

On-going Covid Guidelines Shul Policy

NHBZ requires that all people attending tefila (prayer services), classes or other NHBZ programs and activities show proof of vaccination. You may show your vaccination card to Rabbi Smason whenever convenient for you both, or on Shabbos as you enter the shul. Once you have shown Rabbi Smason your vaccination card, there is no need to do so again.

If we have no proof of vaccination, you are welcome to join Shabbos services from the Kaiser Terrace on the West side of the synagogue. You are also welcome to enter the synagogue to ask a question of the rabbis and staff, conduct business in the office, pick up or leave an item, or for any other reason that might last for a brief period of time.

Masks required of all inside attendees, age 3 and older; masks are strongly encouraged for those outside, too. Children aged 12 and older have the same vaccination requirements as adults.

Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Mikeitz – By Rabbi Smason

Pharaoh has a two-part dream about seven scrawny cows devouring seven robust cows, followed by seven thin stalks of grain swallowing seven healthy, good ones. When his advisers are unable to adequately interpret the dream, Pharaoh summons Joseph, who had been in prison for a total of twelve years. Ascribing his power of interpretation solely to G-d, Joseph tells Pharaoh that Egypt will first experience seven years of abundant crops, and then will be ravaged by a devastating famine. Pharaoh appoints Joseph as viceroy of Egypt, making him the second most powerful man in the land (this is a source for the sport of tennis in the Torah -- we see that Joseph ... served in Pharaoh's court). Joseph's wife Asnat gives birth to two sons, Menashe and Ephraim, and the years of plenty and famine unfold just as Joseph had predicted. With the famine devastating the land of Canaan (Israel), Joseph's brothers descend to Egypt to purchase food. When they don't recognize their royal brother, Joseph sets in motion a plan to determine if the brothers have fully repented for their sin of selling him almost twenty-two years before. Joseph acts detached, accusing them of being spies, and holds Simeon hostage. Joseph then allows the rest of the brothers to go with food to their father on the condition that they return with their youngest brother Benjamin. With great reluctance, Jacob agrees to this condition. Mikeitz concludes with the looming threat that Benjamin will be made a slave to the Egyptian ruler.

Ask our Rabbis

Q: What is the origin of Baruch Tihiyeh – "You should be blessed" when someone says Yasher Koach "May Your Strength Be True" to you for davening, chanting haftorah or other shul related participation? Are there other appropriate times when this is said?

A. The Gemara (Masseches Shabbos 87a) tells us that the source for the phrase of Yasher Koach is God's response to Moshe breaking the Luchos, the Tablets containing the Ten Commandments (Exodus 34:1), which is alluded to by the word 'Asher' in the verse. Our Rabbis tell us that Hashem agreed with Moshe's reasoning that the Jewish People were not ready to receive the Luchos. The Gemara does not make it clear whether Moshe had a response to God's Yasher Koach, and it is not clear what the source is for the phrase "Baruch Tihiyeh". It seems to be an equivalent to returning the blessing, almost a blend of 'Thank You' and "You Are Welcome". It is appropriate to return a blessing to one who paid him the blessing of "Yasher Koach."
