

Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Mishpatim – By Rabbi Smason

Following on the heels of the Ten Commandments, this week's Torah portion deals primarily with civil law. Like the realm of the ceremonial, our worldly and common activities must be infused with holiness and observed carefully. Included among the civil laws discussed in the portion are: Penalties for causing bodily injury to another person and damaging his property; laws regarding borrowers; the mitzvah to show sensitivity to the poor and to offer them free loans; and laws relating to the honest dispensation of justice. After mentioning the mitzvos of Shabbos and Shemittah (the Sabbatical year), the portion continues with a brief discussion of the three pilgrimage festivals -- Passover, Shavuos and Sukkos. The Torah then returns to the revelation at Mt. Sinai. The Jewish people declare their commitment to do whatever G-d commands with the famous phrase "Everything G-d has said, we will do and we will listen." The portion concludes with Moses' ascending the mountain, where he will remain for forty days and forty nights to receive the rest of the Torah.

Learning at NHBZ (con't)

Ask Our Rabbis

Q: Is it permissible to give tzadakah (charity) on the condition that HaShem gives you something back? Can I say "I'm giving tzedaka on the condition that so-and-so gets well, or that my single child should get married?" Is this still tzedaka, or would I be bribing G-d?

A: There is a fascinating line in the Talmud: 'One who gives charity and says "on condition that my child is healed from sickness" or "that I earn a reward in the afterlife" - that person is completely righteous.'

This means that giving tzedaka in the hope of selfish gain is perfectly fine. But why? Surely one should give with loftier motives. Isn't the donation tainted when it is done for your own benefit?

A philanthropist once came to Rabbi Schneur Zalman, the author of the Tanya, to complain that he felt he was giving charity for the wrong reasons. The man lamented before his Rebbe, "I am indeed generous toward the poor, but it is without any sincerity."

"Without sincerity? Nonsense!" replied the Rebbe. "There's plenty of sincerity. Maybe you're not sincere in giving tzedaka. But the poor are very sincere in receiving your tzedaka. Even if you don't mean it, they do!"

When it comes to giving charity, your intentions matter little. The main thing is that the needy person or worthy cause is helped. Your good intentions or otherwise make no difference to those who receive your tzedaka.

Don't get too preoccupied with intentions. Actions count more. If you are doing good, even for selfish reasons, it is still good. And if selfish motives are what it takes to keep you doing good, so be it.

So: Can G-d be bribed? I don't think so. Whether you will receive the particular blessing you seek is up to Him. But one thing is for sure: Any good deed, whatever the motive, generates blessing and will be rewarded. Sometimes we see the results, sometimes we don't. But it is our good deeds, not good intentions, that make the world better.



Modern Zionism was born in Ukraine

Jews have been living in present-day Ukraine since ancient times. In the Middle Ages it became a refuge to Jews; in the 1780s and 90s Jews were restricted to the Pale of Settlement, then, pogroms ensued. As Ukraine was roiled by the wave of pogroms in 1881, a group of idealistic Jewish students realized that the only way Jews could ever live in safety was in their own land, in the Land of Israel. In 1882, they formed the first modern Zionist organization, BILU. The name was an acronym of the Biblical verse Beit Ya'akov Lechu V'nalcha - "The House of Jacob, come let us go" (Isaiah 2:5). BILU managed to raise money to send 14 university students to the Jewish town of Rishon Le-Zion, where they farmed. The Ukrainian Jews, who lacked farming skills and faced continual violence from Arab raiders, had a very difficult time. Yet their experiment in farming in the Land of Israel showed other Jews in Europe that it could be done.

Today, Ukraine remains a complex and diverse nation with an incredibly rich Jewish history and a Jewish president, Volodymyr Zelensky!
