How to attend Yom Kippur Services indoors at NHBZ

Those who were inside for Rosh Hashana do not need to resubmit paper work.

There are still a few seats remaining for inside davening. There is a possibility that demand will exceed availability of seats. In such circumstances, we may have to accommodate one member by asking another member to give up his or her seat so that every eligible member wanting to daven indoors on Yom Kippur can attend at least one indoor service.

Contact Jeff Miller immediately by replying to this email or calling 991-2100 ext.2 to reserve an indoor seat if you fit in the following guidelines:

- If you are under 64 and wish to attend you may submit the Covid form in this bulletin ASAP.
- If you are under 64 but have health issues you will also need a note from your doctor attesting that can attend sevices..
- If you are 65 -74 you must submit the Covid form and submit a doctors note doctor attesting that can attend sevices
- If you are over 74 you can attend outdoor services



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Parsha Ha'Azinu

Ha'Azinu is comprised primarily of Moses' "song" about the horrible tragedies and supreme joy which will make up the Jewish people's future history. While not a song in the familiar sense, Moses' song is a blend of otherwise disparate ideas into a beautiful symphony of thought. It expresses the idea that everything that G-d does -- past, present and future -- somehow fits into a perfect harmony, although our limited human understanding prevents fully recognizing the wisdom of G-d.

Ha'Azinu contains the mitzvah for each Jew to write a Sefer Torah (Torah scroll). Many suggest that this mitzvah can be fulfilled by the purchase of books containing Torah content. Does your home contain any books of Torah? Today there are an abundance of excellent Torah books written in English. Let me suggest two: The Stone Chumash (5 Books of Moses), and Living Each Week by Rabbi Dr. Abraham Twerski. Ha'azinu concludes with G-d's command to Moses to ascend Mount Nebo, where he will view the land of Israel and then pass away.

THE TEN DAYS OF REPENTANCE

The period between Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur is called the Ten Days of Repentance. Or, in Hebrew, it is known as the Aeres Yemei Teshuva.

On Rosh Hashana, the righteous and the wicked receive their judgment. One should not see himself as wicked or be so presumptuous as to consider himself righteous. Therefore, we have 10 days to improve and tip the scales to the side of righteousness. Yom Kippur is the culmination of this period.

During the Ten Days of Teshuva, Jews engage in intense introspection for the purpose of self-improvement. We become more scrupulous in the observance of mitzvot.

While Yom Kippur is a day of forgiveness, when it comes to atoning for things we've done to another person regretting our sins isn't enough – we're required to reach out, apologize and seek forgiveness to those we've harmed. Sins between man and G-d can be atoned for through prayer and sincere teshuva, repentance, but if the pain we've caused another person can be remedied, we have an obligation to do that too before we can truly be forgiven. -adapted from www.aish.com



Guide for those Davening without a Minyan on Yom Kippur

Page listings from the NHBZ Machzor

YOM KIPPUR EVE

- 1) One may recite "Kol Nidrei" pages 35-36
- * Omit the passage "על דעת המקום" ("With the sanction" p.35) and omit the line " מיום מיום מיום ניפורים זה עד יום כיפורים הבא
- 2) Recite Shehechiyanu
- 3) Recite blessings before and after the Shema through the end of the Silent Amidah [without *Baruchu/Chatzi Kaddish*] pages 43-57
- * A rule that applies throughout the davening without a minyan: *Baruchu/Kaddish* (in any form) is not said.
- 4) One may recite the Selichos pages 58-80
- * Omit whenever occur the following passages / lines:
- "אל מלך...לכל קוראיך" ("Almighty King ... to all who call upon You") For example on page 62
- "סלח נא...כדבריך" ("Pardon, I beseech You in accordance with Your words") For example, on page 63
- "רחמנא...קריב" ("May the Merciful One very soon.") page 80 In addition, one should *not* say the public Vidui/Confession from page 73 (beginning with "You know") until page 76 (" ...of this Torah.")
- 5) Recite Avinu Malkeinu pages 80-82
- 6) Recite Aleinu page 85

MORNING

- 1a) Morning Blessings, pages 96-98
- 1) Introductory Prayers and Psalms of Praise (Psukei D'Zimra) pages 115-136
- * Optimally, one should recite all these prayers.
- * Minimally, one must say:
- a) Blessed is He who spoke (Boruch Sh'amar) p. 125
- b) Happy are those ... (Ashrei) p. 127-128
- c) The soul of every living ... (*Nishmas*) p.133, and onward.

