Parshas Mishpatim

Following on the heels of the Ten Commandments, this week's Torah portion deals primarily with civil law. Like the realm of the ceremonial, our worldly and common activities must be infused with holiness and observed carefully. Included among the civil laws discussed in the portion are: Penalties for causing bodily injury to another person and damaging his property; laws regarding borrowers; the mitzvah to show sensitivity to the poor and to offer them free loans; and laws relating to the honest dispensation of justice. After mentioning the mitzvos of Shabbos and Shemittah (the Sabbatical year), the portion continues with a brief discussion of the three pilgrimage festivals -- Passover, Shavuos and Sukkos. The Torah then returns to the revelation at Mt. Sinai. The Jewish people declare their commitment to do whatever G-d commands with the famous phrase "Everything G-d has said, we will do and we will listen." The portion concludes with Moses' ascending the mountain, where he will remain for forty days and forty nights to receive the rest of the Torah.

Parshas Shekalim

The first of the Four Special Shabbatot at this time of year is Parshas Shekalim. The special maftir reading discusses the census that would happen at this time of year in Temple times. Each person would give one half-shekel. The money would be counted, and that would determine the census. And the Torah makes very clear that "the poor person shall not give less, and the rich person shall not give more."

Shabbos / PURIM

Dear Members and Friends,

I am pleased to inform you that based upon guidance from our medical advisors, we will be able to accommodate a total of twenty (20) individuals at Shabbos morning services beginning this coming Shabbos, February 13. On Shabbos mornings we will also begin the use of a brief health-screening questionnaire card with a fold-down tab. Upon entry to the shul, each person will be presented with a card to affirm the questions on the screening form.

With Purim just two weeks away, we are looking forward to a joyous and meaningful Purim. I'm also pleased to inform you that based upon guidance from our medical advisors we will be able to accommodate a total of thirty (30) NHBZ members for each of the Megillah readings. A Megillah reading will take place on Thursday evening, February 26 and Friday morning, February 27. For those wanting to attend our Megillah readings, reservations are a MUST.

Please contact Jeff Miller at jeff@nhbz.org or at 314 991-2100 x 2 to let him know if you would like to attend the evening and / or morning Megillah readings. The reservation deadline is Tuesday, February 23 at 5:00 P.M. We will also have a brief health-screening questionnaire at both of the Purim Megillah-reading services.

We do hope to accommodate all those interested in attending our Megillah readings. In the event that more than 30 individuals pre-register for a Megillah reading, a random selection will be made to determine those who can attend. In the event any members might be unable to attend a Megillah reading due to capacity restrictions, those members will have first priority to attend our other Megillah reading.

Regarding children under the age of 13 (boys) and 12 (girls), we must ask that they be registered only as 'alternates' in the event we do not have 30 registrations for our Megillah readings. Since hearing the Megillah on Purim is a halachic obligation for adults, any adult NHBZ member will have first priority to attend.

We also plan to broadcast both of our Megillah readings by Zoom. If an individual is unable to attend a live Megillah reading, he or she can rely upon the opinion that one can fulfill the mitzvah of hearing the Megillah read by Zoom.

The Purim Seudah (festive meal) can be fulfilled in the morning (Friday), but in any event should be completed by 2:30 P.M. Regarding the mitzvah of Mishloach Manos (gifts of food), one can fulfill the mitzvah by leaving a Mishloach Manos package on a person's porch if it is a safe and secure area and the recipient will receive it on Purim provided that the recipient is made aware of the identity of the giver.

Please keep in mind that the mitzvah of Mishloach Manos only requires the delivery of two separate food or drink items to one person. Therefore, although in most years it is considered

praiseworthy to give Mishloach Manos to many people during this year one may rely upon fulfillment of the essential mitzvah to give Mishloach Manos to one individual.

Matanos L'Evyonim (Tzedaka on Purim Day) can be given in advance to those who will be distributing gifts to the poor on Purim from Matanos L'Evyonim funds. As in past years, I will be distributing Matanos L'Evyonim both locally and through the worthy organization of Od Yosef Chai. If you would like me to be your proxy to distribute Matanos L'Evyonim, please make sure your check arrives at the synagogue no later than Wednesday, February 24. The check should be made out to 'The Rabbi's Fund' with a notation 'for Purim Tzedaka.

Parshas Zachor will be read at shul on Shabbos, February 20. For those not able to attend, hopefully we will all be able to be in shul this summer to listen to Parshas Zachor again at the conclusion of Parshas Ki Teitzei (8/21/2021), at which point someone who did not previously hear it live should have in mind to fulfill the obligation again at that time.

Mishpatim: Inspiring Everyday Life

The name of our parshah is *Mishpatim*, which means "laws." There are several words for "law" in Hebrew. All have a similar meaning, but a slightly different nuance.

Mishpatim, or "judgements," means laws which can easily be understood, such as not to steal and not to kill. In fact, most of the laws in our parshah are of this nature.

Another term--chukim, or "statutes"--means laws which cannot be understood by ordinary human intellect. An example of these is the law not to mix milk and meat, which is also written in this parshah. Many times in our history the laws of this kind have presented a challenge to us. In some epochs the non-Jews mocked us for adhering to them. In our own age, governed by rationality, many Jews wonder why they are necessary. Nonetheless, the *chukim* are an important aspect of our bond with G-d.

A third kind of law is called *edut*, "testimony." The command to observe Passover is in this category. We keep this festival as a testimony and a sign of the fact that G-d took us out Egypt. Without the Torah we would not have thought of this law, but now that we have it, it makes sense to us.

It is interesting that the totally miraculous atmosphere of last week's parshah, in which G-d spoke to the entire nation from Mount Sinai, is followed by the comparatively ordinary and down-to-earth laws of this week's parshah, which is aptly called *Mishpatim*. We might have expected a demand for a more intense aspect of our relationship with G-d, such as that expressed in the beyond-rational "statutes" or at least the "testimonies." Why is the emphasis rather on simple laws of justice between man and his fellow?

The answer is that this fact itself helps us understand something about the Torah and its purpose. There is a physical dimension to life: the material world of everyday affairs. There is also a spiritual, Divine dimension, a realm of infinite purity and holiness.


The purpose of the Torah is to join these two dimensions together. Through obedience to the Torah, our normal everyday lives can become an expression of the Divine.

This point is emphasized by the juxtaposition of the two *parshiot*. Last week was the *parshah* which spoke of G-d's revelation. This week is the *parshah* which concerns the everyday, the simple laws which anyone can understand. Due to the power of the Torah, the inspiration of Sinai becomes comprehensible and meaningful on the level of daily life. Through this the two realms are joined.

In the details of the practical world, lived in accordance with the Torah, we discover the Presence of the Divine.




