Parsha Nitzavim

"Ezra legislated that the curses enumerated in Parshas Ki Savo be read prior to Rosh Hashana so that the year may end along with its curses," the Talmud teaches. Nonetheless, Tosafot adds, we read Parshas Nitzavim on the Shabbos immediately preceding Rosh Hashana to serve as a buffer, so that we do not go from curses directly to Rosh Hashana.

I'd like to suggest an additional reason for reading Nitzavim before Rosh Hashana. The Tur, in his commentary on Rosh Hashana, writes, "Rabbi Chanina and Rabbi Yehoshua taught: Who is like the Jewish nation? Normally, one who is on trial for his life dons black, somber clothes, and does not shave or groom himself, because of the uncertainty of the verdict. In sharp contrast, however, Israel acts differently. They dress in white garments, and shave and groom themselves prior to their day of judgment. Moreover, they eat and drink and exhibit happiness and confidence on Rosh Hashana, knowing full well that Hashem will provide a miracle on their behalf." Where does this optimism come from? The Alter of Kelm explains that there are two levels of judgment on Rosh Hashana. The Jewish nation is judged collectively as a people, and each person is judged individually.

Regarding our national verdict, we are assured that Hashem will always judge us favorably, for we read in Parshas Vayelech that the Torah "will not be forgotten from the mouth of their offspring." The survival and continuity of our people is a continuing theme in the messages of our prophets. Torah and the Jewish people will survive, hence the optimism on Rosh Hashana. At the same time, each individual should experience fear and trepidation of the forthcoming day of judgment. His personal fate is less assured. How will he fare as an individual?

The Alter of Kelm points out that the first verse in Parshas Nitzavim addresses all of Israel: "Atem nitzavim hayom kulchem – You are standing here this day, all of you," Moshe declares to the Jewish nation. He then identifies the various groupings within the nation; everyone from "your elders" to "your water-drawers" is represented. All of these groups together make up kulchem – all of you.

Therefore, suggests the wise teacher, in order to ensure personal survival, one should attach himself to the community by contributing to it. Just as in politics we are familiar with the "coattails effect" whereby lesser known candidates ride the crest of others' success, similarly as the community is granted success and pardon for the forthcoming year, one who is needed by the community will also be included in its success.

Learning at NHBZ (con't)

Rosh Hashana

AHSREI HA'AM... Happy (fortunate) is the nation that knows the shofar sounds. The shofar produces simple elemental sounds. Yet there is a wealth of significance and deep meaning to the shofar sounds. Many commentaries discuss the different thoughts that one should have while listening to the sound of the shofar on Rosh Hashana. Here is a composite of these *kavanot*.

G-D'S KINGSHIP – Rosh Hashana is the anniversary of the sixth day of creation, the day that G-d's subjects (human beings) were created. Consequently, Rosh Hashana is the coronation day of the Supreme King. To herald that event, we sound the royal trumpet – the shofar. The *tekiya* (the long, monotonic, unbroken sound) is specifically associated with this aspect of Rosh Hashana. The *tekiya* is a happy and proud sound. Although other emotions claim our attention, one should be happy and proud on Rosh Hashana as we affirm our loyalty to the King of kings.

CALL TO REPENTANCE – The Shofar is the alarm that (hopefully) wakes people up to their task of doing *teshuva* and beseeching G-d for forgiveness. This is why the shofar has been sounded throughout Elul, and this is one of the major functions of the shofar on Rosh Hashana. It is the broken sounds of the *shvarim* and *teruah* that most fit with this aspect of the shofar.

RELIVING SINAI – The Torah describes the events of *matan* Torah as being accompanied by an ever-increasing sound of the shofar. When we hear the shofar, we should be moved to dedicate ourselves to Torah and *mitzvot*. Accepting the yoke of Torah is both part of the *teshuva* process and a very significant incentive to "do serious *teshuva*."

THE WORDS OF THE PROPHETS are likened to the sound of the shofar. This reminder inspires greater commitment to faithful observance of Judaism.

THE DESTRUCTION OF THE *BEIT HAMIKDASH* should also be kept in mind while hearing the shofar. The Prophets mention the shofar in their description of the *churban*. One should think of the "ups and downs" of Jewish history.

AKEIDAT YITZCHAK – Perhaps the most prominent element of Rosh Hashana is the binding of Isaac and its ramifications for the people of Israel. The choice of a ram's horn as shofar, the Torah reading for the second day, the main focus of the *zichronot bracha* of the Musaf and *tashlich* all point to the *akeida* as a major theme of the day. When we stand in judgment before G-d, we must be acutely aware of the real answer to the question, "Who is a Jew?" We are the heirs of the patriarchs and matriarchs whose commitment to G-d is exemplified by the *akeida*. The Chafetz Chaim points out that most of the promises of blessings in the Torah are conditioned upon our "good behavior." The most notable exception to that is G-d's promise to Avraham Avinu at the *akeida*, which was unconditional.

INSTILLS FEAR – "If a Shofar sounds in the city, will the people not tremble?"

THE GREAT JUDGMENT DAY is associated with the sound of the shofar. One should think of that to help keep things in perspective on Rosh Hashana, the annual day of judgment.

THE INGATHERING OF EXILES is described by the prophet *Yishayahu* as being accompanied by the sounding of the great shofar. We are witness to the beginning of that process in our own time, with Jews from the former Soviet Union and the Jews of Ethiopia immigrating to Israel in such great numbers. Over the past 50 years, entire Jewish communities have been transplanted to Israel from their Diaspora homes. May we be privileged to see that continue.

T'CHIYAT HAMEITIM (resurrection of the dead) is also associated with the Shofar.

Note the verse [at the beginning] of this piece does not say, "the person who blows the shofar," or "the person who hears the shofar sounds." It is not enough to hear the sounds; we must know what they mean. We must hear their message and we must become better people because of the sounds. Then we will be truly happy and fortunate.

Parshah Nitzavim: Choose Life

I call today upon heaven and earth as witnesses for you. I have set before you life and death, blessing and curse. And you shall choose life, so that you and your children may live. (Deut. 30:19)

Do we really need the Torah to tell us to choose life? Which person of sound mind would choose death?

One possible answer is that one must make a conscious decision to live and not just vegetate. And I don't mean to live it up by living life in the fast lane. To "choose life" means to choose to live a meaningful life, a life committed to values and a higher purpose. Did it make any difference at all in that I inhabited planet Earth for so many years? Will anyone really know the difference if I'm gone? Is my life productive, worthwhile?

It is told that when the fist Chabad Rebbe, Rabbi Schneur Zalman of Liadi, wanted to bless Reb Yekutiel Liepler with wealth, he declined the offer, saying that he was afraid it would distract him from more spiritual pursuits. When the rebbe then offered to bless him with longevity, Reb Yekutiel stipulated that it should not be "peasant's years, with eyes that do not see and ears that do not hear, where one neither sees nor senses G-dliness."

Yes, he chose life, and he chose to live a life that would be purposeful and productive, and that would make a tangible difference. He wasn't interested in a long life if, essentially, it would amount to an empty life.

As we stand just before Rosh Hashanah, let us resolve to choose life. Let us live lives of Torah values and noble deeds. And may we be blessed with a good and sweet new year.
