"Rabbi Andrews hopes to touch the lives of the members of his community and grow alongside his congregants. He and his wife Hannah, a bubbly, charismatic and talented educator, have four children.

"Born and raised in Canada, Rabbi Andrews attended Telshe Yeshiva in Chicago, where he received both his undergraduate and graduate degrees in Rabbinics. While at Telshe, he developed a special relationship with its Rosh Hayeshiva, Rabbi Avrohom C. Levin zt"l, from whom he received his semicha.

"Rabbi Andrews has been deeply involved in the Rabbinate and Jewish education. He taught at Jewish schools in every city he ministered and ran

educational outreach program. This afforded Rabbi Andrews the opportunity to learn the craft from some of the most significant personalities in contemporary Jewish education and rabbinics. Additionally, he has served as the administrator for the local kosher supervising agency as part of his capacity as the Assistant Rabbi of Congregation House of Jacob-Mikveh Israel in Calgary and as the Rav Hamachshir for the Lehigh Valley Kashruth Commission in his **most** recent post in Allentown. He was also the Rabbi of Lake Park Synagogue in Milwaukee.

"Before moving to Allentown, Rabbi Andrews was employed as the Associate Rabbi of Finchley United Synagogue in London, a flagship congregation of the United Synagogue with over 1,800 member families. There he began innovative social and educational programming and worked tirelessly to strengthen the social engagement of its vast and broad membership.

"In Allentown, Rabbi Andrews has been employed as the Rabbi of Congregation Sons of Israel. There, he provided leadership shepherding his congregation through the Covid crisis, implemented new educational programs, and engaged in significant community outreach. NHBZ Updated COVID Policy

Dear Members,

While we still find ourselves in the midst of the Covid pandemic, with thanks to HaShem, hospitalizations are at an all-time low nationally, and mortality (which is around 300 deaths a day nationally) is still too high, but relatively low. Therefore, effective_immediately we are ending our vaccination mandate at NHBZ.


Shabbos Morning Kids' Program, Rabbi Okin

Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Acharei – By Rabbi Smason

Acharei Mos begins with a lengthy description of the special Yom Kippur service to be performed in the Mishkan by the Kohen Gadol. The service included the lottery selection from among two identical goats, one of which would become a national sin offering and the other which would be pushed off a cliff in the desert as the bearer of the people's sins (the 'scapegoat'). We also find described the command that Yom Kippur and its laws of fasting and refraining from work be observed eternally by the Jewish people as a day of atonement. Acharei Mos concludes with a listing of immoral and forbidden sexual relationships, and the command that the Jewish people maintain and ensure the holiness of the land of Israel.

Ask Our Rabbis

Q. What happens if I forgot to eat the foods which comprised the Eruv Tavshilin that I made before the last days of Pesach? Am I allowed to eat them or do I need to dispose of them?

A. The purpose of the Eruv Tavshilin was to allow food preparation to be performed on the Friday of a Yom Tov for the following day of Shabbos, whether the Shabbos in question is a Yom Tov or not (Shulchan Aruch OC 527:1). The Eruv Tavshilin allows food preparation to be done on Yom Tov for another date, when food preparation on Yom Tov is supposed to be done for the day on which the preparation is being performed. In our case, the Eruv Tavshilin was made before Yom Tov as required and was extant throughout Yom Tov. It did its job as intended. The Halacha is that the Eruv Tavshilin should be eaten on Shabbos, preferably for Shalosh Seudos (Mishnah Berurah 527:11). There is no statute of limitations on the consumption the Eruv Tavshilin, and it should be consumed at the earliest possible time after Shabbos, so that it is still edible. It should not be discarded, as this would be wasteful and a violation of the prohibition of Bal Tashchis- wasting food (Devarim 20:19-20).

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
Sisterhood Book Club News!

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"Pass the Salt, Please"



Feeling spiritual on Yom Kippur is easy. No eating, no business, ... and hours praying in the synagogue are conducive to intense spirituality. It's no wonder that so many religions place a premium on asceticism, separating oneself from the temptations offered by the world. Celibacy, long hours of meditation, fasting, and life in a secluded monastery can be a path to a life of spirituality.

The Torah, however, has a very different perspective. This week's portion starts with a mention of Nadav and Avihu's deaths—partially a punishment for their spiritually motivated decision to remain celibate. G-d wants us to walk a thin tightrope. He wants us to be married, go to work, and partake of lavish Shabbat and holiday meals—and at that very moment to be at the pinnacle of spirituality and holiness. A daunting task—how does one simultaneously dwell in two contradictory worlds—the world of the spirit and the world of the flesh?

Every mitzvah is comprised of a body and soul. The body is the physical act which we are commanded to do (or instructed to avoid). The soul is the lesson the mitzvah imparts, its message which we must implement in our lives. Also discussed in the week's Parsha is the prohibition against consuming blood, as well as the process of its removal. This teaches a powerful lesson pertaining to our approach to our relationship with the world.

We are not always fortunate enough to contend with the divine, or even with "humanity." On a daily basis we also have to deal with the "animalistic," completely non-spiritual aspects of regular life. Consumption of animal flesh is a metaphor for these moments of the day. Blood represents warmth, life and passion. The Torah enjoins us to remove all the "blood" from our worldly activities: to be involved in the world, to partake of its flesh, but without excessive enthusiasm or excitement.

How, you ask, is this possible? Through salt. Blood is removed from meat via a thorough salting process.

The Torah describes the covenant between G-d and His nation as a "salt covenant." The commentators explain that salt never decays; The commentators explain that salt never decays; it remains eternally fresh, much as our relationship with G-d never expires or even becomes slightly stale.

Interestingly, the symbol of our relationship with G-d is a food item which is independently inedible—its primary purpose is to add wonderful taste to practically all other foods. Similarly, our relationship with G-d is not an end within itself; rather, it is meant to give a spiritual "flavor" and meaning to all other aspects of our life.

We have to liberally "sprinkle salt" on every part of our life—on our workplace, on our dinner table, on our gym, and even on our vacation destinations. When our love for G-d and our desire to serve Him with every fiber of our being is our leading motivation, then all we do is for Him. We eat and exercise so that we have the strength to serve Him; we work to have the means to serve Him...

And when life is salty, there's no need to run away to a monastery.
