Learning at NHBZ

Ask Our Rabbis!

Q: Shabbos candle sticks are sold in pairs of twos. However, I also have my mother's candelabra which holds 5 candles and my grandmother's also held 5 candles. They both lit all 5 candles. How many candles are to be lit on Shabbos?

A: One of the most iconic Shabbos symbols is that of the Candles lit 18 minutes before sunset every Friday afternoon. The Talmud (Shabbos 23b) tells us that the reason for this Rabbinic commandment is to bring peace and tranquility in the Jewish home. It is very difficult to enjoy the Friday night meal in the dark, so the Rabbis instructed all Jewish homes to have light in order to both honor and enjoy Shabbos.

The Mishnah Berurah (OC 263:6) points out that technically speaking, a family has fulfilled the Mitzvah of Lighting Shabbos Candles with just one light. Rabbi Yosef Karo (Shulchan Aruch OC 263:1) notes that the prevalent custom is to light 2 candles to represent the 2 aspects of our observance of Shabbos. The first aspect is that of Zachor, the positive commandments of Shabbos, represented by the verse "Remember *(Zachor)* the day of Shabbos and make it holy" (Exodus 20:8). The second aspect is that of Shamor, refraining from the negative commandments of Shabbos, represented by the verse "Keep *(Shamor)* the day of Shabbos and make it holy" (Deuteronomy 5:12). In order to remember these facets of Shabbos, many Jews light 2 candles.

However, many have the custom to light 1 additional candle for each child in the family, and others light an additional candle for each grandchild (Pischei Teshuvos OC 263:2)! At the end of the day, whether 1, 2, or many more candles are lit in the home on Friday afternoon, this beautiful Mitzvah enhances the atmosphere and ambiance of the Shabbos experience.

Parshas Ki Savo - by Rabbi Smason

The parsha begins by describing the annual mitzvah for farmers in Israel to bring their *bikurim*, or first fruits, to the Kohen in the Temple. The donor was then to recite a prayer of thanksgiving, recalling how G-d had delivered his ancestors from Egypt and brought the new generation into a land flowing with milk and honey. Moses then teaches two special mitzvos, which the Jewish people are to perform upon entering the land of Israel. First, they are to inscribe the entire Torah on twelve large stones. Second, the twelve tribes are to ratify their acceptance of the Torah in the following manner: six tribes were to stand on Mt. Gerizim, representing the blessings, while the remaining six tribes were to stand on Mt. Eival, signifying the curses. The Levites were to stand in the valley between, reciting blessings and curses which will apply respectively to those who observe and defy the Torah. The parsha concludes with a recounting of the wonderful blessings G-d will bestow upon the Jewish people for remaining faithful, and a chilling prophecy of what might happen if the Jewish people do not follow the Torah.

Learning at NHBZ (continued)

• In the Month of Elul

- Elul is a good time to have one's *tefillin* and *mezuzos* checked by an accredited scribe, to ensure that they are in good condition and fit for use.
- During the last week of Elul, in the days leading up to Rosh Hashanah, the Selichos prayers are recited. On the first night they are recited at or after midnight; on the following days, in the early morning. Selichos begins early Sunday morning at NHBZ on August 29 at 12:30 A.M.

The Month of Elul

Elul is the 12th and final month in the Jewish calendar (the 6th month counting from Nisan). It is a month that connects the past year with the coming year—a time when we reflect on where we stand and where we should be going.

Every day of Elul we blow the shofar and recite special Psalms in anticipation of the High Holidays, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.


It is called "the month of repentance," "the month of mercy" and "the month of forgiveness." Elul follows the two previous months of Tammuz and Av-months of tragedies that were brought upon us through our sins. In Tammuz, the Jews sinned with the golden calf; on Rosh Chodesh Elul, Moses ascended to Mount Sinai for a third 40-day period until Yom Kippur, when he descended with the second tablets (*luchot*) and G-d's word of joyful, wholehearted forgiveness. (The first time Moses ascended was to receive the first tablets; the second time was after the sin, to ask for forgiveness; and this third time was to receive the second set of tablets.) These were days when G-d revealed to the Jewish people great mercy. Since then, this time has been designated as a time of mercy and forgiveness, an opportune time for *teshuvah*—repentance. We approach G-d with a desire to return and connect... and He reciprocates with Divine expressions of mercy and forgiveness. -chabad.org
