

Annual Membership Meeting and Election of Officers Sunday, Nov. 14, 11:00 am







You are invited to attend the Annual Membership Meeting and Election of Officers on Sunday, November 14, at 11:00 am. We will publish a Zoom link soon.

Each November, we hold a Membership meeting to give a 'state of the shul' report and elect officers and members of the Board of Directors. This is an opportunity for you to interact directly with the Rabbis, President and other officers and Board members about the business of the shul. If you would like to give your opinion, makes suggestions or just listen, this is your chance.

Here is how the election works. We have a nominating committee that consists of all past presidents. That committee deliberates throughout the year, and it comes up with a proposed slate of officers that is presented to the Board of Directors. At the November Membership meeting, the slate is officially nominated, and other nominations are accepted from the floor. You can even nominate yourself. Members in good standing may nominate others and may have the privilege of voting. Nominees must be members in good standing for at least one year at time of nomination. The Officers and new Board members take office on January 1.

We have eight officers and fifteen Board members. Officers serve for one year, and can be reelected. Board members serve for three years, with one third of the Board up for election
each year. Sometimes we have a vacancy mid-term, and must nominate somebody to fill the
remaining time of a term. We will publish the nominees for this year's election when they are
announced to the Board.

Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Vayera – By Rabbi Smason

The parsha begins with Abraham's incredible display of chesed (kindness) to three angels who appear as men. This, despite extreme discomfort from his recent bris milah (circumcision). The angels declare that Sarah will give birth to her first child at the age of 90 when Abraham would be 100. Later, Abraham pleads to G-d on behalf of the cities of Sodom and Gemorrah. However, the cities are soon destroyed, but not before the angels save Abraham's nephew Lot and his family from destruction. Later the parsha describes how Sarah is abducted by Avimelech, the king of Gerar, who did not realize she was married. G-d responds by striking him with a plague which prevents him from touching her. Sarah conceives and gives birth to Isaac, and Abraham makes a huge celebration. Sarah sees Ishmael (Abraham's son from Hagar) as a menace to her own son's spiritual well-being and asks Abraham to expel Ishmael and Hagar. The Torah portion concludes with the akeidah, Abraham's tenth and final test, in which he shows his willingness to comply with G-d's command to bring his beloved son Isaac as an offering.

On-going Covid Guidelines Shul Policy

NHBZ requires that all people attending tefila (prayer services), classes or other NHBZ programs and activities show proof of vaccination. Ask Our Rabbis

Q: If we wanted to learn how to do Havdalah, including the appropriate melodies, what would be the best way for us to go about it?

A: Havdalah is an important aspect of the Shabbos and Holiday experience. It is beyond the scope of this answer to describe the step-by-step process. Please check out the links below for articles and videos that elaborate on these ideas.

It is important to reflect on the purpose of Havdalah. The Rambam (Hilchos Shabbos 29:1) says that as part of the Mitzvah of Shabbos, the Torah requires one to make a verbal expression of the sanctity and holiness of Shabbos when it begins and when it concludes. The procedure at the beginning of Shabbos is called Kiddush, Sanctification, and the procedure at the end of Shabbos is known as Havdalah, Separation. As with many Mitzvos, we elevate statements and blessing by reciting them over a cup of wine, which is the procedure for both Kiddush and Havdalah.

Here is one thought about the significance of Hadvalah. By formally concluding Shabbos and Yom Tov, we are acknowledging the sanctity and holiness of the time that has just concluded. This better allows us to bring the holiness with us into the week ahead.

Vayeira (Genesis 18-22)

The Most Powerful Parenting Technique

He (Lot) said, "Behold now, my lords; turn about please, to your servant's house; spend the night and wash your feet, then wake up early and go your way..." He made a feast for them and baked matzos, and they ate (19:2-3).

Many books have been written about parenting. There is universal agreement that the single greatest influence on children is their parents' behavior. All other techniques parents may employ are not nearly as effective as what they themselves do. Parental behavior is deeply engrained in children.

The Torah teaches us this in the character of Lot. Lot was a rogue who rejected Abraham, saying, "I want neither Abram nor his G-d" (Rashi, Genesis 13:11). Lot chose to live in the corrupt city of Sodom, fully aware of their decadence (ibid 13:13). He married a woman of Sodom, who turned into a pillar of salt as punishment because when Lot asked her to give his guests salt, she said, "Are you trying to bring this wicked trait of hospitality to us?" (Midrash). According to the Midrash, giving food and shelter to wayfarers was punishable by death in Sodom.

Yet this depraved scoundrel, Lot, risked his life to take in guests, and indeed aroused the entire populace against him. He put himself in even greater danger when he defied the populace and sought to protect his guests. This seems to be incongruous with his degenerate character.

R' Meir Rubman (Zichron Meir) says that having been exposed to his Uncle Abraham in his youth and having witnessed the overwhelming dedication which Abraham had to hachnasas orchim, welcoming guests, made an indelible impression on Lot. There is every reason to believe that Lot assimilated to his environment, and indeed, he was spared from the destruction of Sodom solely because he was Abraham's nephew (Rashi, Genesis 19:17). In spite of his depravity, he could not extirpate this particular trait, to the point of risking his life to be hospitable to guests.

This is a convincing example of the power of early imprinting. It is commonplace that children who were victims of parental abuse may swear that they will never be harsh to their children, yet they often repeat the very abuse they despised. This may seem to defy logic. However, the early imprinting of a behavior may overwhelm logic. There is only one effective method to teach children proper behavior, and that is for parents to practice it themselves.


