#### Message From the President

Shalom,

It has been quite some time since I have written to you, and still longer since we have seen each other face to face. I am excited to announce that we are reopening our shul to full usage and that **June 2021** has been designated as our **HOMECOMING MONTH.** 

Based on guidance from our medical professionals, federal (CDC), state and local authorities, we are immediately restarting our regular programs, as well as new and interesting ones intended to welcome you back to your energized and vibrant Jewish community. We are creating opportunities for you to get reacquainted with old friends and meet new ones, recapture your spiritual health, provide opportunities for growing Jewishly and do so in a safe and responsible environment. The last year has taught us that we need each other! Please see below the (growing) list of our upcoming programs to kick start our **HOMECOMING**:

- On **Sunday**, **5/30/2021**, you are invited to a BBQ—both sit down and carry out are available
- Starting on **6/5/2021** Rabbi Smason will be conducting his weekly, in person, "Starting Points" Shabbat program at 10:15 am.
- Starting on **6/5/2021** Rabbi David of Aish HaTorah is restarting his weekly, in person "Learners Service" Shabbat Program at 9:15 am.
- As a welcome back, on 6/5/2021 we will have a special Kiddush
- On Sunday, 6/13/2021 we will host an Ice Cream Social
- On Sunday, 7/25/2021 we will have a full BBQ event in Irv Zeid Park
- And...every day, and every Shabbat, we have our regular religious services at our regular times. Please join us for services, and hear our Rabbis share uplifting words of wisdom, and flex those "social" muscles.

(Obviously if the situation changes, we may need to alter these based on the protocols that will be required at their scheduled times. We will, of course, provide you with notices in such event.)

Rabbi Smason has approved the opening of our shul for services and programs, including the ones listed above, with still responsible but far less constraining protocols. The protocols for attendance have been frequently changing. So, I want to summarize, in a hopefully understandable fashion, the protocols for the foreseeable future:

- The shul is open without any restrictions concerning the number or ages of attendees
- Vaccination cards and advanced registrations are no longer required
- Fully vaccinated individuals do not require masks, nor practice social distancing, indoors or outside
- For their own safety and that of others, those who are not fully vaccinated must continue to wear masks and social distance at least three feet when indoors
- As you can tell from the upcoming events, we have begun to serve food, practically a hallmark of NHBZ. And this is being done with appropriate safeguards. Shabbat Kiddushim and Seudah Shlishit on Shabbat afternoon have restarted. Only fully vaccinated individuals may work in the kitchen and be involved in food service at any synagogue event. For the time being we are serving food with single serve distribution and less congregating in lines rather than our normal "buffet" style.
- Whether vaccinated or not, anyone who exhibits COVID like symptoms may not attend shul until any fever subsides, and they have received a negative COVID-test result. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me or Rabbi Smason.

Upon your return, you will notice that we have installed a permanent pergola on the patio, and awnings and security bollards at our entrances. When you come you will see your shul with a face lift. Besides these, many other infrastructure projects were carried out, some visible and some less so.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Directors, the Executive, the various committee heads and their volunteers, professional staff and, not the least, Rabbi Smason and Assistant Rabbi Okin, for doing their outmost to keep our shul as actively engaged as has been possible. I would also like to thank the "Minyanaires" who consistently attended our services during weekdays and all the men and ladies who came for Shabbat services. And, of course, a thanks go out to all the attendees on our daily ZOOM programs. Yashar Kochachem.

I hope that you will find these guidelines sufficient to return. As always, our goal is not merely to make it *possible* for you attend your shul, but to provide opportunities that *compel* you to attend. We want and need you back and hope you appreciate that you need to come back. It has been too long. We hope to see you very soon at our Services and Programs. And do not forget to bring your friends.

#### Message from Rabbi Smason:

Effective immediately, based upon recent updated CDC guidelines, updated CRC (Chicago Rabbinical Council) synagogue guidelines and in consultation with our synagogue's medical and health professionals, I present the following, updated NHBZ Covid guidelines.

