# Learning at NHBZ

## Parshas Mattos-Masei

In this week's parsha, Hashem commands Moshe Rabeinu to establish cities of refuge, safe-havens for those who kill unintentionally, or even intentionally if their cases are still being decided by the Supreme Court. The Talmud tells us that the B'nei Yisrael built wide, paved roads leading to these cities and had signposts marking the way so that these hunted people (they were fair game to the deceased's next-of-kin) could quickly and easily reach safety without having to stop and ask directions.

Today, we have no actual cities of refuge. Nonetheless, the Lubavitcher Rebbe, zt"l writes that the Torah's message is eternal and the notion of these cities remains relevant. Many Jews are at a crossroads in their lives. One road is the path of Torah and mitzvos, which assures a fulfilled life both spiritually and materially. The other road, devoid of Torah and mitzvos, leads to assimilation, discontent and spiritual frustration. The job of rabbis and lay-people alike is to be like the signposts leading to these cities – clearly marking the Path of Life, showing people that this is their refuge, the way that will bring them toward fulfillment.

If we have an obligation to help our brothers and sisters with their material needs through the mitzvah of tzedakah, how much more so do we have an obligation to help all Jews with their spiritual needs, regardless of their observance, knowledge, and affiliation.

A Chassid of Rav Sholom Dov Ber, zt"I, of Lubavitch once inquired of the Rebbe why he spent so much of his time with simple, unlearned Jews. The Rebbe asked the Chassid – a jeweler by trade – if he had any gems with him. The Chassid emptied a bag of stones on the table. The Rebbe looked at them and picked out the largest one, "Is this the most precious stone you have," he asked. The Chassid shook his head. "Actually," he said, pointing out a small, uncut diamond, "This is the most precious. Once it is cut and polished properly its brilliance will be appreciated by all. With all due respect, Rebbe, when it comes to diamonds you have to be an expert."
"Precisely," said the Rebbe. "When it comes to neshamos you also have to be an expert."

As we observe the Three Weeks that lead up to Tisha B'Av, let us reflect on our obligation to provide this spiritual safe-haven for all Jews. The Gemara tells us that the Beis Hamikdash was destroyed because of *sinas chinam*, senseless hatred. By employing *ahavas chinam*, senseless love, instead, we will turn the day of Tisha B'Av to a day of rejoicing with the building of the final Beis Hamikdash.

## Milestones or Tombstones

"These are the journeys of the children of Israel..."

Why are the 42 stops referred to in the parsha as "journeys," rather than "encampments"?

They served as places of rest and milestones reached, not just places left behind, or points of departure. It's not the milestones we reach, but the stones we encounter along the mile that define us and make us who we are. The journey itself is part of the destination. And, ironically, it's often the achievements and "success" along the way that confine our progress. A Rebbe explained, "Success means exerting effort, and consists of the continued struggle to do what is right..."

Milestones often act as tombstones; both (can) bury away a life of vitality. Success shouldn't be measured by how far we get in life, but by the depth of life we get.

## Tragedies that are associated with the "entrance of Av"

- Peaks of the tallest mountains emerged above the receding waters of the Flood.
- Egypt was afflicted with Frog(s).
- Yahrzeit of Aharon HaKohen.
- Yahrzeit of Elazar b. Aharon HaKohen.
- Ezra and his followers arrived in Yerushalayim, 457BCE.
- Armed revolt at Treblinka, 1943. One of several outbreaks encouraged by the changing tide of the war against Germany.
- The Exodus bearing illegal immigrants was seized by the British, 1947. The Exodus 1947 carried 4000 Jews. Its defiance of the British navy and its ultimate forced return to Germany was one of the most dramatic & heroic episodes of post-war Jewish history.

# PARSHAS MASSEI: 'Dissent is Healthy'

In narrating the laws of the unintentional killer, the Torah says, the assembly shall judge and the assembly shall rescue the (unintentional) killer from the hands of the avenger of blood

--Deut. 35:24-25

From the phrase "the assembly shall rescue," the Talmud derives the law that the court should make every attempt to avoid imposing a death sentence. One Jewish law is remarkable: If the court (of 23 judges) renders a unanimous verdict of guilty, the case is dismissed (Sanhedrin 17a).

Rabbi Shlomo Kluger explains that there is an ongoing battle between truth and falsehood. Wherever there is truth, there will arise an opposition of falsehood. Therefore, if the majority of the judges find the defendant guilty and a minority dissent, we can assume that the truth is with the majority and that the minority represent falsehood. If, however, there is a unanimous verdict of guilt, it cannot possibly be correct, for if it were a true judgement, falsehood would find some way of making an opposing statement. Therefore, there is reason to assume that a unanimous verdict of guilt is incorrect.

When there are differences of opinion, a person can consider both sides and reach a logical conclusion. Unanimity may deprive a person of critical analysis.

We should exert caution when there is a unanimity of opinion. Few things in the world are so clear cut that there is not the slightest dissent.
