Learning at NHBZ

Parashas Re'eh

The name of our Sedra means - "see". "See, I set before you this day a blessing and a curse." Moshe Rabeinu told the Israelites that they have free will. They are free to choose the path in life which will be productive and a blessing, or have the free will to choose the path that will eventually tum out to be a curse. Doesn't it seem to be very elementary? Surely, if you are given a choice to choose between blessing and curse, every human being would choose the path leading to blessing rather than the reverse! Apparently, life is not so simple but in actuality is very complex. Studies have shown that smoking may be harmful to your health. Why then do people still smoke? Consuming too much alcohol can be disastrous to one's life and can destroy other lives, if one drinks and then drives. Why are there so many alcoholics? People on drugs pose a threat to themselves and are extremely dangerous to others. Why are the numbers of people who are drug addicts escalating? Perhaps a loss of self-esteem, through job loss, or a real sense of hopelessness and helplessness, cause people to tum to drugs and alcohol. There are a myriad of reasons that cause people to "choose the curse". The Torah seems to give an antidote to self-destruction ... in the opening sentence of our sedra, "See, I have set before you this day a blessing...."

The Vilna Gaon, the famous Rav of Vilna of the 18th century, analyzes this sentence by commenting on each word. **Re'eh - "See"** - is written in the singular form (Re'u would be the plural for Y'all see). Why does the Torah begin our sedra with the word Re'eh - see, in the singular, addressed to each individual? The Vilna Gaon teaches - a person should not say, who am I to choose the good path in life? If a majority of people are behaving otherwise, why should I be the good guy and endeavor to do good? Therefore the Torah addresses the individual - Re'eh - see what is before you. Do what is good, right and proper, and don't pay attention to what the rest of society is doing - be it smoking or drinking or doing drugs; be it a life without the performance of any mitzvos. **Anochi - "I"**, refers to G-d. See that G-d has set before us a blessing. A person should not say, how can I stand up to the great temptations in this world? The answer - because I (G-d) will assist the human being and help him to overcome the temptation. Alcoholics Anonymous has 12 steps to assist a person to overcome his addiction. One of the most Important of these is a belief in a power higher than oneself - in the power of G-d. **Nosain - "set"** is not in the past tense. See G-d sets before you, in the present.

A person should not think that if he once chose the wrong path, in the past, that there is no chance of mending and fixing the wrong. Therefore, the Torah uses the word Nosain – G-d sets before us always the opportunity to choose the right path. Lifnaycham - "before you". If one should say, how do I know what is the proper path and what is the wrong way? Everything is not black and white, good or evil! Therefore, the Torah says - it is "before you" - open your eyes and see with a discerning look, examine the historical developments of our people and everything will become crystal clear. Hayom - "this day". Perhaps a person will say, what hope do I have, I am too far gone, I am too far removed from the good path. I am tied down to a lifestyle that doesn't permit me to live more ethically and Jewishly! Therefore, the Torah states – "See, G-d sets before you today a blessing". Everyday should be viewed as the possibility for a new beginning. A Baal Teshuva, a person who does Teshuva, who repents of past misdeeds, is like a newborn today. "See, G-d sets before you this day a blessing."

Blessing the New Month... Elul

When we bless the month of Elul, we complete the act of blessing begun the *previous* Tishrei. When we bless Shabbos Mevarchim Elul, it is as the culmination and fulfillment of G-d's blessing the previous Shabbos Mevarchim Tishrei. Thus, in G-d's blessing there is manifest the principle of "the beginning is wedged in its end, and the end in the beginning." Elul is the 12th and final month in the Jewish calendar (the sixth month counting from Nisan). It is a month that connects the past year with the coming year—a time when we reflect on where we stand and where we should be going.

Parshas Re'eh: 'Oh Say Can You See'

"See, I present before you today a blessing and a curse" (Deut. 11:26).

R Yitzchok Meir of Gur says that G-d has given a person the wisdom and understanding to be able to distinguish between right and wrong, between a blessing and curse.

We have not only the intelligence to make wise decisions but also the ability to do so. Yet, we often see people making unwise decisions that are to their own detriment, and they fail to use these G-d-given strengths in their own favor.

This thought occurs to me when I see intelligent and even scholarly people smoking cigarettes, knowingly poisoning themselves. True, it would require effort and some tolerance of discomfort to break the habit, but certainly one's life is dear enough that one should willingly accept the discomfort in the interest of survival. People who readily accept the discomfort of a surgical procedure to save their lives nonetheless appear unable to do so with regard to discontinuing smoking.

The reason for this discrepancy is that one's judgment is distorted by what one would like to believe. The Torah states this very clearly: "A bribe will blind the eyes of the wise" (Deuteronomy 16:19). One's wisdom is ineffective when a bribe has affected one's judgment capacity. A blind person would indeed wish to avoid falling into a pit, but he cannot help himself if he cannot see it. This is true of every unwise decision. Smoking is just one stark example. We are constantly under the influence of biases that impair our judgment.

The blind person cannot make himself sighted, but we do have the ability to overcome the blindness of our biases. We just need to be on the alert and on the defensive, realizing our vulnerability.

Moses chose his words very deliberately: "See, I present before you today a blessing and a curse." See, indeed. You have the ability to overcome the blindness of your biases.