- 1. Fully vaccinated individuals no longer must wear masks, nor practice social distancing, indoors or outside.
- 2. Those who are *not* fully vaccinated must continue to wear masks and social distance at least *three feet* indoors.
- 3. Only fully vaccinated individuals may work in the kitchen and be involved in food service at any synagogue event.
- 4. Whether vaccinated or not, anyone who exhibits COVID-like symptoms may not attend shul until any fever subsides, and they have received a negative COVID test result.
- 5. We will maintain seating that allows for social distancing for those who are not fully vaccinated or who are at particularly high-risk.
- 6. For enhanced safety we encourage everyone to consider wearing their masks during services, even for those not required to do so by these new guidelines.
- \* The Center for Disease Control considers you fully vaccinated **two weeks after** your final vaccination shot

I express my abundant thanks to all who have assisted us in reaching these wonderful milestones for these significant steps for the re-opening of our shul. I thank the shul's president, Board of Directors, and in particular our synagogue's medical and health professionals (listed below) who have been instrumental in generously providing me with their guidance and time.

#### Guidelines for Food Service as of May 17, 2021 Per Rabbi Ze'ev Smason


- If you are fully vaccinated, you do not need to be 'socially distanced' while eating, but we prefer that you eat in small groups of those whom you know are vaccinated.
- If you are not fully vaccinated, please maintain a 'social distance' of at least 3 feet from others (except for those who are in your 'pod').
- All servers will wear gloves and masks, and will be fully vaccinated.
- Servers will distribute pre-packaged food. When getting food from the serving table, please do not gather around the table, but rather, approach the server one at a time.



# Learning at NHBZ

#### Parshas Beha'aloscha

Beha'aloscha (Hebrew for "when you step up") is thematically diverse, be-ginning with the daily lighting of the golden menorah in the Mishkan. The Levites are initiated into the Tabernacle service. The Torah then describes the celebration of Passover in the second year in the desert, complete with the bringing of the Korban Pesach (Pass-over offering). Some men could not bring the offering due to ritual impurity, and were thus commanded to celebrate Pesach Sheni, a 'make-up Passover' a month later. Lesson: Second chances are available. Additionally. the standard procedure by which the Jewish people would break camp to travel in the desert is described. Soon after leaving Mt. Sinai, the people begin to kvetch. Spurred by the mixed multitude of insincere converts who joined the Jewish people upon leaving Egypt, the complaining is directed toward the manna, their daily miraculous portion of heavenly bread. G-d sends a massive flock of quail which the people gather to eat; those who had complained about the lack of food overstuff themselves and die during this supernatural event. The portion concludes with Miriam speaking loshon hara (defamatory words) to Aaron about their brother Moses. She is punished by G-d with tzaraas (a skin condition indicating a spiritual deficiency) and is guarantined outside the camp for seven days.



#### Beha'aloscha (Numbers 8-12) "Speak Lower, I Can't Hear You"

He (G-d) said, "Please hear my words..." (Numbers 12:6)

Miriam and Aharon spoke *lashon hara*, derogatory speech, against Moshe. Although they had not acted with malice, in fact speaking more out of concern for Moshe's welfare, G-d's anger flared up and He rebuked them. However, when G-d addressed them He spoke in a very soft tone, starting: *"Please hear My words..."* The *Sifsei Chachamim* explains that even though G-d was angry at Miriam and Aharon, He still spoke to them in a soft tone, for if He would have spoken to them in a harsh and angry tone, His words would not have been heeded.

When a person is spoken to harshly he feels under attack. His pride is at stake and he therefore does not fully hear what is being said. If G-d was careful in how He spoke to Miriam and Aharon who were prophets, then how much more so should we speak carefully to our spouses, colleagues or acquaintances. Even when one must confront an enemy, or admonish someone for a terrible misdeed, one should speak gently, for gentle words have a greater effect than words that are shouted and screamed. King Solomon teaches "A soft answer turns away wrath." While one provocative remark can kindle anger, even the most intense fury can be soothed by a gentle word. Always remember: the louder the word the quieter it is heard.
