#### **The Three Weeks** – Begins on Sunday, July 17 (Fast of Tammuz)

The Three Weeks is an annual period of mourning that falls in the summer. This is when we mourn the destruction of the Holy Temple and our launch into a still-ongoing exile. Certain restrictions of mourning such as not listening to music ensue. The period begins on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of the Hebrew month Tammuz, a fast day that marks the day when the walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Romans in 69 C.E.

The Three Weeks reaches its climax and concludes with the fast of the 9<sup>th</sup> of Av, the date when both Holy Temples were set aflame. This is the saddest day of the Jewish Calendar, and it is also the date that many other tragedies befell our people.

## **Learning at NHBZ**

Parashas Balak – By Rabbi Smason

This week's portion shifts from the Jewish people's travels in the desert to the story of Bilam, the anti-Semitic prophet who attempted to curse the Children of Israel. Hired by Balak, the king of Moav, Bilam embarks upon a journey to the Israelite encampment. An angel brandishing a sword blocks Bilam's path, causing his donkey to repeatedly swerve off the road. Unable to see the angel, Bilam responds by striking the donkey three times. Miraculously, G-d causes the donkey to speak to Bilam -- shades of Mr. Ed, the talking horse in the 1960's TV show! Bilam's eyes are uncovered, and the humiliated prophet sees the angel standing in the path. The angel reminds Bilam that he may only speak the words that G-d places in his mouth. Upon arrival near the Jewish camp, Bilam repeatedly attempts to curse the people; each time G-d prevents him from doing so, but instead he ends up uttering several sets of praises, much to Balak's dismay. The Torah portion concludes with the Jewish men's debauchery with the promiscuous daughters of Moav and Midian, and the public immoral act of Zimri (a prince of the tribe of Simeon) with a Midianite princess. Pinchas, Aaron's grandson, zealously responds by piercing them to death with a spear, halting a plague from G-d which had broken out in the camp.



#### Remember the Past, But Don't Be Held Captive by It

Judaism is a religion of memory. The verb *zachor*, remember, appears no fewer than 169 times in the Hebrew Bible. "Remember that you were strangers in Egypt"; "Remember the seventh day to keep it holy". Memory, for Jews, is a religious obligation. This is particularly so at this time of the year. The "Three Weeks" lead up to the saddest day in the Jewish calendar, *Tisha B'Av*, the anniversary of the destruction of the two Temples, the first by King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon in 586<sup>BCE</sup>, the second by Titus in 70<sup>CE</sup>. Jews never forgot those tragedies. To this day, at every wedding we break a glass in their memory. During the Three Weeks, we have no celebrations. On Tisha B'Av itself, we spend the day fasting and sitting on low stools like mourners, reading the Book of Lamentations. It is a day of profound collective grief.

Two and a half thousand years is a long time to remember. Often I am asked – usually about the Holocaust – is it really right to remember? Should there not be a limit on grief? Would not the world be more peaceable if once in a while we forgot perceived injustices of the past?

My answer is both yes and no, for it depends on how we remember.

Though the two are often confused, memory is different from history. History is someone else's story. It's about events that occurred long ago to someone else. Memory is my story. It's about where I come from and of what narrative I am a part. It is about identity and the connection between the generations. In the case of collective memory, it all depends on how we tell the story. We don't remember for the sake of revenge. "Do not hate the Egyptians," said Moses, "for you were strangers in their land." To be free, you have to let go of hate. Remember the past, says Moses, but do not be held captive by it. Turn it into a blessing, not a curse; a source of hope, not humiliation.

The Holocaust survivors I know spend their time sharing their memories with young people, not for the sake of revenge, but its opposite: to teach tolerance and the value of life – to remember for the future and for life.

In today's fast-moving culture, we undervalue acts of remembering. Computer memories have grown, while ours have become foreshortened. Our children no longer memorize chunks of poetry. Their knowledge of history is often all too vague. Our sense of space has expanded. Our sense of time has shrunk. That cannot be right. One of the greatest gifts we can give to our children is the knowledge of where we have come from, the things for which we fought, and why.

None of the things we value – freedom, human dignity, justice – were achieved without a struggle. None can be sustained without conscious vigilance. A society without memory is like a journey without a map. It's all too easy to get lost.

I, for one, cherish the richness of knowing that my life is a chapter in a book begun by my ancestors long ago, to which I will add my contribution before handing it on to my children. Life has meaning when it is part of a story, and the larger the story, the more our imaginative horizons grow.

Besides, things remembered do not die. That's as close as we get to immortality on earth. (adapted from *Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks*<sup>Z"L</sup>)
