

#### Shabbos Chazon - July 17

The Shabbos preceding the Ninth of Av is called *Shabbos Chazon*—"Shabbas of the Vision." This Shabbos' reading from the Prophets begins with the words *Chazon Yeshayahu*, the "vision of Isaiah", regarding the destruction of the Holy Temple. The legendary chassidic master Rabbi Levi Yitzchak of Berditchev said that on this special Shabbos, every Jewish soul is shown a vision of the third Holy Temple. The purpose of this vision is to arouse within every Jew a yearning to actually see this edifice which will be built by G-d, and to do as many mitzvos as possible in order to realize this dream. While this vision may not be sensed with the physical eyes, the soul certainly experiences this vision, and it affects the person on the subconscious level. Though Shabbos this year is erev Tisha B'Av, even eating meat and drinking wine are permissible until just before sunset at 8:23 pm. From that point on we refrain from all eating and drinking until the conclusion of the fast.

#### <u>Tisha B'Av - July 18</u>

The 9 Days reaches its climax and concludes with the *Fast of the 9th of Av.* The fast begins July 17 at 8:23 pm and ends July 18 at 9:04 pm. This is the saddest day of the Jewish calendar, and it is also the date that many other tragedies befell our people. We read Eicha, the Book of Lamentations, on erev Tisha B'Av Ma'ariv, and Tisha B'Av morning Shachris. Tallis and Tefilin are worn at Mincha instead of Shachris. #### **Ask Our Rabbis!**

**Q:** More often than not, I am still reciting the Shemona Esrei when the Chazzan starts the repetition. What do we do if we are still praying silently and he gets to Kedusha? Do we continue our personal praying? Do we stop and answer back during that section, and when done, go back to where we were davening? Do we stop and not say anything?

**A:** The Shemona Esrei (also known as the Amidah, or the Silent Devotion) is a special opportunity to have a personal, one-on-one encounter with HaShem. When reciting the Shemona Esrei, we are standing in the presence of the Almighty; as such, one should not interrupt one's personal prayers to respond to any other prayers. In the situation you describe (when the Chazzan begins Kedusha), one should simply pause one's personal prayers and listen to the Chazzan's recitation of Kedusha. Listening to the Chazzan's words in such a situation is considered as if you, yourself, had recited the Kedusha! This is based upon the principle known as *shomey'ah k'oneh* -- "listening is considered as if you responded." When the Chazzan and congregation conclude Kedusha, you can then resume your personal prayers from the place where you paused.

#### **On-going Covid Guidelines**

#### **Food Service**

- If you are fully vaccinated, you do not need to be 'socially distanced' while eating, but we prefer that you eat in small groups of those whom you know are vaccinated
- If you are not fully vaccinated, please maintain a 'social distance' of at least 3 feet from others (except for those who are in your 'pod').
- All servers must be fully vaccinated, and must wear gloves and masks
- Servers will distribute pre-packaged food. When getting food from the serving table, please do not gather around the table, but rather, approach the server one at a time.

#### Temporary Safeguards

- We are not carrying the Torah around the Sanctuary
- Men with an Aliyah do not remain at the Bima for the next Aliyah, but return to their seats
- The "choir" is not leading singing from the Bima at the end of services
- The last two rows of seats in the sanctuary have every-other seat taped-off for those who
  prefer social distancing

# **Learning at NHBZ**

#### • Parshas Devarim -- Deuteronomy 1:1 - 3:11 by Rabbi Smason

This week we begin the fifth and final book of the Torah, Deuteronomy. This Book is also called Mishna Torah, "Repetition of the Torah" - thus the Greek Title 'Deuteronomy.' Its contents were spoken by Moses to the Jewish people during the final five weeks of his life as the people prepared to cross the Jordan River into the land of Israel. A central theme of Deuteronomy is Moses'



review of the mitzvos, and his emphasis on the change of lifestyle the Jewish people were to undergo. The transition was to be made from a supernatural existence in the desert to a natural life to be experienced in the Land of Israel. The portion begins with Moses' veiled rebuke in which he makes reference to the many sins and rebellions of the past forty years. Moses spends significant time discussing the failed mission of the spies; ten of the twelve men sent to scout out the land returned with a bad report, resulting in the entire nation wandering in the desert for forty years. Moses later discusses the Children of Israel's conquest on the eastern bank of the Jordan River. This Torah portion concludes with words of encouragement for Moses' successor Joshua.
