<u>Learning at NHBZ</u>

Parsha Nasso

Parshas Naso concludes on a high note, with the dedication of the altar in the Tabernacle and a detailed description of the offerings brought by the princes of the tribes of Israel. It is then followed by the parsha of Beha'alosecha which begins with the maintenance of the Tabernacle's menorah. What is the reason for this juxtaposition?

Rashi explains: When Aharon saw the dedication of the princes, he was filled with anguish, since both he and his tribe, the Levites, had been excluded from bringing offerings. Hashem, however, said to him,"By your life, yours is greater than theirs, for you shall kindle the menorah."

The Ramban is disturbed by Rashi's interpretation. Why is servicing the menorah compensation for missing out on the dedication of the altar? Furthermore, the Torah is careful to itemize the gifts of each of the princes. But why? The offerings of each one was identical to that of the next. Why didn't the Torah simply summarize and state that each one brought the following gift?

Rav Solomon Breuer, z"l, offers a meaningful interpretation. The Torah purposefully repeats each of the princes' offerings to teach a fundamental lesson that twelve different men may offer the very same gift to Hashem, yet each gift carries its own weight. "Judge the donor according to the gift and the gift according to the donor." The spirit and joy with which a gift is given determines its real value. Twelve princes can bring the same offering and each bears its own significance to Hashem. The Torah, in reiterating each offering, teaches us that at that moment their hearts, thoughts and spirit were united with a solemn vow, to place all their possessions in the service of Hashem and His causes.

Regrettably, such feeling does not always find its way into our practice. Thus, according to Rashi, Hashem reassures Aharon, "Your task of kindling the menorah is greater than theirs." The Midrash notes, "You are chosen for greater tasks. Sacrifices are offered only as long as the Sanctuary stands, but the lights of the menorah are forever."

The light of the menorah represents the light of Torah. Aharon's daily maintenance of the menorah served to keep the focus of all the service in the Tabernacle on Hashem above, on fealty to His word and to His law. I would also make a connection between Parshas Nasso, which is the largest parsha in the Torah, comprising 176 verses, and the 119th chapter of Tehillim, which also contains 176 verses and is the longest in Tehillim. The psalm carries the distinct title, "Torah, the Way of Life."

It is the light of Torah which gives real purpose to our lives. Offerings and gifts may be of great significance, but the essence of our lives remains best expressed by Dovid Hamelech, "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path."

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
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NHBZ Book Club Warms Up for Summer Reading!

This Date in History

15 Sivan (this year on Sun., June 4) is the traditional date of the birth and the death of Judah (1564-1445 BCE), the fourth son of Jacob and Leah. Judah means "to admit" -as to admit a mistake, or to acknowledge in gratitude -- and is the source of the English word, Jew. When Joseph was thrown into the pit, it was Judah who saved Joseph's life by suggesting his sale to a passing caravan. As atonement for not rescuing Joseph completely, Judah later offered his own life in place of Benjamin. At the end of Jacob's life, Judah was given the blessing of kingship, and indeed King David, King Solomon, and the future Messiah all descend from the tribe of Judah.

NASO: Cutting Your Losses Brings Greatness

In this week's Torah portion, G-d said to Moses to: "Command the children of Israel that they shall expel from the camp everyone with tzara'as..."

G-d instructed all the Jews that if someone has tzara'as - which is defined as leprosy or skin contamination - then he needs to temporarily live away from everyone else.

In order to understand why this was done, it's first important to know exactly what caused someone to be afflicted with tzara'as. This skin aliment appeared on those people who gossiped about someone else. When the Jews lived in Israel during the times we had the Holy Temple, when someone slandered another person, he could be afflicted with this aliment.

Perhaps the reason he needed to be segregated from everyone else comes down to this: Human beings really don't like taking responsibility for their errant actions. Let me explain. No one wants to be thought of as a bad person or one who wrongs others. So in an effort to avoid this, most people simply choose to rationalize their behavior to demonstrate that they were completely justified in what they did. Our reasoning tends to boil down to this: Yes, I did it, but it's definitely not what it seems.

Maybe this is why G-d wants the person not to live amongst other Jews until his tzara'as goes away. It was done to prevent this person from committing additional sins by repeating his gossip in an effort to show why it wasn't really gossip in the first place.

And this is the lesson for all of us. We all have the temptation at times to try to explain away our errant behavior. The next time you do something to someone else that you really shouldn't have done, try to resist the urge to make everyone believe that you really didn't do anything wrong. Instead, take personal responsibility for what you did. This will not only make you feel great but will also act as a powerful shield against compounding your initial mistake. – from *Adam Lieberman*, www.aish.com