One says everything until the "Hatzi Kaddish" before ברכו (Barechu) on page 136

- 2) Say all the Blessings before & after the "Shema" till the end of the "Silent Amida" [without "Kedusha"] pages 137-155
- 3) Regarding prayers appearing in the Chazzan's Repetition for Shacharis, one may recite the following, but is not obligated to do so:
- "ובכן תנו עז....תפארתו" "And thus ascribe upon Israel" page 169
- •"ובכן לך הכל יכתירו....לתומך תמימיו ביום דין" And thus shall all crown His sincere ones on the day of judgement" pps. 170-171

One should not say the public Vidui//Confession in the Chazzan's Repetition

- 4) Recite Avinu Malkeinu (p. 190), Psalm of the Day (p.193) and LeDovid/ By David (p.196)
- 5) Torah Reading: pages 202-203
- 6) Haftorah: pages 207-208

OPTIONAL TO RECITE*

אתה הראת/אין כמוך....בקדושתו ("You have been shown to His people Israel") page 198

בריך שמיה ("Blessed is the Name ... for peace") page 199 ביבנו של עולם...ולשלם ("Master of the world ...") ("Blessed is the Name ... and for peace) pages 161-162

DO NOT RECITE*

Blessings before/after Aliya as well as blessings before/after the Torah Readings and Haftarah

•ה' ה'...ונקה• (middle of page 198)

- 8) Recite Yizkor (if obligated) page 210-211
- 9) Recite Ashrei page 212
- 10) Recite the Silent Amidah for Musaf pages 215-226
- 11) Regarding prayers that appear in the Chazzan's Repetition for Musaf, one must recite the "Seder HaAvodah" from "אתה כוננת" ("You established") through " כל אלה" ("All these") pages 246-258

One should *not* say the public Vidui/Confession in the repetition

One can also say (no obligation):

- * U'nesaneh Tokef / Let us proclaim p. 238
- * Ha'ochayz / He holds until Pa'alo / sincere pps. 241-242
- * Aileh Ezkarah / These I recall *until* Keesay Rachamim / Throne of Mercy pgs. 266-270

OPTIONAL TO RECITE

Va'yee been'soah / B'reech - Whenever the Ark / Blessed is the Name *until* V'leesh'lam / for peace page 302

DO NOT RECITE

Blessings before/after Aliya as well as blessings before/after the Haftarah

- 1) Silent Amidah pages 310-319
- 2) One should *not* recite the public Vidui/Confession in the Chazzan's Repetition for Mincha
- 3) Recite Avinu Malkeinu pages 342-344
- 4) Recite L'Dovid / By David pages 345-346

NE'ILAH

- 1) Recite Ashrei and Uva LeTzion pages 347-349
- 2) Silent Amidah pages 350-357
- 3) Regarding prayers that appear in the Chazzan's Repetition for Ne'ilah, one should not recite the public Vidui/Confession
- 4) Though not obligated, one may recite all the Selichot for Ne'ilah with the exception of * Hashem, Hashem / Lord, Lord until U'n'chal'tanu / own possession (for example, on the top of page 365).
- 5) Recite Avinu Malkeinu pages 377-378
- 6) Recite " שׁמעׁ...הוא האלו-הים/ Shema Hashem Hu Ha'Elokim page 379

MAARIV FOR MOTZEI / End of YOM KIPPUR

- 1) Recite Maariv pages 390-400 Aleinu, page 401
- 2) One may sound the Shofar when Yom Kippur ends
- 3) Recite Havdalah over a cup of wine/grape juice and a candle that had been lit from prior to the onset of Yom Kippur p.403
