, regurgitates and re-chews its food. A kosher fish is one that has both fins and scales. All birds not included in the list of forbidden fowl are permitted. However, today the identity of these non-kosher birds is doubtful. Therefore, we're forbidden to eat any species of bird unless there is a well-established tradition that it is kosher. The Torah forbids all types of insects except for four species of locusts. Chocolate-covered grasshoppers, anyone? The laws of kashrut help us to be distinct and holy -- like G-d, Himself.

Parshas Parah

Numbers 19:1-22 is read on the Shabbos following Purim. These verses deal with the Red Heifer used in the spiritual purification process at the time of the Holy Temple. This issue is important at this season of the year, since in looking forward to Passover, every Jew is careful to maintain spiritual purity in order to partake in the holiday offerings. Many authorities regard this reading as a Torah precept.

Getting Ready for Pesach?

Selling Chometz / Mechiras Chometz: All non-Pesach food that cannot be eaten before Pesach can be sold to a non-Jew. Rabbi Smason will be available to act as your agent for the selling of chometz. Passover begins Friday night, April 19. There are two ways to sell your Chometz to Rabbi Smason:

- 1. **In Person with Rabbi Smason:** If you would like to make Rabbi Smason your agent for the sale of Chometz, please call and make an appointment with Rabbi Smason, whether in the office or at minyan.

The Pesach Countdown Is On... Part 1: WHAT IS CHAMETZ?

The Short Answer—"Chametz" is any food product made from wheat, barley, rye, oats or spelt that has come into contact with water and allowed to ferment and "rise."



In practice, just about anything made from these grains-other than Passover matzah, which is carefully controlled to avoid leavening—is to be considered chametz. This includes flour (even before it is mixed with water), cake, cookies, pasta, breads, and items that have chametz as an ingredient, like malt.

The Biblical Basis—G-d commanded the Israelites: "It shall be for you a remembrance ... seven days you shall eat matzah, and on the first day you should remove all se'or (sourdough, a leavening agent) from your homes. Anyone who eats chametz from the first day to the seventh day shall be cut off from Israel."

Getting Rid of Chametz-Long before Passover begins, we clean our homes, offices, and any other place that belongs to us to rid our homes of chametz. Although it's praiseworthy to be stringent on Passover, keep in mind that dust isn't chametz. The main purpose of cleaning and searching for chametz is to remove any chametz that one may come to inadvertently eat or derive benefit from during Passover. The obligation to get rid of chametz does not extend to inedible chametz or tiny crumbs of chametz that are soiled or spoiled. So the key areas to focus on are things that may come in contact with food, since we are forbidden to eat anything with even a trace of chametz. The kitchen should be thoroughly cleaned, and all surfaces should be covered or koshered. If using your regular utensils for Passover, they will need to be koshered (consult your rabbi). If finances permit, it is better (and easier) to simply buy a set of Passover utensils.

On a Spiritual Note—Chametz and matzah are almost the same substance, containing the same ingredients of flour and water. The one key difference is that while chametz bread rises, filling itself with hot air, the matzah stays flat and humble. Thus, chametz represents that swelling of ego that enslaves the soul more than any external prison. It is for this reason that once a year on Passover, when we celebrate our freedom from slavery and our birth as a nation unto G-d, we are extremely careful to eradicate any chametz that we may have. The flat, unpretentious matzah represents the humility, self-effacement and commitment that are the ultimate liberators, enabling us to connect to G-d without our egos getting in the way.
