Age Guidelines:

- b) 65 74: Welcome only with a note or letter from their personal physician attesting that their health is good enough to reasonably assume the risk of a 45 minute (or for Shabbos, a three-hour) indoor prayer service held with medically-guided precautions. Parshas Noach

As a result of Mankind's evil, G-d brings a flood to destroy every living creature. Only Noah, his family, and at least one pair of every animal species were spared. Trivia question: Do you know the name of Noah's wife? (hint -- it is NOT 'Joan of Ark') When the flood waters begin to recede after a lengthy deluge, Noah sends forth from the ark a raven and dove to determine whether the land has dried sufficiently so that they can leave the ark to once again resettle the earth. G-d promises that He will never again destroy all of Mankind by means of a flood, and He designates the rainbow as a sign for that eternal covenant. Noah plants a vineyard, drinks from its produce and becomes drunk. In his intoxicated state, he shamefully uncovers himself. While his son Ham dealt with his father inappropriately, Noah's other two sons, Shem and Japeth, cover their father in a respectful manner. Generations pass and the world is repopulated. 
In the Community

The St Louis, Missouri **Post 644 of the Jewish War Veterans** will observe Veterans Day (November 11, 2020) with a ceremony at the flag pole in front of the Jewish Federation Building (12 Millstone Campus Drive, St., Louis, Missouri 63146). The Ceremony will take place at 11:00 AM, November 11, 2020 (rain or shine). (Face Masks and Social Distancing will be observed.)

Health guidelines for attending Minyanim:

Anyone 64 or younger with a comorbidity appearing on the following list may attend only with the physician's note attesting that their health is good enough to reasonably assume the risk of a 45 minute (or for Shabbos, a three-hour) indoor prayer service held with medically-guided precautions

- •*People of all ages with underlying medical conditions, particularly if not well controlled, including:
- * People with chronic lung disease or moderate to severe asthma
- * . People who have serious heart conditions
- *People who are immunocompromised. Many conditions can cause a person to be immunocompromised, including cancer treatment, smoking, bone marrow or organ transplantation, immune deficiencies, poorly controlled HIV or AIDS, and prolonged use of corticosteroids and other immune weakening medications
- *People with severe obesity (body mass index [BMI] ≥40)
- *People with diabetes
- *People with chronic kidney disease undergoing dialysis
- *People with liver disease



The 7 Noahide Laws: Universal Morality

The Torah of Moses is a truth for all humanity, whether Jewish or not. The Torah (as explained in the Talmud - Sanhedrin 58b) presents seven mitzvot for non-Jews to observe. These seven laws are the pillars of human civilization, and are named the "Seven Laws of Noah," since all humans are descended from Noah who survived the Great Flood. They are:

- 1. Do not murder.
- 2. Do not steal.
- 3. Do not worship false gods.
- 4. Do not be sexually immoral.
- 5. Do not eat a limb removed from a live animal.
- Do not curse G-d.
- 7. Set up courts and bring offenders to justice.

Maimonides explains that any human being who faithfully observes these laws earns a proper place in heaven. So, the Torah is for all humanity, no conversion necessary.

These laws were communicated by G-d to Adam and Noah, ancestors of all human beings. That is what makes these rules universal.

Laws made by humans may change according to circumstance. But laws made by the Creator of all souls, over all of time, remain the same – for all people and at all times.

"They Tried" - Noach (Genesis 6:9-11:32)

'Shooting the messenger' is a well-known phrase used to describe the act of blaming the bearer of bad news. In war a messenger would be sent from one camp to another, and the receiver might take out their anger on the unlucky envoy upon receiving negative information.

When Noah wanted to see if the flood water had subsided, he sent out a dove to see if she would find a resting place. Had the dove returned with a piece of vegetation this would show Noah that the waters had lowered.

Unsuccessful in her mission, she returned to the ark empty-handed.

Rabbi Berlin points out that the dove did not fly into the ark. She thought that her master would not allow her to come back inside as she was not presenting him with what he wanted to see!

Noah however had compassion and took her into his hand to warm her, "and he put forth his hand and took her and brought her to him into the ark" (Genesis 8:9).

An important lesson. If we ask someone to do something for us and they are unsuccessful, we should still treat them as if they were successful, not forgetting to express gratitude for the attempt.

We need to see the human behind the actions. Even if our emotions tempt us otherwise, we must always treat people with kindness and compassion.
