#### On-going Covid Guidelines Shul Policy

# **Learning at NHBZ**

### Parashas Mishpatim – By Rabbi Smason

Following on the heels of the Ten Commandments, this week's Torah portion deals primarily with civil law. Like the realm of the ceremonial, our worldly and common activities must be infused with holiness and observed carefully. Included among the civil laws discussed in the portion are: Penalties for causing bodily injury to another person and damaging his property; laws regarding borrowers; the mitzvah to show sensitivity to the poor and to offer them free loans; and laws relating to the honest dispensation of justice. After mentioning the mitzvos of Shabbos and Shemittah (the Sabbatical year), the portion continues with a brief discussion of the three pilgrimage festivals -- Passover, Shavuos and Sukkos. The Torah then returns to the revelation at Mt. Sinai. The Jewish people declare their commitment to do whatever G-d commands with the famous phrase "Everything G-d has said, we will do and we will listen." The portion concludes with Moses' ascending the mountain, where he will remain for forty days and forty nights to receive the rest of the Torah.

#### **Ask Our Rabbis**

Q. May I photocopy a page or two from a secular book for use in a class by my students?

A. This is permissible for a number of reasons. From the perspective of American law, photocopying a few pages of a work for educational use is allowed. From a Halachic perspective, the concept of copyright is almost universally accepted although there are a number of approaches as to what the issue is with violating copyright laws.

One opinion, that of Rabbi Yitzchak Yehuda Shmelkes (1828-1904), one of the leading rabbis in the latter part of the 19th century in Eastern Europe, is that the principle of copyright in Jewish Law is predicated on the principle of Dinah Demalchusa Dinah- the secular law of the land is incorporated and observed as part of the Halachic system. This includes all of the details and carveouts of the secular law in question. As copying a few pages for educational use is permitted in American law, it is permitted in Halachah as well.

It should be noted that the above answer applies to secular works, not to Judaic books or media. Many Judaic works include language that is stronger than the laws of American copyright law. It is a matter of Halachic dispute whether a publisher or author can make a condition of purchase that is stricter than the law of the land, and it is beyond the scope of this piece to address this facet of the interplay between secular law and Halachah.

When in doubt, request permission from the publisher.



#### We Will Do and We Will Hear

This week's parsha contains one of the most famous phrases in the Torah and one that has often been used to characterize Jewish faith as a whole. It consists of two words: na'aseh venishma, literally, "We will do and we will hear" (Ex. 24:7).

There are two famous interpretations of what this means. The first describes the enthusiasm and whole-heartedness with which the Israelites accepted the covenant with G-d at Mount Sinai. So keen were they to signal their assent to G-d that they agreed to His demands before knowing what they were. The second view: "We will do and we will understand" implies that we can only understand Judaism by doing it, by first performing the commands and living a Jewish life, then comes the grasp, the insight, and the comprehension.

# Rosh Chodesh-Adar I

Tuesday and Wednesday, February 1 and 2 is Rosh Chodesh ("Head of the Month") for the month of Adar I. This year is a shanah meuberet ("a pregnant year") or a leap year, which occurs 7 times in a 19-year cycle and has 13 months instead of the regular year's 12 on the Jewish calendar. This is how the lunar-based Jewish year remains aligned with the solar seasons (12 lunar months total of 354 days -- slightly more than 11 days short of the 365.25 day solar cycle). The added month is called "Adar I" and is inserted before the month of Adar ("Adar II" in leap years). Purim is celebrated on 14 Adar II on leap years, as are birthdays and most other anniversaries. Adar is the official happy month, as is written, "As soon as Adar begins, increase in joy!" It is a mitzvah to be 'extra happy' for 60 days!
