Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Vayechi – By Rabbi Smason

The final portion of the first book of the Torah describes Jacob's actions immediately preceding his death in Egypt. Jacob makes Joseph swear to bury him in the land of Israel, and then gives Joseph's two sons, Menashe and Ephraim, a special blessing. Notwithstanding Joseph's protest, Jacob insists on giving the younger Ephraim the right-hand position of primacy during the blessing (is this the origin of 'my right-hand man'?). Jacob then proceeds to give each of his other sons their individual blessings in accordance with their own unique character traits and life purpose. Jacob passes away at the age of 147. He then is brought by his sons and accompanied by a great procession of Egyptian royalty to the land of Israel where he is buried in M'aras HaMachpelah (The Tomb of the Patriarchs). Upon returning to Egypt, Joseph's brothers fear that he will finally take revenge now that their father is dead. However, Joseph reassures them that he bears no hard feelings. The portion concludes with Joseph's death and the Jewish people's promise to carry his bones with them to Israel when they are finally redeemed.

Ask Our Rabbis

Q. Why do we still keep two days of Yomtov outside of Israel?

A. Throughout the Torah, each holiday, or Yom Tov, is listed as being one day. For example, the 1st day of Pesach is the 15th of the Jewish month of Nissan (Bamidbar 28:16-19), not as the 15th and 16th as we observe in the Diaspora. There are a number of perspectives as to how the Diaspora came to observe 2 days for each Yom Tov.

Initially, the Sanhedrin, the Jewish High Court, would set the calendar each month based on witness testimony to their sighting of the new moon, which would establish the beginning of that Jewish month. As a result of when the month began, the Yom Tov of that month in question would fall into place. (This process is described in more detail throughout Masseches Rosh Hashanah). This declaration was transmitted via a signal system from Jerusalem to the Diaspora. Over time, this process became corrupted by the Samarians, and Chazal enacted that the Diaspora should keep 2 days for each Yom Tov so that they would not come to desecrate the Yom Tov inadvertently. Chazal tell us that once the Jewish community began to keep 2 days of Yom Tov, the practice became cemented into Jewish Practice (Betizah 4b).

The Medrash (Shir Hashirim Rabbah 1:6) has a slightly different perspective. It states that keeping 2 days of Yom Tov is part of the penalty of exile: since we did not properly keep the one day of Yom Tov in the Land of Israel, we now have to keep two in exile. The implication is that the proper observance of the Jewish Holidays, with the cessation of creative activity as by Shabbos, through performing the unique commandments of each respective Yom Tov, and by honoring the Yom Tov with a festive meal, we will be well on our way towards national redemption and serving Hashem properly in the Land of Israel, celebrating each Yom Tov in the Beis Hamikdash, the Temple in Jerusalem.






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Book Club News

The Blessing of Fulfilling One's Potential

Jacob called for his sons and said, "Assemble yourselves ... Gather yourselves and listen, O sons of Jacob, and listen to Israel your father" (49:1-2) This is what their father spoke to them and he blessed them, each according to his appropriate blessing (49:28)

The Talmud says that the only vessel that can contain blessings is shalom (peace). Prior to giving them his blessings, Jacob twice indicated the importance of togetherness: assemble and gather. Fragmentation and divisiveness can undo even the greatest blessings.

It is significant that in blessing them, Jacob referred to both his names, Jacob and Israel. He was named Jacob (Yaakov) because when he was born he held onto the heel (ekev) of Esau. The name, Jacob, thus represents the person at birth, the genetic endowments and the potential. The name, Israel, was given to him after he wrestled with an angel and triumphed; Israel meaning, "You have striven with the Divine and with man and have overcome" (Genesis 32:29). Israel, therefore, represents Jacob's achievements, his ability to be master over both human and superhuman forces.

It is of interest that we do not find manifest blessings in Jacob's words. He seems, rather, to be describing the character traits of each of his sons. The Torah tells us that indeed, "He blessed them, each according to his appropriate blessing."

Jacob knew his children. He instructed them to each fulfill his unique potential, maximizing the particular talents, skills and character strengths with which he was created. This is the greatest blessing of all. Jacob did not bless them with wealth or other external acquisitions. The latter may not be a blessing at all. The true blessing is for a person to become everything that he can be.

This is an important teaching for parents. Sometimes parents set their minds on what they would like their child to be, not taking into consideration the child's interests and abilities. All parents want the best for their child. However, they may think they know what is best for the child, whereas what they really desire is that the child fulfill their aspirations for him. The patriarch teaches us that we must get to know our children and help them develop and realize their own unique potential.

In these few words, Jacob conveyed the essence of blessings: brotherhood, working at achievement (Israel) and developing one's innate endowment to its fullest (Jacob).
