On-going Covid Guidelines Shul Policy

NHBZ requires that all people attending tefila (prayer services), classes or other NHBZ programs and activities show proof of vaccination. You may show your vaccination card to Rabbi Smason whenever convenient for you both, or on Shabbos as you enter the shul. Once you have shown Rabbi Smason your vaccination card, there is no need to do so again.

Masks required of all attendees, age 3 and older. Children aged 12 and older have the same vaccination requirements as adults.

Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Bo – By Rabbi Smason

This week's portion begins with the eighth plague that G-d brings upon the Egyptians as the land is covered by locusts, destroying all the remaining crops. After the plague is removed at Pharaoh's behest, he once again refuses to set free the Jewish people, and the ninth plague of darkness encompasses the land. When that plague ends, Pharaoh becomes even more defiant about not freeing the slaves, at which point Moses warns Pharaoh about the upcoming tenth plague, the death of the firstborn. The Torah then interrupts the narrative with the first mitzvah given to the Jewish people as a nation -- the sanctification of Rosh Chodesh (the new month), beginning with the month of Nisan. G-d teaches Moses about the Korban Pesach (Passover offering) and the remainder of the laws of the Passover holiday, which Moses then transmits to the Jewish people.

At midnight of the appointed night the plague strikes, with every non-Jewish first-born dying, including Pharaoh's own son. Pharaoh awakes, running through the streets (presumably while still in his pajamas) to tell Moses that he now consents to send the Jewish people from his country. The children of Israel travel forth in a hurry with the great wealth they have just been given by the Egyptians. The Torah portion concludes with various mitzvos relating to the Exodus.

Ask Our Rabbis

Q: Does one fulfill the *mitzva* of *bikur cholim* (visiting the sick) by "visiting" a sick person (*choleh*) by electronic means?

A: There is a consensus among rabbinic authorities that there is moral and *mitzva* value to "visit" not in person. On the other hand, they all say that if one can come in person, he or she should.

In order to appreciate both the value of a visit by telecommunication and the preference of in-person, we need to see the goals of *bikur cholim*. One of the main reasons for visiting the sick is to be moved by his condition and inspired to *daven (pray)* powerfully for him. Being there in person helps one feel the *choleh*'s condition more acutely. Another major reason for visiting is seeing to his practical needs. Another element of an in-person visit is psychological encouragement, which often or usually works better in person than by electronic means.

To a lesser degree, the above-stated goals can be achieved through a visit via telecommunication. And as we have become painfully aware of during the current pandemic, an in-person visit to a *choleh* may be inadvisable or simply not possible due to health and safety protocols.

In sum: While we can use modern technology to help significantly in the mitzvah of *bikur cholim*, it should not turn into a replacement for an in-person personal fulfillment, when such a visit is possible.



The Balancing Act of Freedom: Knowing When to Be What

A lot is going on in the Torah portion *Bo*: the unfolding of the last three plagues, the laws of Passover, and the leaving of Egypt. Yet, G-d said to Moses and Aaron: "This month shall be for you the beginning of the months. It shall be for you the first of the months of the year." Embedded in these two cryptic lines is the command to sanctify the new moon (Rosh Chodesh) and also to ensure that Passover always occurs in the Spring.

In essence, in the middle of one of the biggest events in history, G-d commanded Moses to create a "calendar"—and not just any calendar—but a unique calendar based on both the lunar months and the solar year. In fact, the Jewish calendar is the only calendar based on both the sun and the moon. But these two systems (lunar and solar) are not in sync; thus, it requires adding an extra month some years and other adjustments to reconcile the two over a perpetual 19-year cycle. What was so important that it had to be commanded on the eve of leaving Egypt, and why make it so complicated?

The Hebrew word for Egypt is *Mitzrayim*, from the word *meitzar*, which means "narrow" or "constricted." In leaving Egypt, the Jewish people were going from narrowness to expansion, from a bounded country to a limitless open desert, from slavery to freedom.

One of the hallmarks of being a slave is the inability to control anything, specifically time. When G-d commanded us to be in charge of publicly announcing the new moon (*Rosh Chodesh*/the new month), we were given the gift of being able to declare and sanctify time itself. And as the Jewish people were coming into their newly liberated status, it was important that they understood that freedom is not the same as a "free-for-all," and that expansion and freedom requires a balanced approach.

Jewish mysticism teaches us that the differences between the sun and the moon are not just physical, but spiritual, and that the masculine spiritual energy of giving (the sun) and the feminine spiritual energy of receiving (the moon) are two cosmic forces that need to be brought into balance and harmony... We need both energies, both ways of being, but to be a free and fully functioning person, we need to know "when to be what."

...There are times when we need an immediate solution to something—where there is a crisis, calling for fast and effective leadership in a top-down, strong way. And there are times when leadership serves by building consensus, collaborative brainstorming, building relationships and cultivating talent... There is a time to be active and a time to be passive; a time to be the conqueror and a time to be the cultivator.

When we left Egypt, we received the Torah, and we were tasked with being the light unto nations. We have to be conscious of our ability to receive and our strength to give. We must be conscious of our collective soul, as well as our individual missions, and to bring our families, our communities, the world, and ultimately ourselves, into a state of balance. When the whole world knows "when to be what," the sun and moon will be equal. This is what freedom looks like, and this is why we were freed from Egypt—for the purpose of balance, harmony and ultimate redemption.
