Learning at NHBZ

• Parashas Eikev – By Rabbi Smason

Moses continues to encourage the Children of Israel to trust in G-d and in the prosperity and health which will follow if they keep the Torah. If they are careful to observe even those 'minor' mitzvos that are usually 'trampled' underfoot, he promises that they will be the most blessed of the nations of the Earth. Moses reminds them of their numerous transgressions in the desert, including the mystifying sin of the Golden Calf. Moses describes the bountiful Land of Israel filled with wheat, barley, grapes, figs and pomegranates, a land of oil-yielding olives and date-honey. He teaches the people the second paragraph of the Shema which stresses the fundamental doctrine of reward for keeping the mitzvos and the consequences of non-compliance. All that G-d requires of us, Moses says, is to love G-d, revere Him, and to observe His Torah. Easier said than done! Parshas Eikev concludes with the promise that G-d will provide the Jewish people with protection if they observe the laws of the Torah. Many are familiar with the famous phrase (found in this week's portion), "Man does not live by bread alone." The less-familiar second half of the verse says, "... but by all that comes from the mouth of G-d." This important idea teaches that physical nourishment and external pleasures aren't sufficient for a satisfied life. Every human being has spiritual needs that must also be met.


For audio through your telephone, connect in one of two ways:



Ten Commandments of Social Media

How do we harness the power of social media while avoiding the pitfalls along the way? Here are the Ten Commandments to keep in mind while using social media: **I am the L-rd your G-d:** Yes, social media is powerful and it can be positively harnessed to build real and virtual empires that encompass the globe. But remember, G-d runs the world. You can have a great idea, build an amazing business model, get investors and work really hard, but it's ultimately up to G-d if you succeed or fail. Social media can also be abused to wreak havoc, and destroy people's lives and careers. It appears to provide the anonymity that enables this activity. But remember that G-d sees and hears everything we do.

Don't have other gods: The Talmud compares anger to idolatry because when we get angry we have not fully internalized the belief everything in the world—the bad as well as the good—emanates from G-d since G-d is One. Social media exposes us to many different situations and opinions, some we agree with and some that we can't fathom. Don't get angry and later regret what you said. Instead try to understand what you should learn from a contrary viewpoint and cogently express your opinion.

Don't take the name of G-d in vain: The Torah requires us to be extremely careful with our speech, even uttering G-d's name must be done with the utmost care. The power of speech is uniquely human and enables us to connect the physical and spiritual worlds. Using profanity just dumbs down the message and the person. Use refine language when expressing yourself.

Remember the Sabbath: On Shabbat we commemorate G-d's creation of the world by ceasing from all creative work, including electronic activity. Being constantly bombarded by emails, phone calls, and other distractions, Shabbat enables us to take the time to connect with our inner selves, our families and G-d, and refocus our energies on what is most important in life.

Honor your father and mother: Social media tools can be excellent tools for the elderly and the homebound to keep in touch with friends and family and to speed up painfully slow bureaucratic hurdles. But some don't know how to use them and are scared to even try. Many would love to video chat with their children or grandchildren, but just can't. Take the initiative to help others use technology to connect online with their loved ones.

Don't murder: The sages said "Whoever embarrasses his friend in public, it is as if he spilled his blood." Everything that we do on social media is public. When we were kids, we learned how to avoid bullies in the hallway. Cyberbullies today create a 24/7 bullying experience that can overwhelm young people, causing great pain. Don't participate in this type of behavior and put a stop it by calling out the bullies or by reporting it to others.

Don't commit adultery: Avoid suggestive content. The Torah tells us "Do not follow after your heart and after your eyes by which you go astray." If a person looks at suggestive content, it leaves an imprint in their heart and they are more likely to go astray in the non-virtual world. Break the pattern before it starts by avoiding looking at online suggestive content.

Don't steal: Social media is fueled by shared content, most of which is freely available. It's an ecosystem of kindness where people share ideas, experiences and knowledge for the benefit of others. However, this openness can lead to plagiarism or theft of other people's ideas, data and possessions. Don't take what does not belong to you and if you elaborate on an idea, give credit to the author. **Don't bear false witness:** Check out the facts. If you can't get all the facts before posting, then wait until you have the facts. It's better not to post than to make false
