Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Kedoshim – By Rabbi Smason

The portion begins with G-d's command to the entire nation of Israel to be holy, emulating the supreme sanctity of G-d Himself. The Torah goes on to delineate a multitude of mitzvos through which we can achieve sanctity. We are commanded to revere our parents, to guard Shabbat from being desecrated, and to refrain from the worship of idols. G-d instructs us to leave various gifts from our harvest for the poor and downtrodden, including the edge of the field and the sheaves which were unintentionally dropped while being gathered. We must maintain justice, have honest dealings with our neighbors, refrain from gossip, not stand by while another's life is in danger, and not hate another in our heart.

One of the most famous mitzvos in the Torah appears in this week's portion: "You shall love your friend as yourself." We are commanded to admonish our neighbor if he does wrong and forbidden to take revenge or bear a grudge. The portion continues with a listing of the punishments to be meted out against people who transgress and participate in various forbidden relationships. Parshas Kedoshim concludes with the commandment, once again, that we be a holy and distinct people from among the nations of the world.



Counting the Omer

The *omer* is a biblical-era measurement equivalent to approximately 2 quarts (43 oz).

Counting the Omer each day for 50 days created anticipation for the new crop, but more importantly, serves as a way for us to refine our character traits each day, leading up to the giving of the Torah on Shavuos.

Ask Our Rabbis

Q: How is it that my appliances seem to know when it is Erev Yontiff? Invariably, JUST before Yom Tov (a major holiday) they seem to break. What gives?

A: To answer your question we reached out to a stove owned by a Jewish family. Its response:

Rabbi: "Mr. Stove. Pleasure to meet you. Thank you for sitting down to today's interview."

Mr. Stove: "My pleasure, Rabbi. I was sitting anyway. But I do have to tell you that I had a rough Pesach. Over Yom Tov the family who owns me had a visiting relative who's a cowboy. He sat on me several times."

Rabbi: "Why would he do such a thing?"

Mr. Stove. "He says that it made him feel more at home... on the range."

Rabbi: "Mr. Stove, enough with the bad puns. Let's get down to business. One of my congregants wants to know why you and your fellow appliances always seem to cause them trouble just before Yom Tov. What gives?"

Mr. Stove: "People think that only these new fancy phones are 'smart', but me and my fellow appliances get a bum rap. We're also plenty smart, because we take orders directly from The Boss. Not Springsteen. THE Boss. HaShem. Just as I and my fellow appliances come with user manuals, those who own me also come into this world with directions. And lesson number one is: *Life is a test*. Everyone gets tested in various ways so that they can develop their character and actualize their potential.

Rabbi: "Does that mean, Mr. Stove, that sometimes you stop working at particularly busy times to deliberately try people's patience and emunah?"

Mr. Stove: "Exactly! If I'd go on the fritz on a Monday in the summer, anyone can deal with that type of challenge. That would be easy-peasy. But if I start acting up a few days before Pesach, that can cause a lot of gaswork. It might make a balebusta really boil over. It could"

Rabbi: "Mr Stove!"

Mr. Stove: "Ahem ... It would cause a more formidable challenge for said balebusta. Will she keep her cool? Will her husband be understanding, supportive, and drop everything he is doing to get a repairman out to fix me? Will the neighbors pitch in to help? Life is a test, Rabbi. I and my fellow appliances just follow orders to help everyone reach their latent inner potential."

Seventy-four years ago, in 1948, the State of Israel was proclaimed an independent state. The British mandate to govern the Holy Land expired on Friday, May 14, 1948. A United Nations resolution passed six months earlier endorsed the establishment of a Jewish state in the biblical homeland of the Jewish people. That afternoon, the state of Israel was proclaimed in Tel Aviv. Four neighboring Arab countries launched a brutal war on Israel's Jewish inhabitants but were unable to realize their full bloodthirsty intent in circumstances describable only miraculous. The date — Iyar 5 on the Jewish calendar—is celebrated in Israel as the Israeli "Independence Day" or "Yom Ha'atzmaut."

Parshah Kedoshim: So many mitzvot, so little time

Kedoshim means "holy" and the Parshah of Kedoshim begins with G-d telling us: "You should be holy because I, your G-d, am holy." But how can we be holy? By doing the mitzvot that G-d commands. Just some of the mitzvot given in this Parshah are: do not lie, do not steal, don't swear falsely, don't bear a grudge, don't take revenge, don't spread gossip about others, keep Shabbat, stand up when somebody respectable comes into the room, give charity to the poor, respect the elderly, when a person gathers the wheat from his field, he should leave a corner for poor people, and a very important mitzvah: "Love your fellow as yourself."

PARSHAH KEDOSHIM: "As Yourself?"

According to Rabbi Akiva, "Love your fellow as yourself" is "a great principal of the Torah," yet it is a commandment easier said than done. How can we love every person as we love ourselves? People possess the full gamut of negative traits, shortcomings, and failings. Often, the closer we become to someone, the more we see his or her personality flaws. How then can we be expected to love every person? Must we ignore one's negativity?

The most seemingly problematic part of the statement is "as yourself." Even if, somehow, we learn to love our fellow, can the Torah expect the love to rise to the level of self-love?

Chassidic philosophy explains that the words "as yourself" are the key to the ability to love our fellow. When a person loves himself, he is not ignorant of his own personality flaws. On the contrary, no one is as aware of his flaws as he himself is. But somehow, the awareness of his own flaws does not contradict or destroy his self-love. That is because a person does not see his own flaws in isolation; he sees his own flaws against the backdrop of self-love.

The person who is aware of his own flaws will work very hard to conceal those flaws from others. He fears, often correctly, that the other person's focus will zero in on the fault alone, and the person will define him by his flaws.

The Talmud relates that a gentile who sought to convert asked the great sage Hillel to teach him all of the Torah while standing on one foot. Hillel told him, "What is hateful to you, don't do to others." You hate when others define you by your shortcomings; therefore, don't do the same to others. Never look at the shortcomings of your child, your spouse, your neighbor, or your fellow in isolation. See them only against the backdrop of love. 3
