PURIM IS COMING !!!

Purim commemorates the salvation of the Jewish people in Ancient Persia from Haman's plot to kill all Jews in a single day. Set in Persia 2,300 years ago, the "Megillah" tells how a seemingly unrelated series of events spun together to save the Jewish people from annihilation. Purim is Judaism's most dramatic, fun-filled holiday. Here are the mitzvot and customs of Purim at NHBZ:

1. Read the Book of Esther - Mitzvah of Mikra Megillah

It is a Mitzvah to hear the Megillah read twice. Bring your kids and family!

Learning at NHBZ

Parshas Pekudei – By Rabbi Smason

This week we read the final portion of Exodus, a book which began with the Jewish people enslaved to Pharaoh in Egypt and now ends with the completion of the construction of the Mishkan in the desert. Exodus is known as 'The Book of Redemption'; redemption was achieved not only through our escape from slavery, but also through receiving the Torah on Mt. Sinai which gave purpose to that freedom. The climax of that salvation was when G-d rested His presence among the Jewish nation when the Mishkan was completed.

Parshas Pekudei begins with a complete accounting of the gold, silver and copper contributed by the people for use in the Mishkan. Following an inspection and approval of the many utensils and unassembled parts, Moses sets up the Mishkan on Rosh Chodesh Nissan as each part is anointed and arranged in its proper location. When the Mishkan is finally complete with every vessel in place, a cloud descends upon it, indicating that G-d's glory was resting there. Whenever the cloud moved away from the Mishkan, the Jewish people would follow it. At night the cloud was replaced by a pillar of fire.

Learning at NHBZ (con't)

Ask Our Rabbis

Q: If I do not want to drink wine/grape juice, may I use other drinks for *Kiddush*?

A: The *gemara* prescribes wine (or grape juice) to make *Kiddush* upon, and this generally applies across the board, for the two *Kiddushes* of the day. At night one should not use other drinks as a substitute for wine.

During the day, some permit the use of *chamar medina* - best translated as "the local notable, important drink." One of the problems with *chamar medina* is that determining what counts as such is very elusive. The simplest reading of the *gemara* and the opinion of most authorities is that it only applies when there is a lack of available wine.

There are few drinks in contemporary society (which likely differ from place to place) that are considered *chamar medina* according to a consensus of authorities. Whiskey (there is much discussion about how much one must drink) and beer have been on the "short list" for generations, and some have added natural fruit juices and coffee, with milk and soft drinks/soda being brought into consideration by some.

In our generation, with a wide variety of wine/grape juice available at cheap prices, the pendulum has rightly turned toward making *Kiddush* only on them. The best reasons to still use other drinks are when one ran out of them, dislikes them, or has a physical sensitivity to them. Another case is if one is very attached to a family *minhag* to use a different drink that is indeed still a notable, important drink.

On This Day in History – 7 Adar


This year 7 Adar II is Thursday, March 10, 2022

Moses was born in Egypt on the 7th of Adar of the year 2368 from creation (1393 BCE) and passed away on his 120th birthday -- Adar 7, 2488 (1273 BCE).

Of all his accomplishments, Moses is most famous for bringing the children of Israel the Torah, G-d's blueprint for a moral life. In fact, the five books of the Torah are known as the Five Books of Moses.

PEKUDEI: HOME







Nations go to war over it, families sign away a sizeable chunk of their income for the next thirty years to acquire one. The sages of the Talmud go so far as to say that "a man without a homestead is not a man." A home is more than a roof to keep out the rain, walls to keep out unwanted visitors, a kitchen in which to prepare food, and a bed in which to sleep. Forts, office buildings, hotels and restaurants can perform those functions as well, or better, than any residence. But only at home is a person at home. Home is where you can make faces at the mirror, wear an old sweater with a hole in it, and eat pickles with peanut butter—because you feel like it.

G-d, too, desires a home—a place where He can be fully and uninhibitedly Himself. The Chassidic masters ask: Why did G-d create the physical world? What can our coarse, finite, strife-ridden existence give Him that the spiritual dimensions of creation cannot? And they answer: G-d created the physical world because He wanted a home—a place where He can do things because He feels like it.

G-d's first home was a two-room, 45-by-15-foot building. According to Exodus 25, it was made of the following materials: gold, silver, copper, blue-, purple- and red-dyed wool, flax, goat hair, animal hides and wood. It was made to order, from detailed specifications given to Moses at Mount Sinai. It sat in the very center of the Israelite camp in the desert and was designed so that it could be dismantled and reassembled as they wandered from place to place for the forty years between their exodus from Egypt and their entry into the Holy Land. Later, a larger and more permanent version was constructed on the Temple Mount in Jerusalem.

Said G-d to man: I created wisdom, knowledge and understanding, and in these creations My mind dwells. I created love, justice and compassion, and in these my character resides. I created beauty, splendor and majesty, and in these I invest My personality. But none of these are My home, any more than the office at which you work or the theater at which you are entertained is yours. So, I created physical matter—the most undivine thing I could conceive of—so that I should have a place in which there are no roles for Me to play and no characteristics for Me to project. Only My will to fulfill.

When you take your gold (your material excesses), your silver (your stolid middle-class wealth) and your copper (your pauper's subsistence pennies) and use them to fashion a reality that conforms to My will, you have made Me at home in My world.
