

On-going Covid Guidelines Shul Policy

NHBZ requires that all people attending tefila (prayer services), classes or other NHBZ programs and activities show proof of vaccination. You may show your vaccination card to Rabbi Smason whenever convenient for you both, or on Shabbos as you enter the shul. Once you have shown Rabbi Smason your vaccination card, there is no need to do so again.

If we have no proof of vaccination, you are welcome to join Shabbos services from the Kaiser Terrace on the West side of the synagogue. You are also welcome to enter the synagogue to ask a question of the rabbis and staff, conduct business in the office, pick up or leave an item, or for any other reason that might last for a brief period of time.

Masks required of all inside attendees, age 3 and older; masks are strongly encouraged for those outside, too. Children aged 12 and older have the same vaccination requirements as adults.

Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Vayeshev – By Rabbi Smason

Jacob's favoritism toward Joseph incites his brother's hatred. Their jealousy increases when Joseph tells them about two dreams which indicate that they will one day be subservient to him. Jacob sends Joseph to check up on his brothers, and upon seeing him approaching they plot to kill him. Reuben convinces the brothers not to kill Joseph, but is unable to totally save him as the brothers sell Joseph into slavery in Egypt. After dipping Joseph's coat in blood, they return to their father who assumes that his beloved son was torn apart by a savage beast. The Torah then digresses to relate the story of Judah and his daughter-in-law Tamar. The narrative then returns to Joseph in Egypt, where he becomes an extremely successful slave and is placed in charge of his master's household. His master's wife repeatedly tries to seduce Joseph, and when he refuses he is thrown into prison. Ten years later, Pharaoh's chief butler and baker are placed into the same prison. One night they each have a perplexing dream that Joseph accurately interprets, setting the stage for his release from prison.

Ask our Rabbis

Q: Is it appropriate to stand during the repetition of the Amidah when the Modim D'Rabbanan (the blessing of thanksgiving) is said?

A: The Shulchan Aruch (Ramah: O.H. 144,4) writes "Some say that all the congregation stand during the repetition of the Amidah by the Chazzan". The Mishna Brurah there explains that as the Chazzan is saying the blessings for the congregation, it is as if we ourselves are saying the Amidah, which must be said standing. Based on this it is certainly correct to stand during the repetition of the Amidah. However, in many places this is not the custom. The Mishna Brurah points this out, noting (sadly) that "nowadays everyone does whatever they want - including sitting and chatting!" [It is certainly forbidden to talk during the Chazzan's repetition]. It would seem that if the local custom is to sit, one may join them so as not to "stand out". Also, in any case, if it is difficult for one to stand, one is allowed to sit.

And to answer your specific question: Even if a person sits during the Amida repetition, it is recommended and praiseworthy to stand when Modim D'Rabbanan is said.



Parsha Vayeshev (Genesis 37-40)

Snakes and Scorpions

Parshat Vayeshev tells of Joseph being thrown by his brothers into a pit. The Torah describes the pit as being "empty and without water."

This raises a question: If the verse says that the pit was **empty**, why does it also need to tell us there was no water?

The answer is that there is no such thing as a completely empty pit. The laws of physics tell us that something will always permeate a vacuum. So, in this case, the "empty pit" had no water, but it did contain other, dangerous elements like snakes and scorpions.

This idea manifests in our own lives as well. The "pit without water" symbolizes a life without Torah, which is often compared to water. There's no such thing as "neutral." Something will always become your god and your guide. The guestion is: What will it be? Will we proactively fill that space with a good, positive element? Or will we just let some other - perhaps dangerous element - determine our outlook and habits?

With the threat of terror spreading worldwide, I am reminded of the adage from Edmund Burke: "The only thing that evil needs to flourish is for good men to do nothing."

Yes, nature abhors a vacuum... and that law applies to metaphysics as well. So let's fill the space that surrounds us -- with the beautiful overflowing fountain of Torah.
